OLD / ROUTINE BUSINESS – REVISITED ISSUES / PROJECTS

- ✓ **2009-2010 FINANCIALS** (*Status*)
 We are awaiting the year end finals and audit. I'll pass along the year end projected as soon as we have good numbers (mid July).
- ✓ **MTT APPEALS, GM BANKRUPTCY** (*Resolution*)
 I have set a short discussion within executive session to discuss progress and strategy for the GM-SPO MTT Appeal. We may have to go to a conference call on this with Mr. Figura.
- ✓ **PERSONNEL POLICIES & PROCEDURES** (*Status*)
 I had hopes of completing this during the holidays, but got sidetracked on other issues. I'll try and complete it in the near future
- ✓ **DISASTER, EMERGENCY RESPONSE POLICY COMMITTEE** (*Status*)
 As above, I have similar hopes on this project.
- ✓ **MAJOR STREET FUND, TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENTS** (*See Individual Category*)
 - ☐ **2011-2014 T.I.P. APPLICATION** (*Status*)
 The 2011-2014 TIP schedules are in and we have three projects that are solidly funded and two in the queue. The funded projects are Miller between Elms and Tallmadge, Bristol from Miller 600 feet west (excluding the cuts in front of GM-SPO, and a section of the trail system running from the back of Elms Park to the proposed Heritage Park (along the west lot lines of GM-SPO). The unfunded queue projects are Miller between Tallmadge and Dye, and Miller between Seymour and Elms. We approved a resolution of commitment on January 11th. I'll keep the Council informed.

❑ **MORRISH ROAD NORTH CONSTRUCTION PROJECT - MEIJER'S** (*Status*)

We have received a check from Meijer's and the project is finally underway. I'll keep the Council posted on developments.

❑ **MORRISH ROAD SOUTH ARRA PROJECT & GUARDRAIL** (*Status*)

Pending final reconciliation of construction engineering fees. We are looking at options for replacing the guardrail and will be back for discussion in the near future.

✓ **LOCAL STREET FUND, TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENTS**

❑ **2008 REPAIR ROSTER** (*Resolution*)

As we have planned and discussed, we went out to bid for the full repair of Jennie Lane and the Cape Seal process for 11 other local streets, primarily in the old section of town. For the Jennie Lane project, the low bidder is "Mike & Son Asphalt Inc", of Bath Michigan, for \$116,035. The construction engineering for this project is \$7,920, bringing the total for Jennie Lane to \$123,955. For the Cape Seal project, the low bid return for the 11 streets we put in the bid specification package was \$101,546. Construction engineering services for this project are \$1,980, for a total of \$103,526.

The staff spent a significant amount of time discussing options. We have about \$160,000 fund balance in 203 Local Streets, leaving us short about \$68,000 for these two projects. Jennie Lane cannot be scaled back. The Cape Seal project could, in that we could eliminate half or more of the streets we bid for the process. The problem here is that each of the streets we drop will end up in the "hugely expensive to fix" category very soon. This room is already chucked full of streets that are at the end of life stage. At this stage, they can deteriorate no further, the cost being whatever a full scale reconstruction is.

The staff believes we should do both these projects, in their entirety. Several years ago, we studied damage patterns from garbage trucks on local streets. In this process, with the help of our engineers, we were able to calculate that about 30% of the deterioration to the streets was the result of the trucks used by our contract garbage collection companies, most of the damage occurring in the spring when the ground is thawing. Over the years, these trucks have gotten larger and heavier. If you take the time to inspect outward from the curb pans three feet and the drainage structures therein, you'll see that the damage is very apparent. If we document the damage along with our engineer's opinion as to the cause, we can use a proportionate amount of 226 Garbage money towards the repair. The garbage fund has a projected fiscal year end fund balance of about \$550,000.

We are not yet ready to award the Cape Seal Project. We are in the process of looking at the drainage structures on these streets. We are ready to go with the Jennie Lane project. The staff recommendation is to award and appropriate the Jennie project tonight with local street funds, 30% 226 garbage funds and a 101 general fund contribution of \$16,800. We will be back with the Cape Seal project within a meeting or two to use the balance of local street funds (\$20k reserve left in the 203 fund) along with 30% 226 Garbage funds and a general fund contribution to make up the difference. Here is an estimate of the cost distribution:

- ✓ **WWS SEWER USE – IPP ORDINANCE** (*Status*)
Pending.
- ✓ **SEWER REHABILITATION PROJECT, I&I, PENALTIES** (*Status*)
Phase III was approved at the December 7 Council Meeting. I'll keep the Council informed on progress. As we have discussed, the County has always informed us that as long as we continue to work towards the reduction of infiltration and inflow, the penalties will not be assessed. Our relining and manhole rehabilitation should be much more than adequate to accomplished this.
- ✓ **WWS STORM WATER ORDINANCE** (*Status*)
We are still looking at this.
- ✓ **KAREGNONDI WATER AUTHORITY** (*Presentation*)
I am still trying to get some direction on the County's plan for debt retirement. They advise that they will be present at tonight's meeting to give a presentation on the project. I have included a copy of the engineering study on your CD. Now's the time for questions.
- ✓ **MARATHON STATION BLIGHT & NON-CONFORMING USE** (*Status*)
We are still trying to get some direction on this property. It appears that the third year tax delinquency may have been paid, effectively stopping foreclosure. On a similar note, there have been inquiries to purchase this property for re-development. Nothing serious yet, but we'll continue to push.
- ✓ **SALE OF CITY PROPERTY 5129 MORRISH ROAD** (*Status*)
Pending a report back to the Council with recommendation on the structure as well as the house the City owns at Morrish & Fortino.
- ✓ **SWARTZ AMBULANCE AGREEMENT** (*Status*)
The budget we will be adopting tonight discontinues all funding related to the City's contribution towards the ambulance base. We are fast approaching less than 24 hour police coverage which will become a number one General Fund Priority. I have spoken with Swartz Ambulance and they do desire to stay within the City. I plan to meet with them and discuss the future of the base and options that may exist.
- ✓ **MDOT PARK & RIDE** (*Status*)
Construction is underway. In many ways, we are flying blind on this as we have no written agreement with MDOT, other than email and verbal commitments.
- ✓ **LABOR CONTRACTS** (*Status*)
At the meeting of April 12th, we approved extending the wage re-opener for the POLC agreement out to December, and thereafter, on six month increments to meet. I look to do the same with AFSCME and Supervisor's, as well as the individual agreements with myself and Mr. Zettel. I will bring the other agreements back for review as I clear them.
- ✓ **GO GREEN, PUBLIC SAFETY BUILDING HVAC GRANT** (*Status*)
The work was approved at the bid award price of \$36,934. Construction is nearly completed.
- ✓ **BOARDS & COMMISSIONS** (*Status*)
We still have a bit of clean up appointments, foremost being the Park Board.

NEW BUSINESS / PROJECTED ISSUES & PROJECTS

✓ **RETIREMENT BUY OUT PACKAGE** (*Resolution*)

When we started the budget process in late 2009, I asked our top seniority police officer Larry Pirochta whether he had an interest in retiring and then returning part-time at the part-time rate of pay. In order to maximize his retirement, he would need to be bought up to 32 years of service. His 32 year service date is in January 2012. We initiated a request to MMERS to determine the cost of this while Officer Pirochta looked into whether he wanted to pursue retirement. In the meantime, we were successful in making the FY 2010-2011 Budget work by a re-distribution of wages and the elimination of a DPW position. Larry has looked into retirement and is willing to accept such if the City will buy up the time to 32 years and he can return part-time. Here is a down dirty snapshot of the finances:

Annual Cost, One Officer:	\$90,000
2080 Part-Time Replacement Hours:	-31,304
One Time MMERS Buy-Out:	-26,000
Annual Post Retirement Medical:	-10,500
Net Savings, First Year:	\$22,296
Net Savings, After First Year:	\$48,296

The concept here is downsizing. The full time position would not be filled and additional part-time hours would be added to allow continued 24/7 hour coverage. The POLC Labor Contract stipulates post retirement medical insurance only, capped at the cost of the policy at the time of retirement. The retiree picks up all future increases and pays for any riders, such as prescription, dental and vision. The post retirement insurance cost for Officer Pirochta will be fixed at \$10,500 per year. Given our fiscal future, this is a win-win situation for all. If we can ever get back to where we were before this fiscal crash, we may be able to look at tiered contracts for future hires. I've asked Officer Pirochta to attend tonight's meeting.

✓ **2009-2010 FANG DUES** (*Resolution*)

As we discussed during the revised budget process in the fall of 2009, we did not pay the current years FANG dues. We decided to wait until a late notice was sent. Included with tonight's packet is a second notice invoice. I have a resolution for payment included with tonight's agenda.

✓ **MML PROPERTY & LIABILITY INSURANCE RENEWAL** (*Resolution*)

Included with tonight's agenda is our annual property and liability pool insurance renewal. Interestingly, despite the increased value of the Senior Center and some bump ups I performed on electronics and the like, the cost of the policy took a decent drop from last year's premium of \$64,808 to this year of \$60,820. I have yet to see the annual workers comp invoice, which was around \$22k last year. As soon as I have it, it'll be in for approval.

✓ **PARK COUNCIL MEETING** (*Resolution*)

We've had some light discussion regarding a "Council Meeting in the Park" sometime this summer. Not a bad idea in that we could invite the Park Board to listen to some of the concerns, ideas or directions that they may have. The last meeting of July (26th) or the first of August (9th) is typically low business and might be good for such an event. I

have it up for discussion and a resolution if the Council is so inclined to move the meeting.

✓ **POLICE MOTORCYCLE LEASE EXTENSION** (*Resolution*)

Last July, we entered into a lease agreement with Cummings HD for one police motorcycle. The lease was for 24 months, but we only went 12 due to uncertain fiscal conditions. We have the option of extending the lease another 12 months. Rick recommends extending and the cycle is budgeted for the fiscal year that starts July 1. I included a copy of the lease we approved a year ago, the executed copy indicating 12 months only. The cost is \$1,500. I have a resolution to extend for an additional 12 months.

Council Questions, Inquiries, Requests and Comments

- *Traffic Lights, Bristol-Miller, GM-SPO.* Pending the direction that GM takes. New traffic counts as to warrants would need to be taken.
- *Sr. Center Budget, Statement, Building Cost Reconciliation.* Pending obtaining documents.
- *Deteriorated Retaining Walls & Planters at City Buildings.* We have a partial solution. The circular planter and the wall with the building's name at the entry way can be removed and either an in ground planter or concrete poured in place of. The short retaining walls along the north and west side's present additional problems which may be expensive. When the weather breaks, we are going to take a look at the removal of the walls along with the soil. If brick exists all the way to ground level, we may be able to put landscaping back at the ground level, which would correct the problem. If raw blocks are present, other options will have to be looked at.
- *Tabled Garbage Collection Policy.* Resting comfortably... for now.
- *Tennis Court Nets.* Installed.
- *Flickering Council Chamber Lighting.* Unflickered.
- *Youth Programs in Park.* Looking into this.

WHEREAS, Officer Larry Pirochta has served with the City as a full-time police officer since January 1980 with an exemplary record; and

WHEREAS, Officer Pirochta will reach his maximum MMERS retirement benefit cap at 32 years of service in January 2012; and

WHEREAS, a significant and unprecedented national fiscal crises began in 2008, the crises continuing today with the likelihood that it may be years, if not decades before the City returns to a point prior to 2008; and

WHEREAS, the City continues to meet the fiscal challenges in a variety of ways, one of which is the downsizing of the workforce; and

WHEREAS, one such mechanism to accomplish the downsizing of the workforce without layoffs is to accelerate retirements, Officer Pirochta meeting the criteria of being close enough to retirement to make a buy-out economically feasible for all parties.

NOW, THEREFORE, I Move the City of Swartz Creek approve the early retirement of Officer Larry Pirochta, with the following general stipulations:

1. The City will deposit into the MMERS retirement system an amount not to exceed \$26,000, the amount calculated by MMERS to buy time from the effective date of retirement, being on or about August 1, 2010, to January 31, 2012, thus bringing the years of service for Officer Pirochta to 32.
2. Officer Pirochta will retire on or about August 1, 2010. Officer Pirochta will be allowed to return as an at-will part-time police officer with the City, subject to the rules, regulations and rates of pay of the Police Department and City, MCOLES licensing requirements and the City’s Contract with the Michigan Municipal Employees Retirement System.
3. An agreement drafted by the City Attorney and endorsed by the Police Officers Labor Council.
4. Post retirement and separation benefits to be provided as set forth in the 2009-2012 Labor Agreement between the City and the POLC.

FURTHER, the City Council directs the City Manager to prepare and execute any and all necessary paperwork, fiscal adjustments, separation agreements and contractual payouts to accomplish the separation of Officer Pirochta

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the City of Swartz Creek extend its sincere appreciation for the dedicated service extended by Officer Pirochta to the citizens of the City

**LOCAL STREET PROJECT – APPROPRIATION & BID
AWARD, JENNIE LANE MILL & RESURFACE**

Motion by Councilmember: _____

WHEREAS, the City is in need of extensive repairs to its local street system in which the sole source for funding is State of Michigan Act 51 gas and weight distributions; and

WHEREAS, such revenues are insufficient for any extensive repairs and sustain only routine maintenance such as snow and ice removal and cold patch filling; and

WHEREAS, the City has been successful over the last six years in reserving a small amount of funds totaling \$160,000 towards repairs, however, such savings fall far short of the estimated \$5 million plus it would take to bring the City’s local street system into reasonable repair; and

WHEREAS, the City staff and consulting engineers have evaluated the local street system and determined that given the insufficient amount of funds, that the best value for the investment would be to work to prolong the life of streets that have not deteriorated to the point of re-construction; and

WHEREAS, the City has sent citizen questionnaires and discussed options at public meetings, concluding that although the citizens desire their streets to be in good repair, they are generally unwilling to support a levy or pay assessments through a special assessment district; and

WHEREAS, the City’s staff and consulting engineers recommend the best value for the funds in reserve are the mill and re-surface of Jennie Lane from Bristol to Yarmy and the use of a process called “Cape Seal, wherein some structure work is done along with a micro slurry overlay on streets with relatively low deterioration; and

WHEREAS, the City bid both a Cape Seal process on a handful of local streets and the mill and resurface of Jennie Lane, with the low bid for the Jennie Lane work being Mike & Son Asphalt of Bath Michigan, in the amount of \$116,035, with construction engineering cost of \$7,920; and

WHEREAS, the City staff and consulting engineers have inspected damage to the local street system and determined that in part, deterioration of the structures can be attributed to sustained exposure to heavy vehicles, in particular during the freeze thaw period in the spring, such overweight vehicle exposure recognized to be the City’s contracted weekly garbage collection services: and

WHEREAS, the City’s consulting engineer and City Staff have documented such damage and calculated the outside three feet of each lane, approximately 30%, have sustained attributed damage; and

WHEREAS, it is reasonable to subrogate funds from within the garbage collection 226 fund to assist in the repair of such damage.

NOW, THEREFORE, I Move the City of Swartz Creek accept the low bid of Mike & Son Asphalt of Bath Michigan, in the amount of \$116,035, for the mill and resurface of Jennie Lane from Bristol to Yarmy, in accordance with the bid specifications as set forth and offered for bid by the City's engineering consulting firm, Rowe Professional Services Inc, and further, appoint Rowe Professional Services Inc. to perform construction engineering and testing services at a cost of \$7,920, total project cost of \$124,000.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City direct staff to apportion the cost of the project as follows:







HARLEY-DAVIDSON POLICE MOTORCYCLE
LEASE AGREEMENT

This Agreement made and entered into between CUMMINGS HARLEY-DAVIDSON designated as the Lessor, and CITY OF SWARTZ CREEK , designated as the Lessee, made this 19th day of June 2009 , for the purpose of leasing to the Lessee 1 Harley-Davidson police motorcycles, under the following terms and conditions:

1. EQUIPMENT

1 year 2009 Harley-Davidson police solo motorcycles with windshield, pursuit lamps, strobe light and siren. VIN 1HD1FHM109Y668169 .

2. AGREEMENT TERM

This Agreement shall be effective as of the date of execution for a period of 24 months. Motorcycles leased under this Agreement are to be used for Police and related activities only.

3. PAYMENT PERIOD

The Lease agreement will be for the amount of \$1500.00 each year . The Lessee shall pay two yearly payments in the amount of \$1500.00. Payments include the cost of the equipment, payment of interest, and administrative costs less the residual value of the motorcycles.

4. INSURANCE

At its own expense, the Lessee shall carry Casualty Insurance with respect to the motorcycles and shall carry Public Liability and Property Damage insurance sufficient to protect the full value of the equipment and to protect the Lessor from liability in all events. The Lessee shall carry Workman's Compensation Insurance covering all employees working on, in, near, or about the motorcycles and shall require any other person working on, in, near, or about the motorcycles to carry such coverage. The Lessee shall furnish to the Lessor certificates or other satisfactory evidences of all the insurance coverages described above as required by the terms

and conditions of this Agreement.

5. INDEMNITY

The Lessee shall and does hereby indemnify and save the Lessor harmless from any and all liability arising out of the leasing, renting, operation, control, use, delivery and/or return of the motorcycles including, but not limited to injuries causing personal injury, property damage and/or death, but shall be credited with any amounts received by the Lessor with respect thereto from liability insurance secured by the Lessee. That indemnification shall include all costs and expenses including attorney's fees incurred by the Lessor in connection with any suits or actions resulting from any special liability.

6. LIENS

The Lessee shall not directly or indirectly create, incur, assume or suffer to exist any mortgage, pledge, lien, charge, encumbrance or claim on or with respect to the equipment, except with respect to the respective rights of the Lessor as herein provided. Lessee shall promptly, at its own expense, take such actions as may be necessary to duly discharge any such mortgage, pledge, lien, charge, encumbrance or claim not excepted above if the same shall arise at any time.

7. TAXES

The Lessee shall comply with all laws and shall pay all taxes, if any, including but not limited to Sales and Use Taxes, Excise Taxes, Personal Property Taxes and Assessments and Penalties, Licenses, Registration Fees, Freight and Transportation Charges, Permits and any similar charges imposed on the ownership, possession or use of the motorcycles during the term of this Agreement.

8. CARE AND USE OF EQUIPMENT

The Lessee at its own cost and expense shall maintain the motorcycles in good operating condition, repair and appearance, and protect them from deterioration other than normal wear and tear; shall use the motorcycles for police and related activities only, without abuse, and in a

manner contemplated by Cummings Harley-Davidson, shall not make modifications, alterations or additions to the motorcycles (other than normal operating accessories or controls) without the written consent of Cummings Harley-Davidson, which shall not be unreasonably withheld.

Cummings Harley-Davidson shall have the right during normal hours to enter upon the premises where the motorcycles are located in order to inspect, observe or otherwise protect their interest and the Lessee shall cooperate in affording them the opportunity to do the same.

The Lessee agrees to maintain the motorcycles pursuant to the Manufacturer's Standard Preventative Maintenance Contract and/or Recommendations.

9. DAMAGE OR DETERIORATION OF EQUIPMENT

In the event the equipment is partially damaged or destroyed prior to the end of the Agreement Terms, the Lessee will promptly have the equipment repaired and restored to its original condition and working order for the purposes intended.

10. EVENTS OF DEFAULT AND REMEDIES

Lessee shall be deemed to be in default hereunder upon the happening of any of the following events of default:

- a. Lessee shall fail to make any periodic payment, or to pay any other payment required to be paid hereunder, or
- b. Lessee shall fail to keep any such other term, covenant or condition contained herein.

Upon the occurrence of an event of default as specified above, the Lessee shall fail to remedy such event of default with all reasonable dispatch within a period of thirty (30) days, Lessor or its assigns shall have the right, at its option without any further demand or notice, to pursue any one or more of the following remedies:

- a. by written notice to Lessee, declare an amount equal to all payments due during the Agreement Term to be immediately due and payable as liquidated damages and not as a penalty, whereupon the same shall become immediately due and payable.

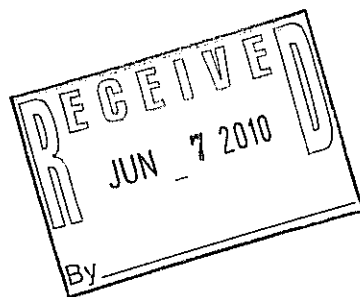

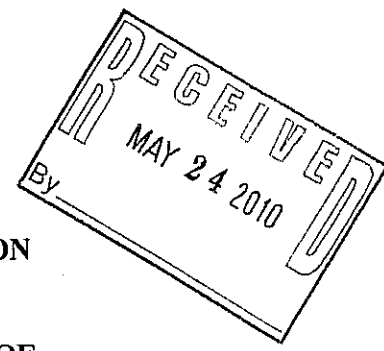

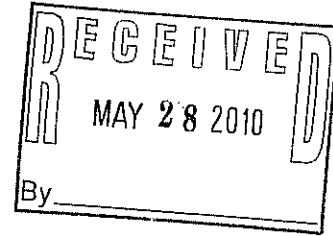

Dear Local Government Official;

Genesee County has been granted the ability to issue up to \$35,570,000 in Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds made available through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA). These bonds may be issued for purposes of promoting development of other economic activity, including capital expenditures, public infrastructure and construction of public facilities including convention centers, and job training and educational programs.

Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds (RZEDB's) are a class of taxable bonds called tax credit bonds. The issuer can elect that the bondholder receive a federal tax credit of 45% of the total coupon interest payable on the bonds, or the federal government can make a direct payment to the issuer to reimburse them for 45% of the interest paid. Even though these bonds are taxable, the net interest cost to the issuer will ultimately be less than a non-taxable bond issuance. This financing vehicle has the potential to save the issuer a significant amount of interest expense.

Of the \$35,570,000 allocation that Genesee County received, approximately \$10.7 million has not been designated for a specific project or program. Genesee County is making this amount available to any local unit of government on a first come-first served basis that has a need for debt financing in the near term.

To provide a more thorough explanation of this program, Genesee County has asked a representative from Dickinson Wright, PLLC, Craig Hammond, to make a presentation and to answer questions regarding this financing methodology. This presentation will be held June 3, 2010 at 1:30 PM in the Harris Auditorium, 3rd Floor of the County Administration Building, 1101 Beach St. If other representatives of your organization are interested in attending this presentation, feel free to invite them as well.

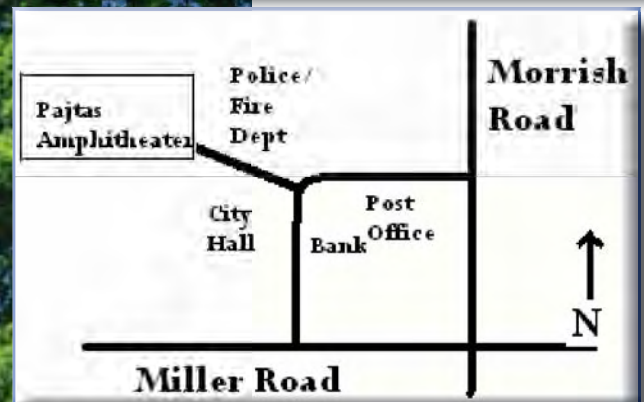

State Affairs Update

What Does "Regularly Employed" Mean? – Last week the House Judiciary Committee took testimony on several bills ([SB 449](#), [HB 4779](#) and [HB 5040](#)) that would define what "regularly employed" means for a law enforcement officer. Currently, the standard set by MCOLES is 520 hours annually. This legislation would change that to 120 hours annually, still requiring police officers to be certified. [MORE>](#)

House Passes Plan to Allow MDOT to Enter Into Public-Private Agreements

This week the Michigan House of Representatives [passed my bill \(HB 4961\)](#) that will allow the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) to enter into public-private partnerships in order to attract private investment for public infrastructure projects throughout the state.

Funding for Michigan's transportation infrastructure has reached a critical point. A key component to attracting new businesses to Michigan is being able to assure prospective employers that our roads and public transportation infrastructure will meet their needs presently and in the future. Yet funding for the state's roads and infrastructure has decreased significantly over the years. We must therefore consider alternative means of paying for these costly projects.

These type of partnerships could be used in Michigan for major projects where MDOT lacks the funds to move forward, and where federal funding is expected to decline in the short and long-term, without expending state transportation dollars. Examples include the expansion of I-75, I-94 or most notably a project known as the Detroit River International Crossing (DRIC). A second bridge between Detroit and Windsor, Ontario will support trade, improve traffic flow and create tens of thousands of Michigan jobs. In fact, studies show that that the additional crossing will create many as 40,000 direct and indirect jobs in Michigan.

As we all know trucks carry the trade that fuels the Michigan/Canadian economies that currently support 220,000 Michigan jobs. DRIC is a vital part of revitalizing our economy and I am proud to have sponsored the bill that allows for DRIC and dozens of other public infrastructure projects throughout Michigan to move forward and stay competitive in the 21st century global economy.

Retirement Bill Update

The Legislature recently passed a series of retirement reforms for school employees. These reforms will raise the multiplier used to calculate pension benefits to 1.6 percent for employees who are currently eligible to retire and opt to do so after July 1, but before Sept. 1. If the employee is eligible – their age and years of service equal 80 – this multiplier will be 1.55 percent. The plan also makes significant retirement changes for employees hired after July 1, including moving to a hybrid system partly based on defined benefits and partly on defined contributions.

I voted against this bill because I disagree with the fact that during the conference committee process the teacher's unions were shut out of the negotiation process. I feel strongly that in our government, all interested parties should have an active voice and be involved.

MICHIGAN HOUSE DEMOCRATS

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Three American cities on the brink of broke

FORTUNE -- Several downtrodden cities are on the verge of defaulting on their debt, putting financially encumbered states and taxpayers on the hook to pick up the tab. The National League of Cities says municipal governments will probably come up \$56 billion to \$83 billion short between now and 2012. That's the tab for decades of binge spending; municipal defaults could be our collective hangover.

Municipal bonds, issued to fund public projects such as roads and public buildings, have historically been seen as one of the safest places to invest, which is why 80% of municipal bond holders are individual households and mutual fund investors, explains Jeffrey Cleveland, municipal bond analyst at Payden & Rygel Investment

Management.


The average five-year cumulative default rate for investment-grade municipal bonds is less than half a percent, according to Moody's data. That's about one-third the amount of corporate debt defaults.

But municipal defaults are on the rise, and the trend is expected to continue. Last year 183 borrowers -- mostly "risky" municipal issuers, such as suburban developers in Florida -- were unable to make \$6.4 billion of payments. That's way up from 31 defaults on \$348 million just two years earlier, according to Distressed Debt Securities.

In the past year only one city has actually defaulted: Menasha, Wis. (Warrens, Wis. narrowly averted a default by agreeing to forbearance on a state loan.) But that could increase, says Matt Fabian, managing director at Municipal Market Advisors.

Rampant unemployment, tepid consumer spending, and deeply underfunded public pensions are the leading causes of the balance sheet issues cities are having today.

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But years of political chicanery and poor financial decision-making by city officials are what led to this problem.

These three municipalities have perhaps the most tenuous grips on staying in the black, thanks to all the above factors:

Jefferson County, Ala.

Jefferson County, Alabama's most populous county, with some 665,000 residents, is shouldering about \$5 billion of debt, most of which was issued to overhaul its sewer system in the mid-1990s. But the county's real troubles stem from a 2003 refinancing of the original fixed-rate bonds and a corrupt local government that accepted kickbacks in exchange for mangling the county's portfolio.

In an effort to benefit from lower interest rates, the county switched to floating-rate bonds, much like the variable-rate mortgages that clobbered the housing industry. It also bought billions in interest rate swaps, complex financial vehicles intended to hedge against changing interest rates. Needless to say, those instruments didn't perform as advertised and actually ended up costing the county more in fees.

Most of Jefferson County's bonds are guaranteed by insurers Financial Guaranty Insurance Corp. and Syncora. But those insurers also overextended themselves during the boom. Syncora was unable to pony up its share of a \$71 million payment due last year, and now without a net, Jefferson County has warned that a Chapter 9 bankruptcy may be in the cards.

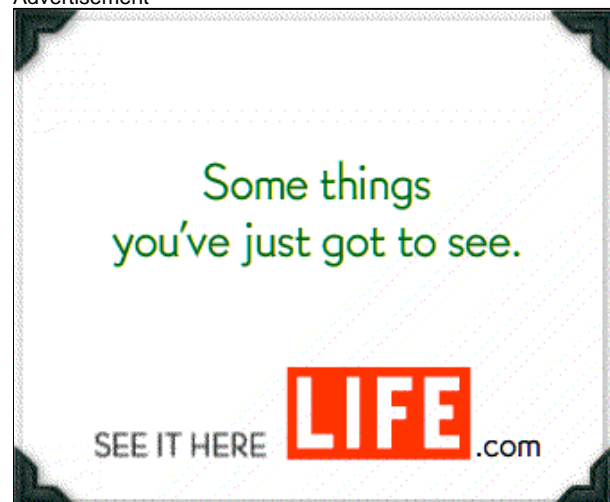
Harrisburg, Penn.

Pennsylvania's capital owes \$68 million in bond interest payments this year -- \$3 million or so more than its entire annual budget. The Harrisburg Authority, the governing body that issued the bonds to construct a state-of-the-art trash incinerator, has already been unable to make several payments, and now the county government, which footed the bill last year for a \$775,000 swap fee, is suing for the funds.

The authority is also indebted to the owner of the trash-burning facility, Coventa Energy, to the tune of \$20 million. In April the authority also missed a \$637,500 payment to Coventa, and is now in the process of negotiating a forbearance.

The mayor has said the city won't declare bankruptcy, but the governor has vowed not to bail Harrisburg out, leaving everyone wondering what options are left. In the meantime, the city is sifting through its assets, some of which include arcane Western artifacts purchased by the previous mayor with public funds, to see whether

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there's anything they can put on eBay before the next payment comes due.

Detroit

To make up for a 2010 budget shortfall of \$280 million, Detroit issued \$250 million of 20-year municipal notes in March. The issuance followed on the heels of a warning from city officials that if its financial state didn't improve, it could be forced to declare bankruptcy. Nonetheless, demand for the bonds was high, thanks in large part to a guarantee that the state would make the payments if the city became insolvent. Michigan has already proved that it has few qualms about stepping in. In early 2009 the state took over the Detroit Public School System, which was facing a budget deficit of more than \$300 million. Now a governor-appointed "emergency financial manager" oversees every penny spent.

Bankruptcy and contagion risk

There's no standard operating procedure for a city or county default. In some cases the state steps in with a loan, and in others the city or county will declare bankruptcy, though that is rare. "There isn't the legal obligation," says Carl Dincesen, an independent tax-exempt-bond risk consultant.

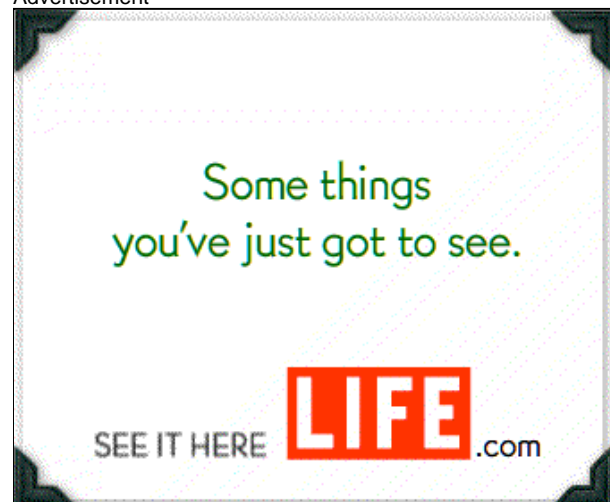
Bankruptcy may not even be the best option, or the most efficient. The city of Vallejo, Calif. has been in Chapter 9 bankruptcy for two years. "Chapter 9 should be a final step, not a first option," Cleveland says. It opens a city up to seizure of public and perhaps even of private property, judicial oversight of city spending, state assumption of the debt, and a lien tax revenues.

Because of the rarity of such bankruptcy filings, experts seem to agree that a Greek-like contagion threat, in which exposure to bondholders is so great that a large-scale default or bankruptcy would cause a massive financial seizure, isn't likely in the U.S.

Still, a major default or bankruptcy would be a shock, just as Orange County's bankruptcy shook investor confidence in 1994. "Because economic growth prospects are bleak, [a bankruptcy would] drain resources away from service divisions and infrastructure finance," says Fabian. "It's going to be a drag on economic growth."

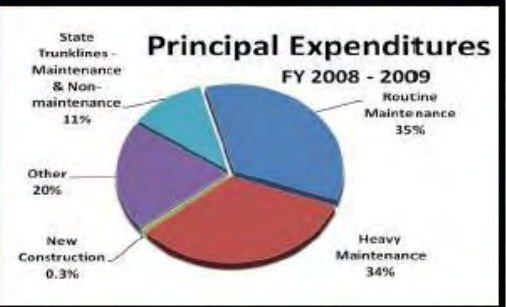
