#### ✓ MAJOR STREET FUND, TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENTS (See Individual Category)

□ 2014-2017 T.I.P. APPLICATION (Resolution)

Included with tonight's agenda is a resolution of endorsement and commitment for streets scheduled to be repaired in the 2014-2017 TIP program.

#### **■ MORRISH ROAD BRIDGE PROJECT** (Status)

The Morrish Road Bridge Project is the last remaining project funded in the 2011-2014 TIP. The only item we do not have a price on yet are the four lights included in the design. We are still awaiting this data from Consumer's Energy. Cost estimates, using the lowest bid return, are as follows:

As we have discussed, I have an in-depth report that addresses long term financial structural deficit along with solutions. As of writing, the document is not quite finished. I'll have it at the next meeting. The report is geared to the public and strives to depict the City's finances using graphs and similar demonstrations. In addition to the budget adoption, tonight's agenda includes setting the 2013-2014 meeting schedule and balance transfers that may be needed.

☐ REHABILITATION PROGRAM (Status)

Pending creation of a new plan for continuation of the Rehabilitation Program.

**□** WATER RATE INCREASE (Resolution)

As we have discussed, included with tonight's packet is a notice of water rate increase from the County's WWS Division. The increase is for 35¢ per 100 cubic feet of water purchased by bulk. Additionally, the County has adjusted the City's meter fees downward a bit for unexplained reasons. Calculations in our office show the overall impact to be minimal. Not knowing how the KWA debt retirement will be integrated, the staff recommends we leave any adjustments alone for now to see where KWA rates go. Our calculation sheet is included with tonight's packet.

**□** BEAR CREEK SANITARY SEWER AGREEMENT (Status)

As the Council is aware, some of the elected positions have changed in Gaines Township. I'm going to let this sit a bit longer to allow the new board to acclimate before addressing it. The County WWS has it on their radar and may push in the near future to reach a resolve.

☐ KWA (Status)

Mr. Wright will be attending the meeting of June 24<sup>th</sup> to discuss the KWA and its impact on finances.

#### ✓ MARATHON REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT (Status)

The Council selected the Biggby Project at the Special Meeting of February 20<sup>,</sup> 2012. Here is the revised schedule:

We are all set to close. The holdup is now me. The Atkinson's intend to grade and seed the property this week. They are not in a hurry to construct as they are in the process of getting another shop up and running. I've been delayed on a variety of matters, specifically Meijer and finances. I'll seek to get this closed right after Meijer is running and we are past budget.

## ✓ PERSONNEL: POLICIES & PROCEDURES (Status) Pending.

#### ✓ CITY PROPERTY, 4438 MORRISH ROAD (Status)

We'll look at a disposition for the house at 4438 Morrish in the spring.

- ✓ LABOR CONTRACTS, SHARED SERVICES, BUILDING DEPARTMENT (Status)
  - The POLC, AFSCME, Supervisor, Assessor, Zoning Administrator and Part-Time Police Officers have been settled. The remaining loose ends are the building inspector's employment agreement, which in part is addressed in the Shared Services Study and the City Manager contract. Mundy Township has officially offered its commitments to perform building services for the City and Flint Township. We continue to look into the building services consolidation.
- ✓ FIRE DEPARTMENT: CONTRACT, COST RECOVERY & APPARATUS (Resolution)
  The Fire Chief has been trying for some time now to add an engine-squad combination
  to the vehicle fleet. A short memo has been included with tonight's packet that
  explains, albeit briefly, the proposed apparatus. I have met several times with the
  Township and it remains unclear what, if any desire, they may have to pursue this
  purchase. As an attempt to get this matter resolved one way or the other, I have set it
  for discussion and a resolution of endorsement for the concept, only. There are still a
  number of issues to be resolved before we can move forward, such as custom vs.
  commercial, financing options, etc. The cost, calculated using a custom built, is
  \$633,000. Subtract the CIP money currently held by the Fire Department, and the
  cost is \$522,000. Our half interest would be \$261,000. At any rate, I need to know
  what interest the Council has in pursuing this.
- ✓ SPRINGBROOK EAST & HERITAGE ASSOCIATION S.A.D. (Status)

All that remains is to accept the streets into our Act #51 Street System. This process is a bit lengthy insofar as legal steps required assuring a proper transfer. Mr. Figura has prepared the paperwork on this end. There are several steps the Associations need to complete before we can begin our process. As soon as we get past this busy spurt, I'll fire up the Associations to start the process.

✓ MEIJER, TRAFFIC SIGNAL, COMMUNITY DONATION (Status)

We're reconciling final invoices and when finished, I'll drop a copy in the packet for review. On the Meijer Community Donation, I'm working on a possible solution and will be back at the next meeting to discuss options.

- ✓ MI-LCC PENDING LICENSES (See Individual Category)
  - ☐ CLASS "C" NEW, 8013 MILLER, MONTINI (Status)

The Council has referred this to the Planning Commission. The request needs review as it may be a significant change of use and accompanies a request for outdoor sales. The applicant, via his attorney, has been informed that they need a formal submission. As of yet, they have not filed with the City.

- □ NEW SDM & SDD, 4141 MORRISH ROAD, MEIJER INC. (Status)
  The SDM has been issued. The SDD is still under review by MI-LCC
- □ CLASS "C" TRANSFER, 6104 MILLER, KENDRA LLC (Status)
  Pending further correspondence from MI-LCC.
- ✓ I-69 MORRISH ROAD BRIDGE REPAIR, FLOOD RELIEF GRANT (Status)

We have been awarded a \$30,000 grant from the State's Emergency Management Division from the damage that occurred during the May 4<sup>th</sup> 2012 flood. Work has been completed by the contractor, Zeller & Sons Contracting, at the bid cost of \$27,000. As soon as final invoicing is in we will submit for reimbursement under the grant.

#### ✓ MPSC COMPLAINT, FRONTIER v CITY (Status)

I met with Frontier in late January, the meeting being quite positive. They will be formerly addressing the Council on several matters either late this month or first of July. In the meantime, they continue to repair poor workmanship locations in the overhead infrastructure. I'll keep the Council posted on developments.

#### ✓ MI-DEQ SCRAP TIRE GRANT (Status)

The Council approved the application to the MI-DEQ for a 50% construction cost grant for public paving improvements that use recycled scrap tires in the asphalt process. We are looking at our parking lots, being Public Safety Building and the north alley lot behind Hank & Don's, as a test. The estimated total project costs are \$322,000 of which the City's match would be \$182,000 (includes design and construction engineering). We've made it past the initial application process and have been invited to continue in the process. On another note, if the grant works, then it may be something to look at for paving some of the local streets in the future.

#### ✓ FARMERS MARKET (Status)

Underway. After a month or so in operation, I'll have Mr. Mattson report on the progress.

#### ✓ EVIP COMPETITIVE GRANT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (Status)

As we discussed a couple of meetings ago, we are looking at this grant source for the development of the Bristol Road property into a sports complex, with the schools. Lou has advised Rowe can do the application for \$1,200. We're going to proceed forward on the outside chance that funds may be available. I'll keep the Council posted on developments.

#### ✓ PARK RESERVATION REQUEST, ART GUILD (Status)

The Swartz Creek Art Guild, represented by Mr. Chuck Jackson, has requested to reserve all of Elms Park on Saturday September 13<sup>th</sup> and Sunday September 14<sup>th</sup> 2014, to hold a fundraiser arts & crafts show for the guild. The matter is under review by the Park Board and the staff. A recommendation will be back before the Council in the near future.

## **NEW BUSINESS / PROJECTED ISSUES & PROJECTS**

#### ✓ PARADE PERMIT (Resolution)

The Veterans Memorial Committee has requested to do a short parade in honor of Flag Day as well as the final improvement to the memorial park. A small canine statute will be put in place at the memorial. The parade will run from St, Mary's Church, south on Frederick, west on Miller, north on Fortino, to the park. The parade involves about a dozen units, no kids, no items handed out, and two sets of "walkers", being an honor guard and the women's auxiliary. It should take about 15 minutes. The City will be the sponsor and the short ceremony will fall under the City's casualty insurance. Rick has approved the application and will provide police assistance for the event. A resolution of approval is included with tonight's program.

#### ✓ TAX REVERTED PROPERTIES (Discussion)

In the packet tonight is a notice from the County Treasurer's office showing tax reverted properties located within the City. There are 12 new properties that the

City may acquire for payment of the back owed taxes. The properties include three houses and nine vacant lots. The houses are at 5017 Third, 5052 Fairchild and 6289 Bristol. The vacants are all in Winchester Woods, with the exception of one, which is an out lot on Hill Road. The only one that I can see that may have a clear "public purpose" to acquire is the one on Hill. The others are a bit of a stretch, but may present some reasons, particularly the ones that are vacant and in Winchester Woods. At any rate, I've set this for discussion to weigh the pros and cons.

#### ✓ PRESENTATIONS: M.T.A. & I.T.T. TECH (*Presentation*)

Mr. Ed Benning, MTA Director and Mr. James Washington, from ITT Tech, have requested a few minutes to address the Council. The requests are not related. I have scheduled each for a brief presentation at tonight's meeting.

#### ✓ BOARDS & COMMISSIONS (Status)

We have a number of appointments to catch up on, inclusive of the vacancy on the Fire Board. I have not had the time to address these since the last meeting. I will have them for the next meeting.

### Council Questions, Inquiries, Requests and Comments

- □ Additional Lighting, Miller Fairchild Intersection. We are back trying to get a review by Consumers Energy.
- □ High School Arts Center, Construction Debris. Still working at getting the yard cleaned up. I'll keep the Council posted.
- Inquiry, Check #37427. I was stumped by an inquiry on this check at the last meeting. It's not very often that that happens, but it did. The invoice is included with tonight's packet. The expenses were cumulative at various locations, for jetting grease from our sanitary sewer lines.

WHEREAS, the City of Swartz Creek is a Local Governmental Unit and recognized Street Authority eligible to receive funding from the Michigan Department of Transportation and the Federal Highway Administration; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Swartz Creek is a member of the Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Alliance, an urban transportation planning cooperative charged with allocating funds to eligible street authorities in Genesee County; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Swartz Creek has identified a need to make repairs to the following streets within its Major Street System:

- 1. Miller Road between Morrish and Elms, mill and resurface 1.2 miles
- 2. Miller Road between Tallmadge and Dye, mill and resurface 1.2 miles
- 3. Fairchild, Winston, Worchester and Cappy, mill and resurface .84 miles.

**WHEREAS**, the Genesee County Metropolitan Alliance and the Swartz Creek City Council have considered the making of such repairs and improvements in open session following the review of documents and the hearing of comments on the need, from the city's engineer, staff and from the public; and

**WHEREAS**, the Genesee County Metropolitan Alliance have set a funding schedule for its 2014-2017 Traffic Improvement Program ("TIP"), the plan including the following streets and corresponding cost estimates:

Additional meters, connected for the exclusive purpose of registering water consumed and NOT returned to the sewer system shall be charged the commodity charge only (example: lawn sprinkler system).

- **(B)** Any water customer may have water services temporarily shut off for any time period during which the premises, for which the water service is provided, will be unoccupied. The request for such shut off shall be made in writing on forms to be provided by the city. The written request shall specify the reason for the shut off and the date on which the water service shall be shut off.
- **(C)** There shall be a Twenty Dollar (\$20.00) charge for shutting off the water service pursuant to such request and a Twenty Dollar (\$20.00) charge for turning the water service back on, if the shut off or turn on is performed during normal business hours. If this shut off or turn on is performed outside of normal business hours, the charge shall be One-Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Such charges shall also apply if water is shut off or turned back on pursuant to account delinquency. The City Manager may waive shut off and turn on fees for reasonable cause.
- **(D)** Water customers shall continue to be billed for a readiness to service charge while connected to the system.
- **(E)** Bulk water sales shall be in accordance with the following fee schedule:

#### 10. Chapter 19: Water & Sewer Tap Fees

- (A) There shall be paid, with respect to all premises connecting to the water and sanitary sewer system of the city, a tap-in fee pursuant to the following schedules:
  - (1) Single-family residence--\$1,500 each for water & sanitary sewer
  - (2) Multiple-family residence--\$1,500 per unit each for water and sanitary sewer

- **(B)** All other uses connecting to the water and/or sanitary sewer system of the city shall be required to pay tap-in fees at the rate of one-thousand, five hundred dollars (\$1,500) per unit factor, pursuant to the unit factor table provided for by the Genesee County Division of Water and Waste. In no case shall tap-in fees be less than one-thousand, five hundred dollars (\$1,500).
- **(C)** Furthermore, for any structure used generally for more than one (1) purpose, connection fees shall be determined by applying the appropriate unit factors as set by the Genesee County Division of Water and Waste, to the various uses on any level, grade or sub-grade plane of the structure, provided that it is intended that the fees so derived shall be cumulative. Tap fees shall also apply for any additional units that may be calculated and applied by the County WWS pursuant to change in use or otherwise.



#### INTRODUCTION

The City of Swartz Creek is a Michigan Municipal Corporation established by charter in 1959, pursuant to PA 279 of 1909, as amended. The City is charged with the preservation of public peace and to provide for the health, safety and welfare of its residents and visitors, including minority populations, low-income populations, the elderly, persons with disabilities, and those who traverse the state of Michigan. The City recognizes its responsibility to provide fairness and equity in all of its programs, services, and activities, and that it must abide by and enforce federal and state civil rights legislation.

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, is the overarching civil rights law which prohibits discrimination based on race, color, or national origin, in any program, service or activity that receives federal assistance. Specifically, Title VI assures that, "No person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefit of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal assistance." Title VI has been broadened by related statutes, regulations and executive orders. Discrimination based on sex is prohibited by Section 324 of the Federal-Aid Highway Act, which is the enabling legislation of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). The Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 prohibit unfair and inequitable treatment of persons as a result of projects which are undertaken with Federal financial assistance. The Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987 clarified the intent of Title VI to include all programs and activities of federal-aid recipients and contractors whether those programs and activities are federally funded or not.

In addition to statutory authorities, Executive Order 12898, "Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations," signed in February of 1994, requires federal agencies to achieve Environmental Justice as part of its mission by identifying disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects of its programs, policies, and activities on minority populations and low-income populations. Environmental Justice Initiatives are accomplished by involving the potentially affected public in the development of transportation projects that fit within their communities without sacrificing safety or mobility. In 1997, the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) issued its DOT Order to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations to

summarize and expand upon the requirements of Executive Order 12898 on Environmental Justice. Also, Executive Order 13166, "Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency (LEP)," provides that no person shall be subjected to discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin under any program or activity that receives Federal financial assistance.

As a recipient of federal financial assistance, the City of Swartz Creek must provide access to individuals with limited ability to speak, write, or understand the English language. The City of Swartz Creek will not restrict an individual in any way from the enjoyment of any advantage or privilege enjoyed by others receiving any service, financial aid, or other benefit under its programs or projects. Individuals may not be subjected to criteria or methods of administration which cause adverse impact because of their race, color, or national origin, or have the effect of defeating or substantially impairing accomplishment of the objectives of the program because of race, color or national origin. Therefore, the primary goals and objectives of the City of Swartz Creek's Title VI Program are:

- 1. To assign roles, responsibilities, and procedures for ensuring compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and related regulations and directives;
- 2. To ensure that people affected by City programs and projects receive the services, benefits, and opportunities to which they are entitled without regard to race, color, national origin, age, sex, or disability;
- 3. To prevent discrimination in the City of Swartz Creek's programs and activities.
- 4. To establish procedures for identifying impacts in any program, service, or activity that may create illegal adverse discrimination on any person because of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or disability; or on minority populations, low-income populations, the elderly, and all interested persons and affected Title VI populations;
- 5. To establish procedures to annually review Title VI compliance within specific program areas within the City.
- 6. To set forth procedures for filing and processing complaints by persons who believe they have been subjected to illegal discrimination under Title VI in the City's services, programs or activities.

As the sub-recipient of federal transportation funds, the City of Swartz Creek must comply with federal and state laws, and related statutes, to ensure equal access and opportunity to all persons, with respect to transportation services, facilities, activities, and programs, without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, sex, socio-economic status, or geographical location.

The City of Swartz Creek shall also ensure that their sub-recipients adhere to state and federal law and include in all written agreements or contracts, assurances that the sub-recipient must comply with Title VI and other related statutes. The City of Swartz Creek, as a sub-recipient who distributes federal transportation funds, shall monitor their sub-recipients for voluntary compliance with Title VI. In the event that non-compliance is discovered, the City will make a good faith effort to ensure that the sub-recipient corrects any deficiencies arising out of complaints related to Title VI; and that sub-recipients will proactively gauge the impacts of any program or activity on minority populations and low-income populations, the elderly, persons with disabilities, all interested persons and affected Title VI populations.

#### Discrimination under Title VI

There are two types of illegal discrimination prohibited under Title VI and its related statutes. One type of discrimination which may or may not be intentional is "disparate treatment." Disparate treatment is defined as treating similarly situated persons differently because of their race, color, national origin, sex, disability, or age.

The second type of illegal discrimination is "disparate impact." Disparate impact discrimination occurs when a "neutral procedure or practice" results in fewer services or benefits, or inferior services or benefits, to members of a protected group. With disparate impact, the focus is on the consequences of a decision, policy, or practice rather than the intent.

The City of Swartz Creek's efforts to prevent such discrimination must address, but not be limited to, a program's impacts, access, benefits, participation, treatment, services, contracting opportunities, training, investigation of complaints, allocation of funds, prioritization of projects, and the overarching functions of planning, project development and delivery, right-of-way, construction, and research.

The City of Swartz Creek has developed this Title VI Plan to assure that services, programs, and activities of the City are offered, conducted, and administered fairly, without regard to race, color, national origin, sex, age, or disability of the participants or beneficiaries of federally funded programs, services, or activities (see Title VI Assurances).

## CITY OF SWARTZ CREEK NON-DISCRIMINATION POLICY STATEMENT

The City of Swartz Creek reaffirms its policy to allow all individuals the opportunity to participate in federal financially assisted services and adopts the following provision:

"No person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance." In applying this policy, the City and its sub-recipients of federal funds shall not:

- 1. Deny any individual with any services, opportunity, or other benefit for which such individual is otherwise qualified;
- 2. Provide any individual with any service, or other benefit, which is inferior (in quantity or quality) to, or which is provided in a different manner from that which is provided to others;
- 3. Subject any individual to segregated or disparate treatment in any manner related to such individual's receipt of services or benefits;
- 4. Restrict an individual in any way from the enjoyment of services, facilities or any other advantage, privilege or other benefit provided to others;
- 5. Adopt or use methods of administration, which would limit participation by any group of recipients or subject any individual to discrimination;
- 6. Address any individual in a manner that denotes inferiority because of race, color, or national origin;
- 7. Permit discriminatory activity in a facility built in whole or in part with federal funds;
- 8. Deny any segment of the population the opportunity to participate in the operations of a planning or advisory body that is an integral part of a federally funded program;
- 9. Fail to provide information in a language other than English to potential or actual beneficiaries who are of limited English speaking ability, when requested and as appropriate;
- 10. Subject an individual to discriminatory employment practices under any federally funded program whose objective is to provide employment;
- 11. Locate a facility in any way, which would limit or impede access to a federally-funded service or benefit.

The City of Swartz Creek will actively pursue the prevention of any Title VI deficiencies or violations and will take the necessary steps to ensure compliance. If irregularities occur in the administration of the program's operation, procedures will be promptly implemented to resolve Title VI issues all within a period not to exceed 90 days.

The City of Swartz Creek designates Paul Bueche, City Manager as the Title VI Coordinator. The City Manager will be responsible for initiating and monitoring Title VI activities and other required matters, ensuring that the City of Swartz Creek complies with the Title VI regulations and pursues prevention of Title VI deficiencies or violations. The City of Swartz Creek (hereinafter referred to as the "Recipient") hereby agrees that as a condition to receiving any Federal financial assistance from the U.S. Department of Transportation, it will comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 78 Stat. 252, 42 USC 2000d-42 USC 2000d-4 (hereinafter referred to as the "Act"), and all requirements imposed by or pursuant to Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Non-discrimination in Federally-Assisted Programs for the Department of Transportation – Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (hereinafter referred to as the "Regulations") and other pertinent directives, to the end that in accordance with the Act, Regulations, and other pertinent directives, no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of gender, race, color or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which the Recipient received Federal financial assistance from the Department of Transportation, including the Federal Highway Administration, and hereby gives assurances that it will promptly take any measures necessary to effectuate this agreement. This assurance is required by subsection 21.7 (a) (1) and (b) of the Regulations.

More specifically and without limiting the above general assurance, the Recipient hereby gives the following specific assurance with respect to the Federal Aid Highway Program:

- 1. That the Recipient agrees that each "program" and each "facility as defined in subsections 21.23(e) and 21.23(b) of the Regulations, will be (with regard to a "program") conducted, or will be (with regard to a "facility") operated in compliance with all requirements imposed by, or pursuant to, the Regulations.
- 2. That the Recipient shall insert the following notification in all solicitations for bids for work or material subject to the Regulations and made in connection with all Federal Aid Highway Programs and, in adapted form in all proposals for negotiated agreements:

"The (Recipient), in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 78 Stat. 252, 42 U.S.C 2000d to 2000d-4 and Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Department of Transportation, SubTitle A, Office the Secretary, Part 21, Nondiscrimination in Federally assisted programs of the Department of Transportation issued pursuant to such Act, hereby notifies all bidders that it will affirmatively insure that in any contract entered into pursuant to this advertisement, minority business enterprises will be afforded full opportunity to submit bids in response to this invitation and will not be discriminated against on the grounds of race, color, or national origin in consideration for an award."

- 3. That the Recipient shall insert the clauses of Appendix A of this assurance in every contract subject to the Act and the Regulations.
- 4. That the Recipient shall insert the clauses of Appendix B of this assurance, as a covenant running with the land, in any deed from the United States effecting a transfer of real property, structures, or improvements thereon, or interest therein.
- 5. That where the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance to construct a facility, or part of a facility, the assurance shall extend to the entire facility and facilities operated in connection therewith.
- 6. That where the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance in the form, or for the acquisition of real property or an interest in real property, the assurance shall extend to rights to space on, over or under such property.
- 7. That the Recipient shall include the appropriate clauses set forth in Appendix C of this assurance, as a covenant running with the land, in any future deeds, leases, permits, licenses, and similar agreements entered into by the Recipient with other parties: (a) for the subsequent transfer of real property acquired or improved under the Federal Aid Highway Program; and (b) for the construction or use of or access to space on, over or under real property acquired, or improved under the Federal Aid Highway Program.
- 8. That this assurance obligates the Recipient for the period during which Federal financial assistance is extended to the program, except where the Federal financial assistance is to provide, or is in the form of, personal property, or real property or interest therein or structures or improvements thereon, in which case the assurance obligates the Recipient or any transferee for the longer of the following periods: (a) the period during which the property is used for a purpose for which the Federal financial assistance is extended, or for another purpose involving the provision

of similar services or benefits; or (b) the period during which the Recipient retains ownership or possession of the property.

- 9. The Recipient shall provide for such methods of administration for the program as are found by the Secretary of Transportation or the official to whom it delegates specific authority to give reasonable guarantee that it, other recipients, sub-grantees, contractors, subcontractors, transferees, successors in interest, and other participants of Federal financial assistance under such program will comply with all requirements imposed or pursuant to the Act, the Regulations and this assurance.
- 10. The Recipient agrees that the United States has a right to seek judicial enforcement with regard to any matter arising under the Act, the Regulations, and this assurance.

This assurance is given in consideration of and for the purpose of obtaining any and all Federal grants, loans, contracts, property, discounts or other Federal financial assistance extended after the date hereof to the Recipient under the Federal Aid Highway Program and is binding on it, other recipients, sub-grantees, contractors, sub-contractors, transferees, successors in interest and other participants in the Federal Aid Highway Program. The person or persons whose signatures appear below are authorized to sign this assurance on behalf of the Recipient.

#### **AUTHORITIES**

#### Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 USC 2000d to 2000d-4; 42 USC 4601 to 4655; 23 USC 109(h);

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 provides that no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin (including Limited English Proficiency), be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance (please refer to 23 CFR 200.9 and 49 CFR 21). Related statutes have broadened the grounds to include age, sex, low income, and disability.

The Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987 also broadened the scope of Title VI coverage by expanding the definition of terms "programs or activities" to include all programs or activities of Federal Aid recipients, sub-recipients, and contractors, whether such programs and activities are federally assisted or not (Public Law 100-259 [S. 557] March 22, 1988).

**Federal Aid Highway Act of 1973, 23 USC 324:** No person shall on the ground of sex be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal assistance under this title or carried on under this title.

**Age Discrimination Act of 1975, 42 USC 6101:** No person in the United States shall, on the basis of age, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under, any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance.

Americans With Disabilities Act of 1990 PL 101-336: No qualified individual with a disability shall, by reason of his/her disability, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination by a department, agency, special purpose district or other instrumentality of a state or local government.

**Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973:** No qualified individual with a disability shall, solely by reason of his/her disability, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity that receives or benefits from federal financial assistance.

#### **DEFINITIONS**

<u>Adverse Effects</u> – The totality of significant individual or cumulative human health or environmental effects including interrelated social and economic effects, which may include, but are not limited to: (See Appendix E for additional discussion of "significant")

- Bodily impairment, infirmity, illness or death
- Air, noise and water pollution and soil contamination
- Destruction or disruption of man-made or natural resources
- Destruction or diminution of aesthetic values
- Destruction or disruption of community cohesion or community's economic vitality
- Destruction or disruption of the availability of public and private facilities and services
- Adverse employment effects
- Displacement of person's businesses, farms or non-profit organizations
- Increased traffic congestion, isolation, exclusion or separation of minority or low-income individuals within a given community or from the broader community
- Denial of, reduction in, or significant delay in the receipt of benefits of the City programs, policies and activities

<u>Federal Assistance</u> – Includes grants and loans of federal funds; the grant or donation of federal property and interests in property; the detail of federal personnel, federal property or any interest in such property without consideration or at a nominal consideration or at a consideration which is reduced for the purpose of assisting the recipient, or in recognition of the public interest to be served by such sale or lease to the recipient; and any federal agreement, arrangement or other contract which has, as one of its purposes, the provision of assistance.

<u>Limited English Proficiency</u> - Individuals with a primary or home language other than English who must, due to limited fluency in English, communicate in that primary or home language if the individuals are to have an equal opportunity to participate effectively in or benefit from any aid, service or benefit provided by the City.

<u>Low-Income</u> – A person whose median household income is at or below the Department of Health and Human Service Poverty guidelines (see <a href="http://aspe.hhs.gov/poverty/">http://aspe.hhs.gov/poverty/</a>).

<u>Low-Income Population</u> – Any readily identifiable group of low-income persons who live in geographic proximity and, if circumstances warrant, geographically dispersed/transient persons (such as migrant workers or Native Americans) who will be similarly affected by a proposed City program, policy or activity.

#### Minority – A person who is:

- a. Black A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa;
- b. Hispanic A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race;
- c. Asian American A person having origins in any of the original people of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands; or
- d. American Indian and Alaskan Native A person having origins in any of the original people of North America and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.

<u>Minority Population</u> – Any readily identifiable groups of minority persons who live in geographic proximity and, if circumstances warrant, geographically dispersed/transient persons (such as migrant workers or Native Americans) who will be similarly affected by a proposed City program, policy or activity.

Non-Compliance – A recipient has failed to meet prescribed requirements and has shown an apparent lack of good faith effort in implementing all the requirements of Title VI and related statues.

<u>Persons</u> – Where designation of persons by race, color or national origin is required, the following designation ordinarily may be used; "White not of Hispanic origin", "Black not of Hispanic origin", "Hispanic", "Asian or Pacific Islander",

"American Indian or Alaskan Native". Additional sub-categories based on national origin of primary language spoken may be used, where appropriate, on either a national or a regional basis.

<u>Program</u> – Includes any road or park project including planning or any activity for the provision of services financial aid or other benefits to individuals. This includes education or training, work opportunities, health welfare, rehabilitation, or other services, whether provided directly by the recipient of federal financial assistance or provided by others through contracts or other arrangements with the recipient.

Recipient - Any state, territory, possession, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, or any political subdivision, or instrumentality thereof, or any public or private agency, institution, or organization, or other entity, or any individual, in any state, territory, possession, the District of Columbia, or Puerto Rico, to whom Federal assistance is extended, either directly or through another recipient, for any program. Recipient includes any successor, assignee, or transferee thereof, but does not include any ultimate beneficiary under any such program.

Significant Adverse effects on Minority and Low-Income Populations – An adverse affect that:

- a. is predominantly borne by a minority population and/or a low-income population, or
- b. will be suffered by the minority population and/or low-income population and is shown to be appreciably more severe or greater in magnitude than the adverse effect that will be suffered by the non-minority population and/or non-low-income population.

<u>Sub-Recipient</u> – Any agency such as a council of governments, regional planning agency, or educational institution, for example, that received Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) funds through the State DOT and not directly from the FHWA. Other agencies, local governments, contractors, consultants that receive these funds are all considered sub-recipients.

#### ADMINISTRATION – GENERAL

The City of Swartz Creek designates Paul D. Bueche, City Manager as the Title VI Coordinator (hereinafter referred to as the "Title VI Coordinator"). Mr. Bueche shall have lead responsibility for coordinating the administration of the Title VI and related statutes, programs, plans, and assurances.

<u>Complaints</u>: If any individual believes that he/she or any other program beneficiaries have been the object of unequal treatment or discrimination as to the receipt of benefits and/or service, or on the grounds of race, color, national origin (including Limited English Proficiency), sex, age or disability, he/she may exercise his/her right to file a complaint with the City. Complaints may be filed with the Title VI Coordinator. Every effort will be made to resolve complaints informally at the lowest level.

<u>Data Collection:</u> Statistical data on race, color, national origin, English language ability and sex of participants in and beneficiaries of the City; e.g., impacted citizens and affected communities will be gathered and maintained by the City. The gathering procedures will be reviewed annually to ensure sufficiency of the data in meeting the requirements of the Title VI program.

<u>Program Reviews</u>: Special emphasis program reviews will be conducted based on the annual summary of Title VI activities, accomplishments, and problems. The reviews will be conducted by the Title VI Coordinator to assure effectiveness in their compliance of Title VI provisions. The Title VI Coordinator will coordinate efforts to ensure the equal participation in all their programs and activities at all levels. The City does not have any special emphasis programs at this time.

<u>Title VI Reviews on Sub-Recipients</u>: Title VI compliance reviews will be conducted annually by the Title VI Coordinator. Priority for conducting reviews will be given to those recipients of federal (U.S. Department of Transportation) funds with the greatest potential of impact to those groups covered by the Act. The reviews will entail examination of the recipients' adherence to all Title VI requirements. The status of each review will be reported in the annual update and reported to relevant U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) modes upon request.

<u>Annual Reporting Form:</u> The Title VI Coordinator will be responsible for coordination, compilation, and submission of the annual reporting form data to the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT), Civil Rights Program Unit via the Sub-Recipient Annual Certification Form (MDOT form #0179) by October 5<sup>th</sup>.

<u>Title VI Plan Updates</u>: If updated, a copy of Title VI Plan will be submitted to the MDOT, Civil Rights Program Unit, as soon as the update has been completed, or as soon as practicable, and no later than 30 days if significant changes are made.

<u>Public Dissemination</u>: The City will disseminate Title VI Program information to City employees and to the general public. Title VI Program information will be submitted to sub-recipients, contractors and beneficiaries. Public dissemination will include inclusions of Title VI language in contracts and publishing the Title VI Plan on the City's internet website, at <a href="https://www.cityofswartzcreek.org">www.cityofswartzcreek.org</a>

Remedial Action: The City, through the Title VI Coordinator, will actively pursue the prevention of Title VI deficiencies and violations and will take the necessary steps to ensure compliance with all program administrative requirements. When deficiencies are found, procedures will be promptly implemented to correct the deficiencies and to put in writing the corrective action(s). The period to determine corrective action(s) and put it/them in writing to effect compliance may not exceed 90 days from the date the deficiencies are found.

#### LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENCY (LEP) PLAN

On August 11, 2000, President William J. Clinton signed an executive order, <u>Executive Order 13166: Improving Access to Service for Persons with Limited English Proficiency</u><sup>1</sup>, to clarify Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. It had as its purpose, to ensure accessibility to programs and services to otherwise eligible persons who are not proficient in the English language.

This executive order stated that individuals who do not speak English well and who have a limited ability to read, write and speak, or understand English are entitled to language assistance under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 with respect to a particular type of service, benefit, or encounter<sup>1</sup>. These individuals are referred to as being limited in their ability to speak, read, write, or understand English, hence the designation, "LEP," or Limited English Proficient. The Executive Order states that:

"Each federal agency shall prepare a plan to improve access to its federally conducted programs and activities by eligible LEP persons. Each plan shall be consistent with the standards set forth in the LEP Guidance, and shall include the steps the agency will take to ensure that eligible LEP persons can meaningfully access the agency's programs and activities."

Not only do all federal agencies have to develop LEP plans as a condition of receiving federal financial assistance, recipients have to comply with Title VI and LEP guidelines of the federal agency from which funds are provided as well.

Federal financial assistance includes grants, training, use of equipment, donations of surplus property, and other assistance. Recipients of federal funds range from state and local agencies, to nonprofits and organizations. Title VI covers a recipient's entire program or activity. This means all parts of a recipient's operations are covered, even if only one part of a recipient's organization receives the federal assistance. Simply put, any organization that receives federal financial assistance is required to follow this Executive Order.

The City of Swartz Creek receives funds from the US Department of Transportation via the Federal Highway Administration.

The US Department of Transportation published *Policy Guidance Concerning Recipients' responsibilities to Limited English Proficient Person* in the December 14<sup>th</sup>, 2005 Federal Register.<sup>ii</sup>

The Guidance implies that the City of Swartz Creek is an organization that must follow this guidance:

This guidance applies to all DOT funding recipients, which include state departments of transportation, state motor vehicle administrations, airport operators, metropolitan planning organizations, and regional, state, and local transit operators, among many others. Coverage extends to a recipient's entire program or activity, i.e., to all parts of a recipient's operations. This is true even if only one part of the recipient receives the Federal assistance. For example, if DOT provides assistance to a state department of transportation to rehabilitate a particular highway on the National Highway System, all of the operations of the entire state department of transportation—not just the particular highway program or project—are covered by the DOT guidance.

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#### **Elements of an Effective LEP Policy**

The US Department of Justice, Civil Rights Division has developed a set of elements that may be helpful in designing and LEP policy or plan. These elements include:

- 1. Identifying LEP persons who need language assistance
- 2. Identifying ways in which language assistance will be provided
- 3. Training Staff
- 4. Providing notice to LEP persons
- 5. The recommended method of evaluating accessibility to available transportation services is the Four-Factor Analysis identified by the USDOT.

These recommended plan elements have been incorporated into this plan.

#### Methodology for Assessing Needs and Reasonable Steps for an Effective LEP Policy

The DOT guidance outlines four factors recipients should apply to the various kinds of contacts they have with the public to assess language needs and decide what reasonable steps they should take to ensure meaningful access for LEP persons:

- 1. The number or proportion of LEP persons eligible to be served or likely to be encountered by a program, activity, or service of the recipient or grantee.
- 2. The frequency with which LEP individuals come in contact with the program.
- 3. The nature and importance of the program, activity, or service provided by the recipient to the LEP Community.
- 4. The resources available to the City of Swartz Creek and overall cost.

The greater the number or proportion of eligible LEP persons, the greater the frequency with which they have contact with a program, activity, or service and the greater the importance of that program, activity, or service, the more likely enhanced language services will be needed. The intent of DOT's guidance is to suggest a balance that ensures meaningful access by LEP persons to critical services while not imposing undue burdens on small organizations and local governments.

Smaller recipients with more limited budgets are typically not expected to provide the same level of language service as larger recipients with larger budgets.

The DOT guidance is modeled after the Department of Justice's guidance and requires recipients and sub-recipients to take steps to ensure meaningful access to their programs and activities to LEP persons. More information for recipients and sub-recipients can be found at <a href="http://www.lep.gov">http://www.lep.gov</a>.

#### The Four-Factor Analysis

This plan uses the recommended four-factor analysis of an individualized assessment considering the four factors outlined above. Each of the following factors is examined to determine the level and extent of language assistance measures required to sufficiently ensure meaningful access to the City of Swartz Creek services and activities that may affect their quality of life. Recommendations are then based on the results of the analysis.

#### Factor 1: The Proportion, Numbers and Distribution of LEP Persons

The Census Bureau has a range for four classifications of how well people speak English. The classifications are: 'very well,' 'well,' 'not well,' and 'not at all.' For our planning purposes, we are considering people that speak English less than 'very well' as Limited English Proficient persons.

As seen in Table #1, the Census 2011 Data for the City of Swartz Creek shows a small amount of the population that would speak English less than 'very well.'

#### Factor 2: Frequency of Contact with LEP Individuals

The city has conducted an informal survey of our employees with regard to whether they have had encounters with LEP individuals in the performance of their job functions and found that they have had few encounters with LEP individuals. We have offices accessible to the public and therefore accessible to LEP individuals and we have staff that work in the field that could encounter LEP individuals. Additionally, regular City Council meetings are held on the second and fourth Monday of each month which would potentially bring LEP individuals to these meetings. Given the small concentration of LEP individuals as displayed in Table #1 (above) the probability of our employees to encounter and LEP individual is low.

#### Factor 3: The Nature and Importance of the Program, Activity, or Service to LEP

The City of Swartz Creek serves individuals throughout the City in a variety of ways including managing roads, water, sewer, police, fire, elections, and other services to citizens of the City and individuals from outside of the City, such as visitors and those traversing the state. The nature of the services that the City provides is very important to an individual's day-to-day life. Therefore the denial of services to an LEP individual could have a significant detrimental effect. Although the LEP population in the City is small, we will ensure accessibility to all of our programs, services, and activities.

#### Factor 4: The Resources Available to the City of Swartz Creek and Overall Cost

US Department of Transportation Policy Guidance Concerning Recipients' Responsibilities to Limited English Proficient (LEP) Persons published in the Federal Register: December 14, 2005 (Volume 70, Number 239) states:

"Certain DOT recipients, such as those serving very few LEP persons or those with very limited resources, may choose not to develop a written LEP plan."

The City of Swartz Creek does serve very few LEP persons and has very limited resources; therefore it has decided to include a LEP section in its Title VI Plan in order to comply with the Executive Order.

#### Safe Harbor Stipulation

Federal law provides a "Safe Harbor" situation so that recipients can ensure with greater certainty that they comply with their obligation to provide written translations in languages other than English. A "Safe Harbor" means that if a recipient provides written translation in certain circumstances, such action will be considered strong evidence of compliance with the recipient's written-translation obligations under Title VI.

The failure to provide written translations under the circumstances does not mean there is non-compliance, but rather provides a guide for recipients that would like greater certainty of compliance than can be provided by a fact-intensive, four factor analysis. For example, even if a Safe Harbor is not used, if written translation of a certain document(s) would be so burdensome as to defeat the legitimate objectives of its program, it is not necessary. Other ways of providing meaningful access, such as effective oral interpretation of certain vital documents, might be acceptable under such circumstances.

Strong evidence of compliance with the recipient's written translation obligations under "Safe Harbor" includes providing written translations of vital documents for each eligible LEP language group that constitutes 5% or 1,000, whichever is less,

of the population of persons eligible to be served or likely to be affected or encountered. Translation of other documents, if needed, can be provided orally.

This "Safe Harbor" provision applies to the translation of written documents only. It does not affect the requirement to provide meaningful access to LEP individuals through competent oral interpreters where oral language services are needed and are reasonable.

Given the small number of LEP language group members, the City of Swartz Creek budget and number of staff, it is deemed that written translations of vital documents would be so burdensome as to defeat the legitimate objectives of our programs. It is more appropriate for the City of Swartz Creek to proceed with oral interpretation options for compliance with LEP regulations.

#### **Providing Notice to LEP Persons**

#### USDOT LEP guidance says:

Once an agency has decided, based on the four factors, that it will provide language service, it is important that the recipient notify LEP persons of services available free of charge. Recipients should provide this notice in languages LEP persons would understand.

The guidance provides several examples of notification including:

- 1. Signage in languages that an LEP individual would understand when free language assistance is available with advance notice.
- 2. Stating in outreach documents that free language services are available from the agency.
- 3. Working with community-based organizations and other stakeholders to inform LEP individuals of the recipient's services, including the availability of language assistance services.

Statements in languages that an LEP individual would understand will be placed in public information and public notices informing LEP individuals that person's requiring language assistance and/or special accommodations will be provided the requested service free of charge, with reasonable advance notice to the City of Swartz Creek.

#### **Options and Proposed Actions**

#### **Options:**

Federal fund recipients have two (2) main ways to provide language services: oral interpretation either in person or via telephone interpretation service and written translation. The correct mix should be based on what is both necessary and reasonable in light of the four-factor analysis.<sup>iii</sup>

The City of Swartz Creek is defining an interpreter as a person who translates spoken language orally, as opposed to a translator, who translates written language and transfers the meaning of written text from one language into another. The person who translates orally is not a translator, but an interpreter.<sup>iv</sup>

Considering the relatively small size of the City of Swartz Creek, the small number of LEP individuals in the service area, and limited financial resources, it is necessary to limit language aid to the most basic and cost-effective services.

#### What the City of Swartz Creek will do. What actions will the City of Swartz Creek take?

- Notify the public that interpreter services are available upon request, with seven day advance notice.
- With advance notice of seven calendar days, the City will provide interpreter services at public meetings, including language translation and signage for the hearing impaired.
- The City will utilize the *Translators Resource List* as provided by MDOT for translation services and verbal interpretation.
- The Census Bureau "I-speak" Language Identification Card will be distributed to all employees that may potentially encounter LEP individuals.

- Once the LEP individual's language has been identified, an agency from the *Translators Resource List* will be contacted to provide interpretation services.
- Publications of the city's complaint form will be made available online and upon request.
- In the event that a City employee encounters an LEP individual, they will follow the procedure listed below:

#### OFFICE ENCOUNTER

- 1. Provide an I-speak language identification card to determine the language spoken of the LEP individual.
- 2. Once the foreign language is determined, provide information to Title VI coordinator who will contact an interpreter from MDOT's *Translators Resource List*.
- 3. If the need is for a document to be translated, the Title VI coordinator may elect to have the document translated and provided to the requestor.

#### ROAD ENCOUNTER

- 1. Road crew employees will immediately contact the Title VI coordinator for assistance, and provide an I-speak language identification card to the LEP individual to determine the language spoken of the individual.
- 2. Once the foreign language is determined, provide information to Title VI coordinator who will contact an interpreter from MDOT's *Translators Resource List* to provide telephonic interpretation.
- 3. If the need is for a document to be translated, the Title VI coordinator will have the document translated and provided to the requestor as soon as possible.

#### IN WRITING

- 1. Once a letter has been received it will be immediately forwarded to the Title VI Coordinator.
- 2. The Title VI Coordinator will contact an translator from the MDOT's *Translators Resource List* to determine the specifics of the letter request information.
- 3. The Title VI Coordinator will work with the selected agency to provide the requested service to the individual in a timely manner.

#### OVER THE PHONE

- 1. If someone calls into our office speaking another language every attempt will be made to keep that individual on the line until an interpreter can be conferenced into the line and if possible determine the language spoken of the caller.
- 2. Once the language spoken by the caller has been identified, we will proceed with providing the requested assistance to the LEP individual.

#### The City of Swartz Creek's Staff Training

The City of Swartz Creek's Staff will be provided training on the requirements for providing meaningful access to services for LEP persons.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE**

Compliance with Title VI includes ensuring that no minority or low income population suffers "disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effect" due to any "programs, policies and activities" undertaken by any agency receiving federal funds. This obligation will be met by the City in the following ways:

- When planning specific programs or projects, identifying those populations that will be affected by a given program or project.
- If a disproportionate effect is anticipated, following mitigation procedures.
- If mitigation options do not sufficiently eliminate the disproportionate effect, discussing and, if necessary, implementing reasonable alternatives.

Disproportionate effects are those effects which are appreciably more severe for one group or predominantly borne by a single group. The City will use U.S. Census data to identify low income and minority populations.

Where a project impacts a small number or area of low income or minority populations, the City will document that:

- Other reasonable alternatives were evaluated and were eliminated for reasons such as the alternatives impacted a far greater number of people or did greater harm to the environment; etc.
- The project's impact is unavoidable;
- The benefits of the project far out-weigh the overall impacts; and
- Mitigation measures are being taken to reduce the harm to low income or minority populations.

If it is concluded that no minority and/or low income population groups are present in the project area, the City of Swartz Creek will document how the conclusion was reached. If it is determined that one or more of these population groups are present in the area, the City will administer potential disproportionate effects test.

The following steps will be taken to assess the impact of projects on minority and/or low income population groups:

STEP ONE: Determine if a minority or low income population is present within the project area. If the conclusion is that no minority and/or low income population is present within the project area, document how the conclusion was reached. If the conclusion is that there are minority populations and/or low income population groups present, proceed to Step Two.

STEP TWO: Determine whether project impacts associated with the identified low income and minority populations are disproportionately high and adverse. In doing so, refer to the list of potential impacts and questions contained in Appendix E. If it is determined that there are disproportionately high and adverse impacts to minority and low income populations, proceed to Step Three.

STEP THREE: Propose measures that will avoid, minimize and/or mitigate disproportionately high and disproportionate adverse impacts and provide offsetting benefits and opportunities to enhance communities, neighborhoods and individuals affected by proposed project.

STEP FOUR: If after mitigation, enhancements and off setting benefits to the affected populations, there remains a high and disproportionate adverse impact to minority or low income populations, then the following questions must be considered:

<u>Question 1</u>: Are there further mitigation measures that could be employed to avoid or reduce the adverse effect to the minority or low income population?

**Question 2:** Are there other additional alternatives to the proposed action that would avoid or reduce the impacts to the low income or minority populations?

**Question 3:** Considering the overall public interest, is there a substantial need for the project?

<u>Question 4</u>: Will the alternatives that would satisfy the need for the project and have less impact on protected populations (a) have other social economic or environmental impacts that are more severe than those of the proposed action (b) have increased costs of extraordinary magnitude?

STEP FIVE: Include all findings, determinations or demonstrations in the environmental document prepared for the project.

#### FILING A TITLE VI COMPLAINT

#### I. Introduction

The Title VI complaint procedures are intended to provide aggrieved persons an avenue to raise complaints of discrimination regarding the City programs, activities, and services as required by statute.

#### II. Purpose

The purpose of the discrimination complaint procedures is to describe the process used by the City for processing complaints of discrimination under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and related statutes.

#### III. Roles and Responsibilities

The Title VI Coordinator has overall responsibility for the discrimination complaint process and procedures. The Title VI Coordinator may, at his/her discretion assign a capable person to investigate the complaint.

The designated investigator will conduct an impartial and objective investigation, collect factual information and prepare a fact-finding report based upon information obtained from the investigation.

#### IV. Filing a Complaint

The complainant shall make himself/herself reasonably available to the designated investigator, to ensure completion of the investigation within the timeframes set forth.

<u>Applicability</u>: The complaint procedures apply to the beneficiaries of the City programs, activities, and services; including but not limited to: the public, contractors, sub-contractors, consultants, and other sub-recipients of federal and state funds.

<u>Eligibility</u>: Any person who believes that he/she has been excluded from participation in, denied benefits or services of any program or activity administered by the City or its sub-recipients, consultants, and contractors on the basis of race, color, national origin (including Limited English Proficiency), sex, age or disability may bring forth a complaint of discrimination under Title VI.

<u>Time Limitation on Filing Complaints</u>: Title VI complaints may be filed with the Title VI Coordinator's office. In all situations, the employees of the City must contact the Title VI Coordinator immediately upon receipt of Title VI related complaints.

Complaints must be filed within 180 days of the alleged discrimination. If the complainant could not reasonably be expected to know that the act was discriminatory within the 180 day period, he/she will have 60 additional days after becoming aware of the illegal discrimination to file the complaint.

Complaints must be in writing, and must be signed by the complainant and/or the complainant's representative. The complaint must set forth as fully as possible the facts and circumstances surrounding the claimed discrimination. In cases where the complainant is unable or incapable of providing a written statement, the complainant will be assisted in converting the verbal complaint into a written complaint. All complaints, however, must be signed by the complainant and/or by the complainant's representative.

<u>Items that should not be considered a formal complaint</u>: (unless the items contain a signed cover letter specifically alleging a violation of Title VI) include but are not limited to:

- 1. An anonymous complaint that is too vague to obtain required information
- 2. Inquiries seeking advice or information
- 3. Courtesy copies of court pleadings
- 4. Newspaper articles
- 5. Courtesy copies of internal grievances

#### V. Investigation

<u>Investigation Plan</u>: The investigator shall prepare a written plan, which includes, but is not limited to the following:

- Names of the complainant(s) and respondent(s)
- Basis for complaint
- Issues, events or circumstances that caused the person to believe that he/she has been discriminated against

- Information needed to address the issue
- Criteria, sources necessary to obtain the information
- Identification of key people
- Estimated investigation time line
- Remedy sought by the complainant(s)

#### **Conducting the Investigation:**

- The investigation will address only those issues relevant to the allegations in the complaint.
- Confidentiality will be maintained as much as possible.
- Interviews will be conducted to obtain facts and evidence regarding the allegations in the complaint. The investigator will ask questions to elicit information about aspects of the case.
- A chronological contact sheet is maintained in the case file throughout the investigation.
- If a Title VI complaint is received on a MDOT related contract against the City of Swartz Creek, MDOT will be responsible for conducting the investigation of the complaint. Upon receipt of a Title VI complaint filed against the City of Swartz Creek, the complaint and any pertinent information should immediately be forwarded to the MDOT, Civil Rights Program Unit.

#### **Investigation Reporting Process:**

- Complaints made against a City of Swartz Creek's sub-recipient should be investigated by the City, following the internal complaint process.
- Within 40 days of receiving the complaint, the investigator shall prepare an investigative report and submit the report and supporting documentation to the office of the City Manager, Paul Bueche, for review.
- The City Manager shall review the file and investigative report. Subsequent to the review, the City Manager shall makes a determination of "probable cause" or "no probable cause" and prepare a decision letter.

#### **Retaliation**:

Laws enforced by the City prohibit retaliation or intimidation against anyone because an individual has either taken action or participated in action to secure rights protected by such laws. #### Reporting Requirements to an External Agency

A copy of the complaint, together with a copy of the investigation report and final decision letter will be forwarded to the MDOT, Civil Rights Program Unit within 60 days of the date the complaint was received.

#### Records

All records and investigative working files are maintained in a confidential area. Records are kept for three years.

#### APPENDIX A - [TO BE INSERTED IN ALL FEDERAL-AID CONTRACTS]

During the performance of this contract, the contractor, for itself, its assignees and successors, in interest (hereinafter referred to as the "contractor") agrees, as follows:

1. <u>Compliance with Regulations</u>: The contractor shall comply with Regulations relative to nondiscrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the Department of Transportation, Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21, as they may be amended from time to time (hereinafter referred to as the Regulations), which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this contract.

- 2. **Nondiscrimination:** The contractor, with regard to the work performed by it during the contract, shall not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, sex, or national origin in the selection, retention, and treatment of subcontractors, including procurements of materials in the discrimination prohibited by Section 21.5 of the Regulation, including employment practices when the contractor covers a program set for in Appendix B of the Regulations.
- 3. <u>Solicitation for Subcontracts, Including Procurements of Materials and Equipment:</u> In all solicitations either by competitive bidding or negotiation made by the contractor for work to be performed under a subcontract, including procurements of materials or leases of equipment, each potential subcontractor or supplier shall be notified by the contractor of the contractor's obligations under the contract and the Regulations relative to nondiscrimination on the grounds of race, color, or national origin.
- 4. <u>Information and Reports:</u> The contractor shall provide all information and reports required by the Regulations, or directives issues pursuant thereto, and shall permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as may be determined by the State Highway Department of the Federal Highway Administration to be pertinent to ascertain compliance with such Regulations or directives. Where any information required of a contractor is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information, the contractor shall so certify to the State Highway Department or the Federal Highway Administration, as appropriate, and shall set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.
- 5. <u>Sanctions for Noncompliance</u>: In the event the contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of this contract, the State Highway Department shall impose such contract sanctions as it or the Federal Highway Administration may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
  - a. Withholding payments to the contractor under the contract until the contractor complies and/or
  - b. Cancellation, termination or suspension of the contract, in whole or in part.
- 6. <u>Incorporation of Provisions</u>: The contractor shall include provisions of paragraphs (1) through (6) in every subcontract, including procurement of material and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the Regulations, or directives issued pursuant thereto. The contractor shall take such action with respect to any subcontract or procurement as the State Highway Department or the Federal Highway Administration may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance: provided, however, that, in the event a contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or supplier as a result of such direction, the contractor may request the State Highway Department to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the State, and, in addition, the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

#### APPENDIX B - TRANSFER OF PROPERTY

The following clauses shall be included in any and all deeds effecting or recording the transfer of real property, structures or improvements thereon, or interest therein from the United States.

#### (GRANTING CLAUSE)

NOW THEREFORE, the Department of Transportation, as authorized by law, and upon the condition that the State of Michigan, will accept title to the lands and maintain the project constructed thereon, in accordance with Title 23, United States Code, the Regulations for the Administration of the Department of Transportation and, also in accordance with and in compliance with all requirements imposed by or pursuant to Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Nondiscrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the Department of Transportation (hereinafter referred to as the Regulations) pertaining to and effectuating the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252; 42 U.S.C. 2000d to 2000d-4) does hereby remise, release, quitclaim and convey unto the State of Michigan all the right, title and interest of the Department of Transportation in and to said lands described Exhibit "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof.

#### (HABENDUM CLAUSE)\*

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD said lands and interests therein unto the State of Michigan, and its successors forever, subject, however, the covenant, conditions, restrictions and reservations herein contained as follows, which will remain in effect for the period during which the real property or structures are used for a purpose for which Federal financial assistance is extended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits and shall be binding on the State of Michigan, its successors and assigns.

The State of Michigan, in consideration of the conveyance of said lands and interests in lands, does hereby covenant and agree as a covenant running with the land for itself, its successors and assigns, that (1) no person shall on the grounds of race, color, national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination with regard to any facility located wholly or in part, on, over, or under such lands hereby conveyed (,) (and)\*(2) that the State of Michigan shall use the lands and interests in lands so conveyed, in compliance with all requirements imposed by or pursuant to Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Nondiscrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the Department of Transportation – Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and as said Regulations may be amended (,) and (3) that in the event of breach of any of the above-mentioned nondiscrimination conditions, the Department shall have a right to re-enter said lands and facilities on said land, and the above described land and facilities shall thereon revert to and vest in and become the absolute property of the Department of Transportation and its assigns as such interest existed prior to this deed.

\*Reverter clause and related language to be used only when it is determined that such a clause is necessary in order to effectuate the purpose of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

#### APPENDIX C - PERMITS, LEASES AND LICENSES

The following clauses shall be included in all deeds, licenses, leases, permits, or similar instruments entered into by the Michigan Department of Transportation, pursuant to the provisions of Assurance 7(a).

The grantee, licensee, lessee, permittee, etc., (as appropriate) for himself, his heirs, personal representative, successors in interest, and assigns, as a part of the consideration hereof, does hereby covenant and agree (in the case of deeds and leases, add, "as a covenant running with the land") that in the event facilities are constructed, maintained, or otherwise operated on the said property described in this (deed, license, lease, permit, etc.) for a purpose for which a Department of Transportation program or activity is extended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits, the (grantee, licensee, lessee, permittee, etc.) shall remain and operate such facilities and services in compliance with all other requirements imposed pursuant to Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Nondiscrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the Department of Transportation — Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and as said Regulations may be amended.

(Include in licenses, leases, permits, etc.)\*

That in the event of breach of any of the above nondiscrimination covenants, the Michigan Department of Transportation shall have the right to terminate the license, lease, permit, etc., and to re-enter and repossess said land and the facilities thereon, and hold the same as if said license, lease, permit, etc., had never been made or issued.

(Include in deeds)\*

That in the event of breach of any of the above nondiscrimination covenants, the Michigan Department of Transportation shall have the right to re-enter lands and facilities hereon, and the above described lands and facilities shall thereupon revert to and vest in and become the absolute property of the State of Michigan Department of Transportation and its assigns.

\*Reverter clause and related language to be used only when it is determined that such a clause is necessary in order to effectuate the purpose of the Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Civil Rights Act of 1987.

#### APPENDIX E - DETERMINE/DISTINGUISH SIGNIFICANT/NON-SIGNIFICANT EFFECTS

"Significant" requires considerations of both context and intensity:

- (a) *Context*. This means that the significance of an action must be analyzed in several contexts such as society as a whole (human, nation), the affected region, the affected interests, and the locality. Significance varies with the setting of the proposed action. For instance, in the case of a site-specific action, significance would usually depend upon the effects in the local area rather than in the world as a whole. Both short-and long-term effects are relevant.
- (b) *Intensity*. This refers to the severity of impact. Responsible officials must bear in mind that more than one agency may make decisions about partial aspects of a major action. The following should be considered in evaluating intensity:
  - (1) Impacts that may be both beneficial and adverse. A significant effect may exist even if, on balance, the effect would be beneficial.

"Non-significant effect" means no substantial change to an environmental component and this no material bearing on the decision-making process.

Scientific, technical, institutional, the public's value, and the local economic conditions influence the meaning of significant effect.

If an alternative would provide a beneficial effect, then the alternative would cause no significant adverse effect. If an alternative would provide an adverse effect, the effect might be significant or the effect might be non-significant.

Determinations of "significant" and "non-significant" effects will be made by the City Manager.

- 7. A review of City facilities will be conducted in reference to compliance with the American Disabilities Act.
- 8. The following data will be collected and reviewed by the Title VI Coordinator and included, where appropriate, in the annual report submitted to MDOT.
  - a. **Boards and Commissions:** The number of vacancies; how vacancies are advertised and filled; the number of applicants; the representation of minorities will be evaluated.
  - b. **Public Meetings:** The number of open meetings; how meeting dates and times are communicated to the general public and to individuals directly affected by the meeting.
  - c. **Construction Projects:** The number of construction projects, number of minority contractors bidding and the number selected; verification that Title VI language was included in bids and contracts for each project.
  - d. **LEP Needs:** The number of requests for language assistance that were requested or required and the outcome of these requests.
  - e. **Complaints:** The number of Title VI complaints received; nature of the complaints; resolution of the complaints.
  - f. **Timeliness of Services:** The number of requests for services; amount of time from request to when service was delivered; number of requests denied.
  - g. **Right of Way/Imminent Domain:** The number of such actions and diversity of individual affected.
  - h. **Program Participants:** Racial Data of program participants where possible.

On and After September 2, 2013

Dear Ladies and Gentlemen:

The water rates as proposed by DWSD for the 2013/2014 year have been approved. Their rates will take effect on all water used on and after July 1, 2013.

The County Agency has also reviewed its rates for 2013. The new rate structure will take the County through its next five years. The rate evaluation has made adjustment to the Readiness to Serve charges for both master and individual meters.

After reviewing the DWSD rate increase, the County Agency recommended an increase of 35¢ per 100 cubic feet of water used. We have enclosed an executed rate sheet for your convenience.

The rate will become effective on all water bills issued by the County Agency after September 2, 2013. Those bills prepared before and issued on September 1 will not include the new rate. Wholesale customers' first bill would be September 10 and retail customers on October 1, 2013.

Once the rate increase is approved by each local community, our retail customers need to give us 20 day notice of rate change. If you would like your rate change to be effective October 1, we need notification by September 10. If, for example, your ordinance requires 90 day notice for rates, you must begin the process in June. As always, our office is available to assist you in adjusting your water rates to cover the increase.

SUBJECT: New Re-hab Pumper

# OBJECTIVE:

The SCAFD is requesting the City of Swartz Creek, and the Charter Township of Clayton to purchase a custom chassis fire engine-squad combination.

Currently, the SCAFD has three (3) engines quartered at two stations. The goal is to have two engines at each station to insure sufficient response from each station.

The design proposed would add one engine to the fleet, while combining the features of Squad 16 with those of a pumper, and a re-hab unit. Therefore, the fleet count would remain the same while increasing the number of pumpers available as well as providing for on scene firefighter rehabilitation, which is now a strong NFPA recommendation.

# **ADVANTAGES:**

MAINTENANCE COSTS- The newest engine in our fleet is now 14 years old with the other trucks older yet. We have had very good service with our current Pierce fleet, but, no matter how good the truck, as they get older, maintenance costs inevitably rise and sometimes substantially. Also, our squad is an old step van, not really intended for the fire service.

The department evaluation of 2007 also determined the next purchase should be a squad replacement.

ADDITIONAL PUMPER- The proposed truck would be a full Class A pumper that would provide back up capabilities for the fleet as well as upgrading the age of our fleet. Additionally, this truck could enhance our ISO rating, thereby reducing insurance costs for our citizens.

ENHANCED SQUAD CAPABILITY- As mentioned, our current squad is an older step van, not ever intended for the fire service. Its road performance for emergency responses is marginal as is its storage capability. This new truck would replace this old squad and greatly enhance our "squad" capabilities.

REHABILITATION (RE-HAB) UNIT- New NFPA standards stipulate provisions that should be provided for firefighter rehabilitation on a fire scene. These requirements become all the more important during long operations, as well as in severe weather. Fire fighting is a very physically demanding job and statistics show a high rate of fire fighter injury and even death due to the physical strain of fighting a fire. Heart attacks in those even in their 30's are not uncommon.

It is imperative that every fire department provide a means to re-hydrate their members especially in hot weather, provide for hot beverages and minimal food, as well as a place for them to cool down and/or warm up as necessary and out of the elements! This new truck will do all this.

## **KEY FEATURES:**

After working on the specifications for this proposed truck for more than three years, which has had the input of many of the fire department's members, a list of features has been developed to provide a vehicle that will accomplish the objectives.

FIRE FIGHTING- This pumper will be designed with all the required features such as 1,500 gallon per minute pump, a 750 gallon water tank, pre-connected hose lines and compartment space to provide for all the equipment a pumper must have on board today.

SQUAD FUNCTIONS- The truck will provide a cascade system that will refill our self contained breathing bottles on the scene, as well as provide storage for additional bottles. It will provide space for additional firefighting equipment. It will provide an extendable light tower needed to illuminate dark scenes for both fire and rescue operations.

REHABILITATION- The truck will have an 8 person cab, large enough for that number of fire fighters to get out of the elements during inclement weather as well as provide space for traveling to emergency scenes. The cab will have enough electrical power to re-charge our necessary hand held lights, hand held radios and our computer.

Further, the truck will be equipped with an awning to provide shade and protection from rain while refilling air bottles or using the other re-hab equipment. That equipment will include a small refrigerator to keep our bottled water cool, a coffee maker and possibly even a small microwave. All necessary for prolonged emergency scene incidents.

As you can see, this is a very multi functional vehicle. It's literally like getting three separate vehicles in one.

# SPECIFICATIONS:

The specifications proposed are based on a Pierce model called the PUC (Pierce Ultimate Configuration). The SCAFD has had a long history of using Pierce fire apparatus and have experienced excellent service from these trucks. It must be remembered, not all fire truck makes provide the same long, reliable service that our Pierces have given us.

The PUC model lends itself perfectly to our intended use of combining three trucks into one. It provides the space we need in the body, the seating and roominess in the cab required and is operationally, very easy to use, an important consideration with paid on call members such as ours.

It also provides numerous other features that lend it ideally to our intended mission.

Some of the key specifications are as follows;

CAB- A 100" cab with full seating for 8 firefighters to provide room for safe accommodation while responding to calls and for rehabilitation while on scene. Also, a design that is very safe and built to protect the occupants in the event of an accident. Electrical power is available to operate the various radios, hand held lights and the on board computer.

SAFETY- The truck will feature front and side airbags for crash protection as well as anti-lock brakes, traction control and stability control to avoid accidents in the first place.

HEAVY DUTY FRAME- The frame will be the strongest available on a fire truck so as to insure not only enough strength to support the load of this truck, but, also to assure a life span of upwards of 25 years while minimizing maintenance or costly refurbishment later in life.

INDEPENDENT TORSION BAR FRONT SUSPENSION- This feature provides substantially improved road holding, especially on two lane crowned roads, better directional control and improved stopping by as much as 35% over conventional fire truck beam front axles.

VERTICAL EXHAUST- This keeps the heat and contaminants of the exhaust away from those working around the truck, and, is especially important while refilling SCBA bottles on scene.

COMPARTMENT SPACE- Enough to carry all the firefighting equipment a pumper needs, extra equipment normally carried on our squad as well as the re-hab equipment needed. This body configuration also provides space for our breathing air bottle refill station and the storage bottles necessary for this equipment. Room for future needs will still be available.

POWER TAKE OFF PUMP- This way of powering the fire pump provides the easiest way to engage or disengage the pump while eliminating the chance of damaging the traditional drive mechanism. It also provides for compactness to keep the overall size of this truck reasonable and allowing more compartment space. It is also the easiest pump for routine maintenance, or major service, thus keeping costs down. It has been proven by over 800 of these trucks in service around the country.

# **CUSTOM vs COMMERCIAL CHASSIS:**

A custom chassis fire truck is one that is designed, engineered and built from the ground up to be nothing but a fire truck! The frame, suspension, driveline configuration, pump installation and especially the cab, are all designed to work together for the purposes of fighting fires.

Commercial chassis fire trucks are those that are built on truck chassis intended for commercial applications such as a freight van, a dump truck, etc. They are NOT designed to be converted into fire trucks. Can they be? Yes. But, the modifications are extensive and the end result is a compromise. The cabs are small making it very difficult to fit equipment in them and provide adequate room for the firefighters.

The vehicles are very long since commercial chassis are all engine ahead of cab thus increasing overall length substantially making maneuvering difficult.

Commercial chassis fire trucks only save money when built on medium duty chassis with smaller engines, frames, and axles. They are not intended to provide 25 years of life. For a department like ours, 8 to 10 years would be the expectation.

Safety- commercial chassis fire trucks are not as safe. Period. Some manufacturers don't even offer disc brakes. The cabs on these trucks are not built to take the rigors of fire fighting. They don't offer the robust doors, hinges and structure of a custom fire truck.

Many line of duty deaths in the fire service are from traffic accidents responding to and returning from fire/emergency calls. The vast majority of those accidents are in commercial chassis fire trucks that don't have the road ability of custom chassis trucks, and most importantly, their cabs are not designed to withstand front, side impacts, or rollovers. Attached is a six (6) page article published in Firehouse Magazine, July 2005, that debates the commercial versus custom cab safety issues.

Please reference the study done by the Palm Coast Fire Department that indicates that commercial chassis fire trucks are not as safe as custom chassis trucks. It is available at <a href="https://www.usfa.fema.gov/pdf/efop/efo38580.pdf">www.usfa.fema.gov/pdf/efop/efo38580.pdf</a> (copy and paste link to browser), starting on page 19.

Therefore, with municipal approval, a specification will be sent to qualified vendors for a design based on the Pierce PUC. There are other manufacturers that now build a version of the PUC although each manufacturer has their own specification dealing with details and their interpretations of these multi functional fire trucks.

The potential price for this new truck would be approximately \$570,000, plus loose equipment that is not provided with the truck. We are hopeful the final total amount will be below \$650,000.

Financing options for five (5) or seven (7) years have already been provided.

# EMERGENCY VEHICLE OPERATIONS CUSTOM VS. COMMERCIAL

I receive many questions via email and phone and one of the most frequently asked questions do we buy a custom fire truck chassis or a commercial fire truck chassis. Why you might ask is this under the Emergency Vehicle column heading and not the Apparatus Architect? Although everything that I write and lecture about has one goal in mind and that is firefighter safety it seemed to fit best here. The whole intent of this column is to promote firefighter safety, save lives and to reduce on the job injuries.

With all the great work that is being done by the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation, the Federal Government the Unions, manufactures and other fire service organizations to reduce the firefighter line of duty death rate, the fact is that at the present rate, by years end over 140 firefighters will have died in the line of duty. We have averaged around 100 line of duty deaths per year over the past

decade. The increase in the number of line of duty deaths, so far this year is truly alarming.

Today's fire apparatus represent the biggest financial investment for most fire departments and municipalities. So as the cost of fire apparatus continues to increase municipalities and fire departments continue to struggle with the need to balance the purchase of safe, cost affective fire apparatus at the same time needing to be mindful of budget constraints.

Generally custom apparatus cost anywhere from \$20,000.00 - \$40,000.00 more than commercial chassis apparatus depending on options. What are Custom chassis apparatus? Why would you pay a \$40,000.00 premium for a Custom apparatus? Custom apparatus are also referred to at times as cab forward apparatus as the cab is forward of the engine. You can buy custom chassis apparatus from all major apparatus manufactures for example Pierce, Emergency One, Seagrave, KME, Suphten, Ferrera, Crimson, American LaFrance, just to name a few.

Commercial chassis are also called, at times engine forward apparatus. Commercial chassis are those that were manufactured by

Freightliner, Navistar/International, Sterling, GMC, Mack, Peterbilt, Kenworth, White/Volvo, just to name a few.

I have been fortunate, thanks to many of you, to have amassed thousands of pictures of wrecked fire trucks. Each of the pictures tell the same story. If you are in a custom chassis apparatus and you roll the apparatus completely over, with your seatbelt on, short of hitting a fixed object like a tree or bridge abutment, you can generally unbuckle and in many cases walk away. If you are in a commercial chassis apparatus and you roll the apparatus over the roof will generally end up even with the dash board. On commercial chassis due to the design and construction of the roof posts, the "A" post tends to bend or roll during impact, causing the roof to shift in the direction opposite of the impact. During rollover the a and b posts actually roll with the vehicle as pictured in Photo #1. Generally commercial cab apparatus are not designed to support the weight of the roof. Why do custom apparatus tend to with- stand the affects of rollover so much better than their commercial counter parts? Fully enclosed four door cab apparatus are generally constructed of aluminum or stainless steel tubing in the roof area to support the weight of the roof, and any attended equipment. In addition the material thickness and design of the A post at the

windshield and the other supporting cab side walls are generally designed of heavier material with additional interior support to provide protection for the crew. Also many custom apparatus manufacturers have done some form of crash testing on their cabs. Some custom chassis manufactures actually offer some kind of airbag rollover protection packages for their chassis. This in conjunction with crash testing and rollover protection generally provides superior protection for the personnel riding inside of the cab.

I have two case studies that show the stark difference. The first occurred in Alabama where firefighters were responding to a brush fire when their commercial apparatus rolled over rounding a curve. A female firefighter was crushed and trapped in the cab for a couple of hours she died even though she had her seatbelt on. In the second case study Phoenix Engine 37 was responding to a medical call when a car in an opposing lane locked the brakes up and the driver turned the wheel while in the skid. When the civilian driver let off on the brakes the car steered right in front of Engine 37. Engine 37 was nearly knocked into a utility pole, the driver of the apparatus due to excellent driving skills, was able to avoid a direct hit of the pole. As he swerved to avoid the pole Engine 37 then went across the road end up into a fence and rolled

over a couple of times. The back end of the apparatus was totally destroyed, however the cab stayed in tact. The only intrusion into the cab was that the front windshield popped out (Photo # 1). All on board Engine 37 were wearing seatbelts. The crew of Engine 37 were all able to unbuckle and walk away, while the most serious injury was a shoulder separation.

This is not to say that every incident will result in the same results, however two important facts cannot be understated. First, a comprehensive driver training and re-qualification program will help insure that the department's drivers have been given the appropriate level of training for the important tasks that they undertake every time they get behind the wheel of an emergency vehicle. Secondly, making sure that each department specifies that needed and required safety devices on every piece of apparatus and having enforceable SOG's that require all personnel to be seated and belted will help to insure that "Everyone goes Home" from every run.

# Paul,

With the way things have gone and are going, I don't see how I can accurately predict the purchase of apparatus for the future, with any certainty.

I have recalculated what it would cost both municipalities to finance a new unit for 5 and 7 years. The spread sheets are attached.

It has been my goal to provide 2 engines at each station, which the proposed purchase would accomplish.

Since we have been purchasing quality built apparatus, I believe, we will be able to refurbish existing apparatus, provided they remain sound in the future. Given this, the condition of the current apparatus, at the time, will determine refurbishing dates.

Below is what I presented at the Fireboard meeting last night, after receiving information that prevented it from being included in the regular packet:

As of April 15, 2013, the approximate cost of the new apparatus, minus loose equipment, is \$570,000.00. The loose equipment estimate is

\$63,000.00 resulting in an approximate total of \$633,000.00. This amount, minus the current CIFP balance would bring the total to \$521,785.00. If financed for 5 years, the amount per municipality would equal \$52,178.50 annually plus interest. If financed for 7 years, \$37,270.00 annually, plus interest.

The Fireboard meeting last night directed Mike Messer to contact both municipalities to try and schedule a join meeting to discuss this new apparatus. I suspect Mike will be contact you soon.

- 3. Parade organizers must provide a means of direct communication between the event coordinator and the Chief of Police (or his designate) during the course of the parade in order to address any. dangerous conditions that may develop during the course of the event.
- 4. The practice of parade participants jumping onto or off of moving vehicles in the parade is prohibited.
- 5. When determining the staging area for parade participants, organizers should ensure that the area is sufficient in size to accommodate all entries without creating traffic or pedestrian hazards.

It is the responsibility of the event coordinator(s) to ensure that all parade participants are made aware of the regulations that directly affect them and by signing this document herby acknowledge that they have received a copy of these regulations and accept said responsibility.

**SUBJECT:** Tax Reverted Property

MCL211.78m directs that all parcels foreclosed by a County Treasurer's Office (foreclosing governmental unit) are available to be purchased by the State of Michigan, City, Village, Township or County in which they are located. The acquisition must be made prior to the foreclosed parcels being taken to public auction.

Sec 78m (1) is excerpted below:

Sec. 78m.

(1) Not later than the first Tuesday in July, immediately succeeding the entry of judgment under section 78k vesting absolute title to tax delinquent property in the foreclosing governmental unit, this state is granted the right of first refusal to purchase property at the greater of the minimum bid or its fair market value by paying that amount to the foreclosing governmental unit if the foreclosing governmental unit is not this state. If this state elects not to purchase the property under its right of first refusal, a city, village, or township may purchase for a public purpose any property located within that city, village, or township set forth in the judgment and subject to sale under this section by payment to the foreclosing governmental unit of the minimum bid. If a city, village, or township does not purchase that property, the county in which that property is located may purchase that property under this section by payment to the foreclosing governmental unit of the minimum bid. If property is purchased by a city, village, township, or county under this subsection, the foreclosing governmental unit shall convey the property to the purchasing city, village, township, or county within 30 days.

Please find attached a list of foreclosed properties in your governmental unit that are available for purchase for the minimum bid. Note that a few foreclosures might be reversed, as allowed by law.

If you are interested in acquiring any of the parcels in your unit, contact Carla Vandefifer and the agreement that must be signed will be forwarded.

The deadline to acquire property from the 2013 foreclosures is July 12, 2013.







The home must be owner occupied and located in Genesee County, but **outside** the Village of Lennon, and the cities of Flint, Clio, Davison, and Flushing. Property taxes must be current, mortgage payments must be current, and the home must be covered by homeowner's insurance. Homes must be single family structures on their own property. Total household income must be within 80% of Genesee County Median Income Limits. Presently, the median income for Genesee County is \$52,100.00. Income amounts are adjusted based on family size. For example, a family of four cannot have more than \$44,400.00 in family income.

The HIP operates a program for senior citizens, age 62 and over, in which the loan is forgiven if the homeowner remains in the home for five years. For citizens under age 62, the program requires a percentage of what is spent to be paid back at some point in time. The percentage of what is paid back is based on family income.
