OLD / ROUTINE BUSINESS - REVISITED ISSUES / PROJECTS

✓ **GOLF COURSE TAX APPEAL** (No Change of Status)

At the request of the owner's legal representative, I ordered the city attorney to send the owner a request to remove themselves from the appeal that was filed with the Michigan Tax Tribunal. Since the previous owner has no horse left in the race, this should make this entire problem go away. However, until we have notice that they have officially withdrawn, we must assume they intend to see the appeal through.

✓ RACEWAY TAX APPEAL (No Change of Status)

Here is another one. The harness racing industry is struggling, but they still have 108.5 acres at a signalized intersection with I-69. Their appeal information is as follows:

2014 Taxable: \$904,200 2014 Taxable (requested): \$250,000

If the city agrees that non-residential land on Morrish Road off of I-69 is valued at less than \$4,700 per acre, assuming the improvements had no value, then we have very large problems indeed. (Note that we would assume no such thing in any case).

Like the golf course, this property keeps appealing. I believe such businesses will do so, beyond absurdity, until it is clear the city is resisting.

✓ DOWNTOWN PARKING LOTS (Update)

The Community Development Block Grant portion of the work is done but there is likely to be a delay on closing out this project due to the wait time for street lights. Two of the lights are being installed by the contractor, with the light in the Morrish Road right-of-way being installed by Consumers Energy. The CDBG fund allocation was approved by Genesee County.

✓ **STREETS** (See Individual Category)

☐ MILLER ROAD RESURFACING PROJECT (Update)

OHM is moving forward with designs for Miller Road in accordance with the council resolution. We will not hear much more about this project until bids are released in March.

In related news, the city must either separate preliminary engineering (road plans) from construction engineering (onsite supervision), or we must contract with a

separate engineering company to mitigate any conflicts that arise out of construction. This is an MDOT requirement. We have a proposed solution for this issue on this agenda.

According to the Michigan Department of Transportation. A third party mitigator needs to be provided if one engineering company is performing design and construction engineering services. MDOT indicated to us that such a firm needs to be available, but not necessarily active unless a conflict in the project arises between the designer (OHM) and the city's primary engineer (Rowe). This basically means we need to find a qualified firm to place on standby. With this information, we chose to get prices from the other three companies that were selected during the city's last qualified bidding selection process.

I have included the proposals from those companies. As you can see, HRC is estimating the lowest cost and appears quite qualified. They will be able to provide the service if needed but are otherwise on retainer for no charge at all.

An alternative solution to accepting a third party proposal is to have one company design the project (OHM) and another company perform the onsite construction engineering. If the costs for third party services were substantial (the current proposal amounts to about 0.5% of the total contract), we would be more inclined to pursue this option. However, with the costs relatively low, if there is any cost at all, we did not want to split those duties up. To do so is, in our line of reasoning, the equivalent to hiring one architect to design a custom home and another one to oversee construction. One would expect a substantial disconnect on a number of issues.

As such, we believe a third party contract is in the city's best interest and that HRC is the best option based upon the proposals.

□ LOCAL STREET PLAN (Update)

Rowe will be presenting their findings to the city council at this meeting. Once that is done, a public outreach plan can be implemented to get input on how best to proceed.

□ SCRAP TIRE GRANT (Update)

The scrap tire grant for the parking lots and part of Civic Drive is closed out. The work is 100% complete and we have already been reimbursed by the DEQ. As everyone is no doubt aware, the upside to this grant is the dramatic cost reduction (50%). The downside is that the asphalt, according to the DEQ, comes from Toledo and is hard to get. This caused tremendous delays.

The DEQ representative indicated that they are looking to build more capacity in the state. This will dramatically decrease wait times, transportation costs, and overall demand. With this in mind, we submitted a placeholder application for another round of funding. Since time is of the essence (applications were due this month), Tom and I directed the engineer to take the first year projects from the tentative street study and use them as the grant placeholder. This way, if a street levy/assessment

is approved, we can begin construction in 2015 instead of 2016 and potentially save \$500,000 in the process. The projects tentatively scheduled include:

✓ WATER – SEWER ISSUES PENDING (See Individual Category)

□ SEWER REHABILITATION PROGRAM (No Change of Status)

Liqui Force has finished relining and videotaping the sewers. We are awaiting their recommendation for future projects. At first glance, it appears that the Miller Road main that was inspected is in pretty good shape.

☐ BEAR CREEK SANITARY SEWER AGREEMENT (No Change of Status)

I have been working with Genesee County Water and Waste to find a solution for the Bear Creek subdivision that is currently on the city's system. We can remove them from the system and force them to find an alternate solution (not likely given the nature of essential services), we can negotiate a new contract for sewage collection, or we can sell a section of the Morrish Road main to GCWWS to operate and maintain as a multi-jurisdictional line. This last option has some appeal, since the city would keep the customers on that line. We are working to see which option we will look to recommend based upon the long term interests of the city.

☐ KWA (No Change of Status)

The KWA water pipeline project is currently under budget and on schedule. We should be online in 2016. The bad news is that the Detroit water authority is hammering Genesee County for the last two years of system use in terms of rates, as well as any potential for a system backup after the KWA is online. Rates have been set, and they are unpleasant. I expect to have a new rate proposal for the city council at the next meeting for both water and sewer so that these increases do not empty the fund balance for water and sewer. It is likely that we will lose money for a quarter or two before new rates can be implemented, but both funds should be able to accommodate that loss so that the burden is lessened on the system users.

□ STORM SEWER (No Change of Status)

We have two ordinances included in this week's packet for preliminary review by council members. These are required by the state Department of Environmental Quality via the Genesee County Drain Commission. Like similar ordinances in the past related to industrial pretreatment, there is not much wiggle room here. However, going over the ordinances, I do not feel there is anything unreasonable in the requirements to permit storm water improvements and enforce illicit discharges. Tom has been working with staff from the state and GCDC for months on these. I believe we can adopt them as is, repealing our own storm water ordinance, without compromising our police powers or public safety.

■ WATER LOSS (No Change of Status)


I have been taking a look at the city's water loss with staff. Water loss refers to the water that is purchased wholesale from the county but never sold to an end user/customer from the city. This is water that is lost to water main breaks, undetected leaks, theft, faulty meters, and hydrant use/flushing. Most water systems function with 10-12% water loss, and this is an accepted industry standard. I have concerns that our water loss is climbing to unacceptable levels.

To illustrate what our concerns are, I have created some figures. Table 1 shows the quarterly purchases from the county compared to the retails sales. The separation between the two lines is our water loss. This gap should be as small as possible. A large gap indicates a problem. As you can see, the gap is tremendous during two quarters in 2011. I am told there were a series of large water main breaks during this time. However, what we are really looking for here are three trends that indicate more systemic problems: 1. Upward trending purchases 2. Downward trending sales, 3. A widening of the gap between the two over time.





Based upon this chart and the accompanying water loss percentage chart (Table 2), the city is trending in the right direction. Though water loss is numerically high on

average, one can deduce that it is largely due to the two quarters of main breaks, with the trend line indicated a return to the acceptable range.



With that in mind, I removed those two high quarters and took a look at the data without those outlying events. What we found is still disturbing. The new data indicate that purchases are stable over time, but sales are slightly decreasing. This is evidenced by the trend line (linear regression) on Table 4. What we see here is a classic rise from acceptable levels around 12% in 2010 to near 16% in 2014. There is a problem. Financially, this can be quite impactful. If water loss approaches 20%, the city may be losing well over \$75,000 annually beyond acceptable standards.





What is likely causing the loss? Causes for water loss were listed above, and I suspect all of them are at play in our community. However, what is causing the gradual increase? It is unlikely that system-wide theft is the issue. Though bills have been going up all over south east Michigan and theft may be more likely, I would expect this trend to be observable in other communities if it were a large scale problem. That does not appear to be the case.

Could it be one or more leaks? Maybe, but such leaks are typically accounted for in the 10% water loss figure. A large leak or set of leaks is usually apparent. However, underground leaks near the creek or a sewer outlet can go unnoticed because the water can drain right into an outlet without coming to the surface. We have visually inspected storm water outfalls into the creek and other problem areas and continue to be on the lookout. Nothing unusual has been observed. Leak detection of a more sophisticated nature is possible by contracted service, however, this option is expensive so we are holding off until other avenues are eliminated.

Hydrant flushing and fire department use? Though this water certainly goes unmetered, there are no known changes in practices that would indicate more water loss. Just to be safe, we intend to meter usage at the fire department to gauge how much water is used for training and other purposes.

Faulty meters? This is where we are focusing our efforts. The city is billed water at incoming meters on east Miller, north Elms, and north Morrish Roads. Outgoing water is then deducted from our wholesale purchases on Hill and Miller Roads on the west end. If the incoming meters are reading high, this would be a problem. However, this is unlikely based on meter technology and the stability of our water purchases. Could the outgoing meters be reading low? It's possible, and we are working with the county to test all meters. In addition to auditing large accounts for

billing irregularities, we are also replacing and/or testing meters on our large users (GM, schools, & large retailers).

General Motors water usage has dropped much over the years. This was expected due to the massive reduction in occupancy (office), industrial efficiencies, and the overall workforce changes. For that reason, the reduction was not raising a red flag. However, the meter is old and they are our largest user. It is possible that a failing meter could account for a few percentage points of water loss city wide.

We will continue to monitor water loss and look into its causes. If we are not successful, we may need to seek outside assistance to begin a leak detection program. I will keep the council informed.

*Note that water loss figures will appear to fluctuate even under ideal circumstances based upon the timing of the meter reads by the county and city. That is why the trend line is viewed as a more suitable measure than the most current water loss figure.

✓ PERSONNEL: POLICIES & PROCEDURES (No Change of Status)

I have taken some best practice polices from our own collection and from across the state and have created a working document. I will need time to compare this against our collective bargaining agreements, the desires of department heads, and our legal counsel.

✓ CITY PROPERTY, 4438 MORRISH & 5017 THIRD STREET (No Change of Status)

The demolition of the Morrish Road house and the Third Street house are complete.

There are no issues or irregularities to report.

✓ SHARED SERVICES, POLICE DEPARTMENTS (Update)

The city is moving forward with studying merger options. In the meantime, we will be working under an agreement with Mundy Township to provide the city with an employee to oversee the chief duties of the city.

Mundy Township is creating a temporary position to study merger options and is extending an offer to our own retiring Chief Clolinger. While employed with Mundy, we intend to pay the township to have Clolinger provide part time (half time) police chief services in the city. This will be done for a cost of \$37,500 annually. In the meantime, Lieutenant Bade will be working more day hours to supplement the administrative service. This will allow him to learn from the Chief to better prepare him for succession to that position, should it be necessary.

In practice, not much will change for us when this goes into effect in November except that Mr. Bade will be learning the ropes of the administration and Chief Clolinger's hours will be limited. Otherwise, we can expect our service to remain the same. The oversight of the department will be under Chief Clolinger, who will in turn answer to the city manager as required by charter. This arrangement has no impact on the policies, rules, procedures, supervision, or patrol strategies of the city.

The hope is that, within a year or so, we will know whether we are hiring/promoting a chief or moving forward with the merger. At that point, this agreement would go away in lieu of status quo chief services or a new authority.

This arrangement will be in place on November 2, 2014. The city can walk away from this agreement for any reason within 60 days.

✓ **SPRINGBROOK EAST & HERITAGE – VACANT LOTS** (No Change of Status) Following are issues pending for the three Associations:

Two units have sold already and are under construction. At some point next year, the city council should look at what to do with the funds in excess of the city's input that we are getting for these units.

I have also been in communication with the counsel of Heritage Village. On August 19th, the home owners association resolved to transfer described rights of ways, including utilities to the city. It appears that adequate surveys and language exist for the dedication, and there is also language included about storm drainage (collection system, pond system, and transmission system).

✓ **MEIJER COMMUNITY DONATION** (No Change of Status)

I am looking for a new contact at Meijer. Perhaps a recognition of their donation, along with all of the other grant and façade work is appropriate in the near future.

✓ **WINCHESTER WOODS LOTS** (No Change of Status)

I suggest we delay any sales or negotiations until a land sale policy is adopted. Prior to the last meeting, staff notified the interested parties that a sale will not be forthcoming anytime soon. They do not appear to be in a hurry and will await the council's decision.

I want to take a harder look at the development of this area. Previously, the city considered an assessment that would provide drainage, curbs, gutters, road construction, street lights and sidewalks. The price per lot was absurd. I think the goal should be to make these lots buildable for quality homes. The city could probably achieve this with less intensive ditching and surfacing of the roads, sans the underground drainage system, lights, curbs, and sidewalks. This would drastically reduce the scope of the project.

A sale of lots to an adjacent property owner could compromise the success of any special assessment for improvements and the ability to use these lots for single family homes.

✓ NEWSLETTER (*Update*)

The next newsletter is forming. Topics include the police department updates, sidewalk maintenance for the winter months, and the street rehabilitation plan. We will continue to publish our own four page newsletter independent of the tax bills.

✓ RENTAL REGISTRATION AND INSPECTIONS (Update)

Please give me any other comments you may have on this proposal. I will be working with staff and the city attorney to get this into a final form.

✓ WINSHALL PAVILION (Update)

The damaged roof was removed, and Belfor Construction finished work on the 22nd. Finally. The paperwork for final reimbursement from our insurance carrier should follow within 30 days.

✓ OTHER COMMUNICATIONS & HAPPENINGS (Update)

☐ MONTHLY REPORTS (*Update*)

The Flint Area Narcotics report is in for September.

☐ CLAYTON BARN NOTICE (Update)

A letter from Clayton Township is included in the packet. The courtesy of notice is appreciated, but I do not see any response needed from the city on this matter.

☐ ELMS PARK UPDATE (Update)

There are a number of volunteers that are continuing to do amazing things in Elms Park. The letter describes their latest efforts. When completed, we should probably look to perform some volunteer recognition.

☐ FIREBOARD PACKET (Update)

The monthly fireboard packet is included. This packet contains a tentative budget. I met with the chief and Clayton Township to go over this. While we are not thrilled that the 'loose equipment' cost was not included in the equipment purchase this last May, it appears to be necessary. If this budget gets to the city council in this form, my recommendation is to approve it with the 8.5% increase and to cover our unbudgeted share with funds that were intended for the capital equipment fund. This would be appropriate since the loose equipment is in fact part of a capital purchase.

✓ BOARDS & COMMISSIONS (See Individual Category)

□ PLANNING COMMISSION (Update)

The planning commission is awaiting a final submittal of the medical marijuana facility that is proposed for the Carriage Plaza. The Marathon site (Biggby Coffee) is working through conceptual and draft proposals, with a full submission expected in the next 60 days.

□ DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY (Update)

They will meet on November 13 to hear from an architect about possible in-fill development on the publicly owned property on Fortino and Morrish.

□ **ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS** (No Change of Status) Nothing to report.

☐ PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION (Update)

The commission intends to meet on November 5th to go over seasonal issues.

We have started working on the scope for the Elms Park Recreation Passport Grant. I will write this grant during the winter months.

Once looked at again by the city attorney, the parks and recreation commission will make recommendation on a new park ordinance and set of rules.

□ BOARD OF REVIEW (No Change of Status)

The board of review met on July 23rd. Two petitioners presented. The board also requested the appointment of an alternate member. The state encourages this for practical reasons. The first is the need to ensure the presence of at least two members out of the three appointees. The second is to begin training of potential permanent members for what is considered a specialized position.

The charter limits the board to three, but the city attorney believes that alternates are permissible as long as the acting board is not comprised of more than three members at any time. With that said, staff recommends the appointment of another qualified board member to serve as an alternate.

☐ FAIRCHILD AND MILLER INTERSECTION (Update)

At the last meeting there was a comment about the lighting at the Fairchild and Miller intersection. Mr. Svrcek looked into that issue later that week by placing a call to Consumers Energy. They indicated that this issue was raised before (I believe it may have been last summer, perhaps sooner?). Though we have not gotten any written report from them, we were told that additional lighting at that intersection would not be recommended. At this time, I don't know why that would be, whether there were practical concerns with the site or what cost-benefit metric was used. I will get the opinion of Consumers and bring back that analysis and options to the city council. As of writing this, it appears they called Miss Dig to mark out placement of a light at the northeast corner. No such move has been communicated to us. We continue to reach out to them.

Related to this, I am certain the city council is aware of a vehicle-pedestrian collision on the morning of Friday, October 17, 2014. It appears the young lady will pull through this, which is fantastic news considering the circumstances. As of writing this, the factors involved in that collision are not available to the public. Concerns abound and include lighting, distracted drivers, a general lack of awareness, speed, and so on. To what degree lighting is related to this incident at this or other intersections, I don't know. However, it is definitely a reasonable concern of the general public.

I will work with the schools, public works, and public safety to see what can be done at this intersection and others. There is no question that the darkness and weather add risk to pedestrian activities, even when lighting is present. The solution may be to prioritize the busier intersections for some sort of mitigation.

☐ SNOW REMOVAL CONTRACT (Update)

The contractor that was retained last fall for snow removal services is contracted through this winter. However, we are not able to contact them. If we do not hear from them by the end of the month we will rebid this service, as well as added sidewalk enforcement services.

NEW BUSINESS / PROJECTED ISSUES & PROJECTS

✓ MEDICAL MARIJUANA MORATORIUM (Resolution)

The planning commission considered a special land use at its October 7, 2014 regular meeting. The petition was for a medical marijuana dispensary in the commercial plaza on the west end of the city, the Carriage Plaza. Findings by staff and the commission were that the application required more detail and was not in compliance of all site plan and ordinance provisions. A vote was delayed to permit the petitioner time to amend their application. Since that time, the petition has been formally withdrawn.

In researching the most recent case law and cited legislation (HB 4271) that was used for support of the application, we have discovered that there are divided views of how the Medical Marijuana Act (MMA) is interpreted and there are significant changes proposed in the regulation of dispensaries (provisioning centers) and related facilities.

What does this mean? It means our local ordinance is not designed to handle the pending state law changes. I have attached HB 4271. A quick read informs us that this piece of legislation will greatly alter was is permitted in 'provisioning centers.' Much of the enabled uses will go beyond the legislative intent of our local ordinance and, in my opinion, the MMA. It was noted by the most recent petitioner that they wanted to locate in the city so that this new legislation, when in effect, would enable them to expand their business model and operational parameters.

What do we do? I strongly recommend a moratorium. The proposed changes need to be looked at with fresh eyes. It may be that the city is still looking to accommodate such uses. However, given the public opposition at the planning commission meeting, the city planning commission and city council should definitely revisit this entire issue before allowing any medical marijuana related dispensaries, growing facilities, provisioning centers, etc. within the city. It is unclear how the proposed legislation might enable expansion beyond our current ordinance intentions, giving the community more than we bargained for. A moratorium will give us the time to evaluate the impact and our response. I have included a resolution to this end.

✓ MILLER ROAD LOT SALE (Resolution)

In July, the city received a proposal from a property owner in the city to buy a residential out lot that the city owns on Miller Road (a map is attached). This is a 60' lot identified as 58-36-578-018. This is not a buildable lot. The city has it because there was a potential to use this to access the development behind it with a road connection or a sewer connection for a county transmission line. At this time, we have no need for it.

In August, we sent letters to the adjacent owners with frontage on Miller Road, soliciting final and best offers for this parcel. We only received one proposal, which was a restated version of the original proposal. Based on our findings, this parcel has very little value to us and no discernable value to any non-adjacent land owner. As such, the city council directed staff to prepare a sale instrument to sell the parcel.

I have prepared a resolution and quit claim deed that does exactly that.

✓ ENGINEERING MITIGATION PROPOSAL (Resolution)

See the city manager's report, under "Streets." Proposals to perform third party mitigation services on the Miller Road design and construction process are attached. Again, their services will be performed only if necessary. I recommend the low bid from HRC be accepted. Hopefully, we will not need to activate this work scope or outlay any funds.

✓ STREET USAGE PERMIT, ANNUAL FIRE CHRISTMAS PARADE (Resolution) Included with tonight's program is a request from the Fire Department to conduct the annual Santa Clause Parade. This year's event has been scheduled for Saturday December 6, 2014 at 6:00 PM. The parade will follow the same route as last year, being the High School, Fairchild, Miller, Morrish, Fortino and into the Fire Hall. A gathering follows at the Hall.

✓ FIRE DEPARTMENT BUDGET (Resolution)

Included with tonight's agenda is the 2015 FY Fire Budget. The Fire Board moved this forward for municipal approval at the meeting held October 20th. As of yet, the Township Board has not approved it, however, Mr. Gheringer has given a tentative approval on their behalf. The total amount for FY 2015 is \$300,234.5, an 8.58% increase over last year's \$276,505. Our one-half obligation is \$150,117.25.

Much of the increase includes reasonable raises, the outfitting of the new apparatus, and the provisional inclusion of term life insurance for the firefighters at the request of Mr. Gheringer. We expect little to no increase next year, and a potential flat or decreased budget for fiscal year 2017. Our financial guru, Ms. Aguilar recommended \$149,000 for our fiscal year expenses toward the fire department operations, plus an additional \$20,000 for capital equipment and \$2,200 for the siren expense. Since our fiscal years offset by six months, our budget is right in line with the fire department request. I see no reason to delay approval.

✓ SEWER BOND PAYMENT (Resolution)

The city owes its annual installment for the Western Trunk extension. A resolution is included to do so.

Council Questions, Inquiries, Requests and Comments

WHEREAS, the City of Swartz Creek Michigan, by Ordinance, has prohibited the possession or use of marijuana, as well as the sale, display, furnishing, supplying or possession of controlled substance paraphernalia; and

WHEREAS, the use, possession, cultivation, manufacture or sale of marijuana remains a crime under the Laws of the State of Michigan, the United States of America as a Schedule 1 drug under the Michigan Public Health Code and by the Treaty of 1980, entitled:

Convention of Psychotropic Substances, and it is illegal to operate a motor vehicle with any amount of THC in an individual's blood system; and

WHEREAS, the people of the State of Michigan by referendum have provided that there shall not be criminal prosecution for the medical use of marijuana in limited and specific ways as provided in MCLA 333.26421 et seq; and

WHEREAS, the City of Swartz Creek passed ordinance number 407 to define and regulate medical marijuana dispensaries and growing facilities; and

WHEREAS, the legislature of the State of Michigan is considering certain legislation, specifically House Bill 4271, that is expected to significantly alter the operations of medical marijuana commercial facilities; and

WHEREAS, the City of Swartz Creek Michigan believes that in light of potential adverse effects upon its citizens, by the use, sale, production, and storage of medical marijuana that could affect the public safety, health and welfare, if certain controls were not placed as to if, where, or how such medical marijuana use is carried out; and

WHEREAS, the Swartz Creek City Council believes that its Ordinances will require amendment to comply with current and proposed legislation, including the Michigan Medical Marijuana Act (MMMA), and to regulate certain conduct by medical marijuana users and their caregivers; and

WHEREAS, the Swartz Creek City Council believes that the location in which medical marijuana caregivers provide care to medical marijuana patients requires regulation to avoid any harmful impact on the citizens by the placement or concentration of medical marijuana caregivers, within the ambit of the Zoning Ordinances of the City of Swartz Creek.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Swartz Creek City Council by this Resolution determines to place a moratorium upon the establishment of caregiver facilities, dispensaries, growing facilities, and similar facilities as defined by ordinance 407 and state legislation within its City Limits for a period of one hundred eighty (180) days, to allow the City Council to consider amendments to its Zoning Ordinances and to its Drug Control Ordinances. It is the intent of the City to maintain a land use status quo pending final adoption of any proposed zoning plan or changes regarding Michigan medical marijuana caregivers as defined in MCLA 333.26421 et seq. (MMMA).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in compliance with section 32.15 of the zoning code for the City of Swartz Creek, this moratorium shall be effective immediately upon publication of this resolution in a newspaper of general circulation, date of publication October 30, 2014.

LEASE AGREEMENT Between THE CITY OF SWARTZ CREEK And THE SWARTZ CREEK FINE ARTS ASSOCIATION

THIS AGREEMENT, is made this _____ day of ______, 2014, between the City of Swartz Creek, a Michigan Municipal Corporation, with principal offices at 8083 Civic Drive, Swartz Creek, Michigan 48473 (the "Lessor"), and the Swartz Creek Fine Arts Association, Inc., a Michigan non-profit corporation, with principal offices at 8099 Civic Drive, P.O. Box 98, Swartz Creek, Michigan 48473 (the "Lessor").

WHEREAS, the Lessor owns certain land (the "Property") in the City of Swartz Creek ("City") which is used for public purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Lessee is a charitable organization recognized as such pursuant to Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code and is engaged in the promotion of fine arts performances and education in the City; and

WHEREAS, the Lessee has constructed at its own expense and with the Lessor's permission certain improvements on the Property which improvements are used for theatrical presentations and programs staged by the Lessee and/or by other public, educational and theatrical organizations with the permission of the Lessee; and

WHEREAS, the Lessor finds that the use of the Property by the Lessee and the construction buy the Lessee at its own expense of the improvements thereon inures to the benefit of the City and its citizens and helps reduce the burden of government;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Lessor and the Lessee, acting by and through their duly authorized agents, hereby agree as follows:

1. LEASE

The Lessor does this day lease unto the Lessee, and said Lessee does hereby hire and take as Lessee under said Lessor the following described premises (the "Property") situated in the City of Swartz Creek, County of Genesee and State of Michigan, to-wit:

Part of Lot 45 of "Supervisor's Plat of Swartz Creek" as recorded in Liber 17 on page 42, of the Genesee County Plat records, described as beginning at a point on the West line of said Lot 45 which is North along said West line, 329.59 feet from the Northwest corner of Lot 37 of said plat; thence continuing North along said West line of Lot 45, 223.0 feet; Thence South 89 Deg 54 Min East, 293.35 feet; thence South 0 Deg 06 Min West, 223.00 Containing 1.50 acres of land more or less.

The Property is to be used and occupied by the Lessee for the purpose of presenting musical concerts and other purposes reasonable related thereto and in keeping with its own charitable and the City's public purposes and for no other purposes or uses whatsoever.

2. TERM AND RENT

The term of this lease shall be ten (10) years, commencing on November 1, 2014 and ending October 31, 2024, unless sooner terminated as herein provided. The rent payable for said ten (10) year period shall be One Dollar (\$1.00) payable on or before the date hereof.

3. ADDITIONAL RENT

As additional rent hereunder, the Lessee shall at its one sole expense maintain the improvements it has constructed on the Property and may, with the advance written permission of the Lessor, construct such other improvements as the Lessor shall deem appropriate for the public functions of the property.

4. REMOVAL OF IMPROVEMENTS

Any improvements constructed by the Lessee, whether constructed prior to the date of the agreement of at any time thereafter, shall, upon termination of this agreement for any reason, become the sole property of the City. If, prior to the termination of this agreement for any reason, the City determines that it needs the property, or any portion thereof, for any other public purpose, it may terminate this lease and may, at its sole expense remove the improvements from the Property or from that portion of the Property as determined by the City.

5. ASSIGNMENT

The Lessor shall not assign this lease, nor permit the same or any part thereof, to be used for any other purpose than as above stipulated, without the written consent of the Lessor.

6. PERSONAL PROPERTY

All personal property placed or moved on the Property, shall be placed or moved there at the risk of the Lessee or owner thereof, and Lessor shall not be liable for any damage to said personal property, or to the Lessee from any act of negligence of any other person whomsoever.

7. COMPLIANCE WITH ALL LAWS

The Lessee at its sole expense shall comply with all laws, orders, and regulations of Federal, State and Municipal authorities, and with any direction of any public officer,

pursuant to the law, which shall impose any duty upon the Lessor or the Lessee with respect to the Property. The Lessee, at its sole expense, shall obtain all licenses or permits which may be required for the conduct of its business within the terms of this lease, or for the making of repairs, alterations, improvements, or additions, and the Lessor, where necessary, will join the Lessee in applying for all such permits or licenses.

8. LESSOR'S REMEDIES

The prompt payment of the rent for the Property upon the dates named, and the faithful observance of the rules and regulations printed upon this lease, and which are hereby made a part of this covenant, are the conditions upon which the lease is made and accepted and any failure on the part of the Lessee to comply with the terms of said lease, or any of said rules and regulations now in existence, the option of the Lessor, work a forfeiture of this lease, and all of the rights of the Lessor hereunder, and the Lessor, his agents or attorneys, shall thereupon have the right to enter said premises, and remove all persons therefrom forcibly or otherwise, and the Lessee thereby expressly waives any and all notice required by laws to terminate tenancy, and also waives any and all legal proceedings to recover possession of said premises, and expressly agrees that in event, of a violation of any of the terms of this lease, or of said rules and regulation, now in existence, or which may hereafter be made, said Lessor, his agent or attorneys may immediately re-enter said premises and dispossess Lessee without legal notice or the institution of any legal proceedings whatsoever.

9. ABANDONMENT OF LEASE

If the Lessee shall abandon or vacate the Property before the end of the term of this lease, or shall suffer the rent to be in arrears, the Lessor may, at his option, forthwith cancel this lease, and, if the Lessor so requests the Lessee shall, at its sole expenses, remove the improvements or any portion thereof from the Property.

10. UTILITIES

The Lessee agrees that it will pay all charges for gas, electricity, water, sewer or other utilities on the Property.

11. LIABILITY AND INSURANCE

The Lessor shall not be liable for injury or damage to person or property occurring upon the Property, unless caused by or resulting from the negligence of the Lessor or any of the Lessor's agents, servants, or employees in the operation or maintenance of the Property, it being the specific intent of the Lessee to hold the Lessor harmless from any and all claims arising from the Lessee's operation and maintenance of the Property and/or the improvements thereon. To that end, the Lessee shall obtain and at all times maintain in full force and effect a policy of general public liability insurance covering its use of the Property and naming the Lessor as an additional insured thereon. Said policy shall be in such amount as shall be determined by the Lessor, but in no event less than \$1,000,000 (one-million dollars), and further, shall provide that the Lessor will be given ten (10) days written notice of termination of the policy for any reason. The Lessee shall pay all premiums due thereon.

12. INSOLVENCY OF LESSEE

If the Lessee shall become insolvent or if bankruptcy proceeding shall be begun by or against the Lessee, before the end of the term of this lease, the Lessor is hereby irrevocably authorized at its options, to forthwith terminate this lease, as for a default. Lessor may elect to accept rent from such receiver, trustee, or other judicial officer during the term of their occupancy in their fiduciary capacity on behalf of the Lessee without affecting Lessor's rights as contained in this lease, but no receiver, trustee, or other judicial officer shall never have any right, title or interest in or to the Property by virtue of this lease.

13. TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE

It is understood and agreed between the Lessor and the Lessee that time is of the essence of this lease.

14. NOTICES

Written notice send by first class mail or delivered to either party at the address for each party as set forth in the first paragraph of this lease shall constitute sufficient notice to such party, in comply with the terms of this lease.

15. CUMULATIVE RIGHTS

The rights of the Lessor under the lease shall be cumulative, and failure on the part of the Lessor to exercise promptly any rights given hereunder shall not operate to forfeit any of said rights.

16. SIGNS

Any sign or advertising to be used in connection with the Lessee's use of the Property shall be first submitted to the Lessor for approval before installation of the same.

17. LEASE EXTENSION

The Lessor may extend this lease for successive ten (10) year terms if the Lessee requests such extension in writing prior to the expiration of the lease term or any ten (10) year extension thereof upon such terms as may be agreed upon.

AGREEMENT FOR POLICE DEPARTMENT ADMINISTRATION SERVICES

This Agreement is made between the Charter Township of Mundy ("Township") and the City of Swartz Creek ("City"), and is effective November 1, 2014.

Recitals

WHEREAS, both the Township and City presently supply police protection services to their respective municipalities with each Police Department employing their own Chief of Police;

WHEREAS, the Township and City have been exploring ways to reduce the costs and expenses of maintaining two separate Police Departments that are located in close proximity to each other while not compromising the competency and extent of police protection services that they presently provide their residents;

WHEREAS, Rick Clolinger, the City's current Chief of Police, is retiring later this year and both municipalities see the resulting vacancy as an opportunity for them to share administrative services.

Agreement

NOW, THEREFORE, the Township and City agree as follows:

- 1. Upon Rick Clolinger's retirement as Chief of Police for the City, the City shall not fill the resulting vacancy in that office, but the Township Chief of Police, or his/her designee, shall function as the Chief of Police of the City instead, said individual to serve in that capacity as an official of the city and observe all city policies, charter, procedures, and ordinances.
- 2. To be eligible to serve as Chief of Police, a person shall be a certified police officer with adequate education and experience sufficient to fulfill the duties of the Chief of Police as outlined in the job description attached as Exhibit A.
- 3. In the event of a vacancy in the Township's Chief of Police position, the Township shall be solely responsible for filling that vacancy with a person holding the necessary qualifications.
- 4. The Township shall be solely responsible for all liability insurance, worker's compensation insurance, disability insurance, payroll, medical benefits, pension,

unemployment, social security, withholding, and any and all other expenses related to compensation or benefits paid or owed to the Chief of Police.

- 5. As consideration, the City shall pay the Township Thirty-Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$37,500.00) per year, in quarterly payments of Nine Thousand Three Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$9,375.00) per quarter. The City shall make the first such payment on or before February 1, 2015, with all subsequent payments being due the first day of the month on which it is due.
- 6. Either party may terminate this Agreement on sixty (60) days written notice to the other.

CITY OF SWARTZ CREEK ASSET MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR CITY STREET NETWORK

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Executive Summary

The City of Swartz Creek requested ROWE Professional Services Company complete an asset management plan for the local and major streets throughout the city. The analysis included rating all of the nearly 22 miles of public roadway and 4 miles of private streets anticipated to be public streets in the future. Ratings were completed in July and August 2014. The purpose of this analysis is to provide the city with a tool for planning future street improvements; the asset management plan will provide a guide for city officials to select the right treatment at the right time, maximizing the life of the street system.

Ratings were completed using the Pavement Surface Evaluation and Rating (PASER) scale for each pavement type. The PASER system is a visual survey method for evaluating the condition of streets. It was adopted by Michigan's Transportation Asset Management Council (TAMC) as an efficient and consistent method for evaluating the street condition. Streets are rated on a scale of 1-10, with 10 being the highest rating, based on the surface conditions. A definition of the rating scale is included in the report.

The analysis for all city streets shows currently 6% (1.6 miles) are in good condition (rating 8-10); 42% (10.8 miles) of the streets are in fair condition (rating 5-7); and 52% of the streets (13.6 miles) are in poor condition (rating 1-4). Nearly half of the roadway miles are eligible for federal-aid funding which covers 80% of the construction cost for roadway maintenance. The remaining local streets are maintained solely by the City of Swartz Creek. A breakdown of the condition of the local streets can be seen in the chart below.



If there is no action taken to maintain these roadways, they will continue to deteriorate until 99% of the roadways are in poor condition by year 2034, as shown in the chart below.



A model was developed to analyze various investment levels and the impact to the overall street network for a 20 year period. The results below summarize the results of both a \$500,000 and \$1,000,000 annual investment.

An annual investment of \$500,000 will result in a 49% increase in the overall average condition of the street network compared to the do nothing scenario over 20 years, while a \$1,000,000 annual contribution improves the street condition by 76% compared to the do nothing scenario over 20 years.



Percentage of Good, Fair, Poor Local Streets in Year 2034; \$500,000 Spent Annually



The results of the scenarios optimized show the optimal dollar amount to be spent maintaining local streets is between \$900,000 and \$950,000 annually. This will maintain the local roadways at an average level of service of 6 which is considered in good condition.

Since the federal-aid roadways have an average rating of 6, it is recommended the city continue to pursue grants with the Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Commission to complete this work.

Street Inventory

The analysis included rating all of the nearly 22 miles of public roadway and 4 miles of private streets anticipated to be public streets in the future. Major streets account for 10.2 miles and local streets account for 11.8 miles of the 22 total miles of public roadway. Ratings were completed in July and August 2014. The purpose of this analysis is to provide the city with a tool to assist in planning for future road projects and maintenance that will provide fair to good streets throughout the city.

Currently, the city has 19.6 miles of asphalt paved streets; 1.4 miles of concrete paved streets; and 5.0 miles of composite (asphalt over concrete) paved streets. Each type of pavement deteriorates differently and requires different maintenance techniques. The rating for each surface type differs based on the condition of the roadway when observed in the field.

Ratings were completed using the Pavement Surface Evaluation and Rating (PASER) scale for each pavement type. The PASER system is a visual survey method for evaluating the condition of streets. It was adopted by Michigan's Transportation Asset Management Council (TAMC) as an efficient and consistent method for evaluating the street condition. Listed below is the scale for each pavement type. Composite pavements are rated as asphalt pavements since that is the surface that can be observed in the field.

PASER Ratings and Definitions

Asphalt

Rating Description and Treatment

9 & 10 Newly constructed or recently overlaid streets are in excellent condition. No maintenance required.

- This category includes streets which have been recently sealcoated or overlaid with new cold mix. It also includes recently constructed or overlaid streets, which may show longitudinal or transverse cracks. All cracks are tight or sealed. Little or no maintenance required.
- Streets show first signs of aging and they may have very slight raveling. Any longitudinal cracks are along paving joint. Transverse cracks may be approximately 10' or more apart. All cracks are 1/4" or less, with little or no crack erosion. There are few, if any, patches all in very good condition. **Maintain a crack sealing program**.
- Streets are in sound structural condition but show definite signs of aging. Sealcoating could extend their useful life. There may be slight surface raveling. Transverse cracks can be frequent, less than 10' apart. Cracks may be ½ ½' and sealed or open. Pavement is generally sound adjacent to cracks. First signs of block cracking may be evident. Pavement may have slight or moderate bleeding or polishing. Patches are in good condition. **Consider preservation treatment**.
- Streets are still in good structural condition, but clearly need sealcoating or overlay. They may have moderate to severe surface raveling with significant loss of aggregate. First signs of longitudinal cracks near the edge. The pavement has first signs of raveling along cracks. Block cracking up to 50% of surface. The pavement surface has extensive to severe flushing or polishing. Any patches or edge wedges are in good condition. **Preservation maintenance treatment required.**

Streets show first signs of needing strengthening by overlay. They have very severe surface raveling, which should no longer be sealed. The pavement will have the first longitudinal cracking in wheel path. The surface will have many transverse cracks and some may be raveling slightly. Over 50% of the surface may have block cracking. Patches are in fair condition. They may have rutting ½" deep or less, or slight distortion. Structural improvement required.

- Streets must be strengthened with a structural overlay (2" or more). The pavement will benefit from milling and very likely will require pavement patching and repair beforehand. Cracking will likely be extensive. Raveling and erosion in cracks may be common. Surface may have severe block cracking and show first signs of alligator cracking. Patches are in fair to poor condition. There is moderate distortion or rutting (more than ½" and less than 2" in depth), and occasional potholes. **Structural improvement required.**
- Streets are severely deteriorated and need reconstruction. Surface pulverization and additional base may be cost-effective. These streets have more than 25% alligator cracking, distortion or rutting 2 inches or more in depth, as well as potholes or extensive patches in poor condition. **Reconstruction required.**
- Streets have failed, showing severe distress and extensive loss of surface integrity. **Reconstruction required.**

Concrete

Rating Description and Treatment

- 9 & 10 New pavement or recent concrete rehabilitation. Pavement is in excellent condition. No Maintenance required.
- More surface wear, or slight defects showing in lanes. Surface shows pop-outs, slight surface scaling, partial loss of joint sealant, or isolated meander crack. Isolated manhole distress. Little or no maintenance required.
- First signs of transverse cracking, patching or repair; more extensive pop-outs or scaling; some manhole displacement, isolated heave or settlement. **May need some sealing or routine maintenance**.
- First signs of corner cracking or shallow reinforcement. More frequent transverse cracks. Open (1/4") joints and cracks and moderate scaling. **Joint and crack sealing needed**.
- First signs of joint or crack spalling, or faulting. Surface has multiple cracking at corners with broken pieces. Patching is in fair condition. Surface texturing repairs may be necessary. Some partial depth patching and joint repairs may be needed. Partial depth patching and joint repairs may be needed.
- 4 Sever surface distress requires asphalt overlay or extensive surface texturing. Multiple transverse cracks with appalling and broken pieces. Pavement has corner cracking with potholes or patches and blowups. Some full depth joint or crack repair required.
- Most joints and cracks are open (1"), spalled or patched. D-cracking is evident. Severe (1") faulting. Extensive full depth patching required plus some full slab replacement.
- 1 & 2 Pavement failure. Requires reconstruction



Pavement Treatments and Definitions

There are several roadway treatments which are proposed as a part of the City of Swartz Creek's asset management program. A description of these treatments is given below. The city is currently evaluating alternative roadway treatments. This Pavement Management System should be considered a working document and updates made every five years to reflect changes in the treatments used by the City of Swartz Creek.

Asphalt Treatments

A. Preventative Maintenance

a. Crack Sealing

Application of rubberized asphalt material to all longitudinal and transverse cracks to prevent water from seeping into the roadway base.

b. Slurry Seal

Thin application of emulsified aggregate across entire roadway. Application breaks down very top of asphalt surface and replaces fine aggregate, which may have worn out. Effective for sealing cracks in roadway but does not increase structural capacity of roadway.

B. Preservation

a. Mill and Resurface

Milling off a portion (usually between 2 and 3 inches) of the roadway's deteriorated asphalt pavement surface and then resurfacing the roadway with the same or greater thickness of asphalt pavement due to structural requirements. A mill and resurface project generally provides between 10 to 15 years of serviceable life if crack sealing operations are continued.

b. Major Repair/Resurface

This is essentially one step beyond a mill and resurface project. Significant areas of pavement failure are removed and replaced. Underdrain can be added to provide enhanced drainage. Once the pavement and base are repaired in the bad areas, the entire pavement is milled and resurfaced as above. Typically, the reason these projects are necessary is that the roadway base is deteriorated in some areas. Because of this deterioration, the expected life for a fix of this nature is also between 10 and 15 years if crack sealing operations are continued.

C. Reconstruction

a. Reconstruction

Reconstruction is as it implies; a complete removal and replacement of the existing pavement and base along with the base drainage system. Because the drainage system must be replaced, the curb and gutter must also be replaced in most situations. This goes back to having a new street and the expected life of this street varies widely due to design and pavement maintenance programs.

Concrete Treatments

A. Preventative Maintenance

a. Seal Open Joints and Cracks

Application of joint sealant in areas where joints have lost 25 to 50 percent of their sealant material or cracks have started to separate to prevent water from seeping into the roadway base.

B. Preservation

a. Partial Depth Repairs

Saw and chip the area, completely removing pavement in poor condition until only sound pavement remains. Place new concrete into repair area, finishing meeting the elevation of the surrounding pavement. Once the patch has reached sufficient strength, seal the joints to prevent water from causing additional damage.

b. Full Depth Repairs & Full Slab Replacement

Saw cut and remove damaged pavement. Prepare the base and install dowel bars in remaining adjacent pavement. Place fresh concrete and finish to meet the elevation of the surrounding pavement. Once the pavement has cured, saw and seal joints as necessary.

C. Reconstruct

a. Reconstruction

Reconstruction is as it implies; a complete removal and replacement of the existing pavement and base along with the base drainage system. Because the drainage system must be replaced, the curb and gutter must also be replaced in most situations. This goes back to having a new street and the expected life of this street varies widely due to design and pavement maintenance programs.



Lifespan of an Asphalt Pavement

Asphalt pavement has proven over the years to be a successful alternative to concrete pavement due to its adaptability to its surroundings, its relative ease of construction and its cost advantages for both new construction and for maintenance. The figure below shows the lifecycle of asphalt pavement.



Asphalt pavements are typically designed for a 10 to 20 year design life. This life can be extended through regular pavement maintenance operations; however, the pavement will eventually require major reconstruction or rehabilitation. To illustrate this point, the following describes the normal deterioration of asphalt pavement with routine maintenance.

1. New Pavement

The first five years of the asphalt pavement's life the surface is in excellent to good condition. For the most part, the flexibility of the pavement will allow it to self–seal most cracks so that additional crack sealing operations required will be minimal. Close monitoring of the pavement during this phase will also show any structural deficiencies based on additional traffic not originally intended for this street and/or subgrade problems not noticed during construction. If additional structural capacity is required at this point, corrections can be made with minimal cost.

2. 5 Years

At five years' time, normal crack sealing operations should begin. The intent is to seal the surface so that water cannot enter the pavement base. A slurry seal or chip seal treatment can also be applied at this time in order to seal smaller cracks. Ground water and/or water entering the grade from the back of curb can be handled by the base drainage provided during construction. Fine material contamination of the road base will be minimized.

3. 10 to 25 Years

Normal crack sealing operations should be continued and should alleviate most of the problems

for the next 15 to 20 years. Over this period, the major street deterioration should be seen on the surface itself. The constant pounding of traffic will eventually degrade the surface; however, the pavement structural capacity should remain intact. Because of this and the deterioration of the surface, normal crack sealing operations may not be sufficient to seal the pavement surface and an ultra-thin overlay should be considered. Due to the fact that the roadway base has been protected to this point and beyond, this ultra-thin overlay should provide approximately 5 to 10 years of additional serviceable life, provided the crack sealing operations continue.

4. 25 to 35 Years

It is impossible to completely prevent the degradation of the roadway base and the deterioration of the asphalt pavement itself, though the roadway base degradation can be constrained to point locations. Because of this, at approximately 35 years, the city should expect that the asphalt pavement will have deteriorated considerably so that it no longer provides the required structural capacity. This coupled with gradual settling and increased traffic volume will require some sort of structural upgrade. At this point, the city has the option of upgrading the cross section of the roadway due to traffic requirements and would do a complete reconstruction. If the pavement width is adequate, the city could consider a milling and resurfacing project to increase the structural capacity. Most resurfacing projects are designed, again, for a 10 to 15 year life and this takes us well beyond the 40 year life analyzed.

Finances

The city currently utilizes three funding sources to maintain the street network. The major funding source is the Michigan Transportation Fund (MTF). This fund is supported by vehicle registration fees and is based on factors such as population, vehicle registration fees and certified mileage of the street system. The city has 11.8 certified miles of local streets and in 2012-2013 received \$82,273 through MTF. In addition to street improvements, these funds are also used for operation and maintenance, such as street salting and snow removal. Operation and maintenance costs for the 2012-2013 fiscal year totaled \$75,375.

In addition to MTF, the city also receives federal aid for improvements to major streets. Federal funding is distributed to local units of government through the Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Commission (GCMPC). Funding levels typically cover 50% of the total project costs, with the balance paid for with local dollars.

Federal and State aid is also available for the city's bridges through the local bridge program. Construction costs for improvement are funded at 95%, with the local share equal to 5% on construction, plus design and construction engineering costs.

Pavement Analysis

A roadway inventory was completed on all City of Swartz Creek streets. The results of this assessment can be found in Appendix A and a map of all the ratings completed can be found in Appendix C. Currently, 6% of the streets (1.6 miles) are in good condition (rating 8-10); 42% (10.8 miles) of the streets are in fair condition (rating 5-7); and 52% of the streets (13.6 miles) are in poor condition (rating 1-4). With this level of degradation in the street system, multiple scenarios are possible for funding roadway reconstruction, rehabilitation, and preventative maintenance. The city has been able to maintain major streets (10.2 miles) with the assistance of the aforementioned State and Federal-aid funding. Minor local streets (11.8 miles) do not qualify for this type of funding. Therefore, the City of Swartz Creek is fiscally responsible for ensuring serviceable roadways in these areas.



As a part of the PASER pavement evaluation, a pavement management analysis tool was created that will allow the city to more easily budget necessary resources, reducing expenditures for immediate need and emergency situations. This analysis takes a look at the condition of each street and assigns recommendations and costs to rehabilitate each street segment. In the chart below, the cost per square yard for each treatment is listed. A full list of all roadway ratings, treatments and costs can be found in Appendix B.

The local streets were rated and a proposed maintenance treatment plan and corresponding cost were assigned. Currently, the average rating for local roadways is a 4, which is considered poor. The local streets were also evaluated in the Roadsoft software to determine a funding amount that will lead to an average rating of 6 for all local streets over the next 20 years.



The federal-aid eligible roadways were also rated and then a proposed treatment and cost for the treatment were assigned. The average rating for federal-aid roadways is a 6, which is considered good. These roadways are not factored into the 20 year plan, as they are covered 80% for complete construction costs and depend on the Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Commission approval for funding.

Local Streets

The current evaluation of the local streets shows the average rating is a 4, which is fair condition. Three scenarios were run to help establish an appropriate annual funding rate to bring the average rating of local streets up to a 6 over 20 years.

Scenario I

The first scenario considered was the do nothing situation. This would be the most extreme circumstance where no money would be invested into the local streets. Performing an evaluation of this situation is to establish the worst case scenario. Below is a graph that shows the percentage of good, fair, and poor streets in 20 years if no action is taken.



In the do nothing scenario, in 20 years 99% of the local streets will be considered in poor condition with an average PASER rating of 1. This will mean that 99% of the local streets have failed.

Scenario 2

The next annual amount used was \$500,000. This would be equal to about a 3.8 mil millage. The scenario allows for reconstruction, rehabilitation and preventative maintenance treatments each year on local streets. This will help the streets that are rated good to maintain their good rating, while eventually bringing some of the fair and poor streets up to a good rating. Below is a graph that shows the percentage of each roadway condition type for each year.

This scenario shows that after 20 years, there will be more local streets in good or fair condition than currently rated, but 50% of the roadways are still in poor condition. The average PASER rating for this scenario is expected to be a 3.



Although the percentage of poor streets decreases, the average PASER rating stays relatively the same. This result led to the evaluation of a new scenario in which \$1,000,000 was spent annually on local roadway maintenance.

Scenario 3

For a scenario where \$1,000,000 is spent annually, the value would be approximately equal to a 7.7 mil millage. Below is a graph that shows the percentage of each roadway condition type in 2034.



This scenario shows that after 20 years, there is a significant change in the percentage of good streets

from 1% in 2014 to 52% good in 2034. Over the 20 years, the average PASER rating grows continuously until it maxes out at an average rating of 7. This is above the desired average rating the city wishes to be able to maintain on all local streets, but further scenario optimizations show that the optimal dollar amount is between \$900,000 and \$950,000. This will maintain the local roadways at an average level of service of 6 which is considered in good condition.

Conclusion

The PASER ratings completed show that overall, the federal-aid eligible roadways in the City of Swartz Creek have an average rating of 6, which is good condition. This is in part, due to the funding source which encompasses 80% of the total project cost. This allows the city to complete roadway rehabilitation projects for 20% of the total cost, conserving monies for use elsewhere to maintain streets. The City of Swartz Creek should continue to pursue projects through the Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Commission to preserve the major roadways in the city.

The PASER ratings for the local streets were an average rating of 4, which is fair condition. Moving forward, it is recommended that a method for funding be determined for local street maintenance that will provide annual monies to perform roadway maintenance that raises the average local street rating to good condition.

There are limited means by which a community can fund street maintenance projects for local streets. They can assign a special assessment district on a project by project basis or they can try to pass a street millage to generate an annual allocation for roadwork. When completing roadway work in areas where water and sewer utilities need upgrades, a portion of the roadway rehabilitation can be funded by the water and sewer funds. The water and sewer funds are limited to just the area disturbed by utility construction. For federal-aid eligible roadways, 80% of the cost of roadway repair is covered and it is the responsibility of the municipality to cover the remaining 20%.

In the City of Swartz Creek, every mil requested generates approximately \$130,000. This equates to approximately \$57 for each household annually. When a special assessment district is proposed, the residents in the district are responsible to pay an equal amount to cover the costs of street repairs. The desirableness of the street millage is that, while a resident may not see or need work completed on their street each year, a plan can be created that will provide routine maintenance for the local streets. This will be accessible by the citizens and work toward the goal of an average PASER rating of a 6 for all local streets. The idea is to prevent a situation where residential streets deteriorate to a 1 or 2 and instead are programed for resurfacing or reconstruction prior to that point.

The strategies evaluated are for far into the future and the reliability of a millage will provide the constant income needed to continue any type of maintenance program. The special assessment district will likely only be completed when the local street is in such a condition that total reconstruct is the only option. The goal of completing this analysis is to avoid such a situation in the future.

From time to time, grants may come available for local roadway work. Currently, the Michigan Department of the Environmental Quality is providing a grant which will provide a 50% match for street projects that use asphalt produced using binder that contains melted scrap tires. This is an example of a possible way to fund street projects for less cost to the city. As these types of funding sources present themselves, the city can apply for funds but grants cannot be relied upon every year as programs are not always available.



Please see below for the FANG activity report for the month of September 2014:

On 9-3-14, FANG officers responded to a suspected Marijuana grow operation at a residence in Flushing Township. This was not a legal grow and 28 Marijuana plants were seized. The male homeowner was arrested and released pending further investigation.

On 9-3-14, FANG officers conducted an Undercover Officer (UC) buy of heroin. The UC called the telephone number of a known drug dealer in the Flint area. The UC met with the dealer at a business parking lot in Burton. Officers moved in and made the arrest after the exchange was made. Approximately 1.4 grams of heroin and 4 grams of marijuana were seized. Forfeiture was initiated on \$323.00 and the male was lodged in the Genesee County Jail.

On 9-3-14, FANG officers were conducting surveillance at a parking lot of a Burton business. Officers observed a male sitting in the lot. A few minutes later a female pulled up next to him and an exchange was done. Officers moved in and arrested the female who was still sitting in her vehicle. Officers did surveillance on the male and later had him stopped by a marked unit. The female was in possession of approximately 3 grams of marijuana and .3 grams of heroin. She was later released pending further investigation. The male was arrested and lodged for delivery of heroin. Forfeiture was initiated on \$283.00. The investigation is still on going.

On 9-3-14, FANG officers conducted a controlled purchase of "crack" cocaine using a Confidential Informant (CI). The CI was surveyed to a house on the Southside of Flint. The CI entered the home and purchased .9 grams of "crack" cocaine from a male inside the house. Intelligence was gathered on the suspect, and the investigation is still on going.

On 9-3-14, FANG officers were conducting surveillance on a suspected drug dealer in the Flint area. FANG officers observed the male park in a Flint Township business lot. A few minutes later a male was observed walking across the lot, and he got into the passenger side of the car. Officers followed the vehicle away from the lot and observed the male passenger exit the vehicle less than a quarter mile down the road. Officers made contact with the male on foot and arrested him with approximately .6 grams of heroin. A traffic stop was made on the driver and he was arrested for delivery of heroin. Forfeiture was initiated on \$600.00 from the driver. He was later lodged in the Genesee County Jail.

On 9-8-14, FANG officers did a parole check with MDOC at a house on the east side of Flint. The male is suspected heroin dealer and a convicted Felon that officers had tips about. Upon searching the home officers seized approximately 1.4 grams of heroin, 1 gram of "crack" cocaine and a 9mm handgun. The male and a female in the home were lodged in the Genesee County.

On 9-8-14, FANG officers were contacted to assist Flint PD and Flint Fire Dept. with a marijuana grow operation in a house. FANG officers later executed a search warrant on the home. Officers seized 78 marijuana plants from the home. No one was at the house during the execution of the search warrant. The investigation is still on going.

On 9-8-14, FANG officers made contact with several subjects outside of a small apartment building in the City of Flint. FANG had received several tips on drug activity in the lot of the apartment. Officers

arrested and lodged 4 subjects with outstanding warrants and 2 subjects on fresh PWID Narcotic charges. Officers seized approximately 17 grams of "crack" cocaine and 34.5 grams of marijuana. The investigation is still on going.

On 9-9-14, FANG officers were conducting surveillance on a motel room in Flint Township for possible drug activity. Officers observed a female arrive at the motel and enter the surveyed room. She exited the room a minute later and drove away from the motel. The female was surveyed a short distance before a traffic stop was conducted. Officers seized approximately .8 grams of heroin from the female. She was arrested for possession of heroin and released pending further investigation. The investigation is continuing.

On 9-10-14, FANG officers conducted a controlled purchase of heroin using a Confidential Informant(CI). The CI entered a motel room in Flint Township and purchased heroin from a male staying in the room. A search warrant for the room was later executed on the room and the male was arrested. Seized from the room were approximately 12 grams of heroin and 3 grams of marijuana. Forfeiture was initiated on \$606.00 and the male was lodged in the Genesee County Jail.

On 9-10-14, FANG officers executed a search warrant at a house on the south side of Flint. Approximately .1 grams of heroin and .7 grams of marijuana were seized from the home. Officers also located a .380 handgun and a 12 gauge shotgun in the home. Two male subjects were arrested and lodged on the new drug and weapons charges. The investigation is still on going.

On 9-11-14, FANG officers conducted a knock and talk at a home in Gaines Township after receiving a tip from MSP aviation. Officers were given consent to search the home by the female homeowner. Officers seized 163 marijuana plants, 1100 grams of processed marijuana and 200 prescription pills. Forfeiture was initiated on \$5150.00. The female was released pending further investigation, which is still on going.

On 9-11-14, FANG officers conducted a controlled purchase of heroin using a Confidential Informant (CI). The CI was surveyed to a house on the north side of Flint. The CI entered the home and purchased one (1) gram of heroin from a male inside the house. Intelligence was gathered on the suspect, and the investigation is still on going.

On 9-11-14, FANG officers conducted a controlled purchase of "crack" cocaine using a Confidential Informant (CI). The CI was surveyed to a house on the north side of Flint. The CI entered the home and purchased .5 grams of "crack" cocaine from a male inside the house. Intelligence was gathered on the suspect, and the investigation is still on going.

On 9-11-14, FANG offices responded to and assumed investigation of a methamphetamine lab in the city of Flint. Flint P.D. uniform officers had been dispatched to a suspected methamphetamine lab. FANG officers obtained a search warrant for the residence. The residence was found to contain a one pot methamphetamine lab and components. FANG officers dismantled/processed the lab, and conducted interviews. One subject was lodged at the Flint City Jail.

On 9-15-14, FANG officers received information from a confidential informant that a suspect known to officers was selling heroin at a hotel in the city of Flint. Officers conducted surveillance at the hotel observing the suspect leave in a vehicle. After observing traffic violations a traffic stop was conducted by a MSP K-9 trooper. Consent to search the hotel room was obtained by the female that had rented

the room. Officers seized 16 bindles of heroin and a larger plastic baggy containing 11 grams of heroin. Forfeiture proceedings were initiated on \$561.00. The suspect was lodged at the Flint City Jail.

On 9-16-14, FANG officers made contact with a subject suspected of growing marijuana in Mt. Morris Twp., and Birch Run. This subject had been arrested by FANG earlier this year being well over his allowed legal medical marijuana limits. The previous case pends circuit court action. The suspect was found to be under the limit of medical marijuana at both locations.

On 9-17-14, FANG offices responded to and assumed investigation of a methamphetamine lab in the city of Flint. Flint P.D. uniform officers had been dispatched to a suspected methamphetamine lab. FANG officers obtained a search warrant for the residence. The residence and garage were found to contain a one pot methamphetamine lab and components. FANG officers dismantled/processed the lab, and conducted interviews. Four subjects were lodged at the Flint City Jail.

On 9-17-14, FANG officers obtained and executed a search warrant at a residence in the city of Flint. Officers seized .5 grams of crack, .5 grams cocaine, 2.7 grams of heroin, and a stolen semi-auto handgun. The handgun had been reported stolen to Flint Twp. P.D. Two subjects were lodged at the Flint City Jail. Federal charges will be sought against one suspect who is a convicted felon.

On 9-17-14, FANG officers conducted a controlled purchase of cocaine from a suspect in a residence in the city of Flint. The investigation is on-going.

On 9-17-14, FANG officers conducted a controlled purchase of heroin from a suspect in the city of Flint. The investigation is on-going.

On 9-18-14, FANG officers obtained and executed a search warrant at a residence in Mt. Morris Twp. Offices seized 106 grams of cocaine, 4 grams of heroin, 12 grams of marijuana, and a semi-auto handgun with the serial numbers obliterated. The suspect was lodged at the Genesee County Jail. Federal prosecution will be sought as the suspect is a convicted felon.

On 9-18-14, FANG officers responded to and assumed investigation of a mobile methamphetamine lab at the request of MSP Troopers. Uniform Troopers had stopped a vehicle in the city of Flint, and subsequently discovered a methamphetamine one pot in the rear passenger area of the vehicle. FANG officers conducted interviews at the scene and dismantled/ processed the mobile meth lab. Three subjects were arrested and lodged at the Flint City Jail.

On 9-18-14, FANG officers executed a search warrant at a residence in the city of Flint. Officers seized 13 small plastic corner ties containing heroin, a 12 gauge pump shotgun and a bullet proof vest. Forfeiture proceedings were initiated on \$531.00. The suspect was lodged at the Flint City Jail.

On 9-22-14, FANG offices conducted a buy/bust of crack cocaine from a suspect in a party store parking lot in Mt. Morris Twp. The suspect attempted to flee on foot, throwing a handgun to the ground while he was running. The suspect was quickly caught and found to be in possession of 12 small plastic corner ties containing crack cocaine. The suspect is a convicted felon. He was lodged at the Genesee County Jail. Federal prosecution will be sought.

On 9-23-14, FANG officers conducted a controlled purchase of crack cocaine from a suspect in a residence in the city of Flint. The investigation is on-going.

On 9-23-14, FANG officers conducted a controlled purchase of heroin from a suspect in a residence in the city of Flint. As a result of this purchase officers obtained and executed a search warrant at the residence on 9-24-14. Officers seized 4 small plastic corner ties containing crack cocaine and a small amount of heroin. The primary suspect was not home at the time of the search warrant. A warrant request will be submitted to the Genesee County Prosecutors Office.

On 9-25-14, FANG officers executed a search warrant at a residence in the city of Flint. Officers seized one (1) gram of cocaine, 92 grams of marijuana, 4 non-registered semi-auto handguns, and a bullet proof vest. Forfeiture proceedings were initiated on \$2174.00. The suspect, a convicted felon, was lodged at the Flint City Jail. Federal prosecution will be sought.

On 9-25-14, Two Methamphetamine Lab trained FANG officers responded to Caseville to assist with the dismantling and transport of hazardous materials on a methamphetamine lab. Prosecution will be handled through the Huron County Sheriff Department.

On 9-29-14, FANG officers conducted a controlled purchase of heroin from a suspect in a residence in the city of Flint. The investigation is on-going.



DISCLOSURE REGARDING REAL ESTATE AGENCY RELATIONSHIPS



Before you disclose confidential information to a real estate licensee regarding a real estate transaction, you should understand what type of agency relationship you have with that licensee. A real estate transaction is a transaction involving the sale or lease of any legal or equitable interest in real estate consisting in not less than 1 or not more than 4 residential dwelling units or consisting of a building site for a residential unit on either a lot as defined in section 102 of the land division act, 1967 PA 288, MCL 560.102, or a condominium unit as defined in section 4 of the condominium act, 1978 PA 59, MCL 559.104.

- (1) An agent providing services under any service provision agreement owes, at a minimum, the following duties to the client:
 - (a) The exercise of reasonable care and skill in representing the client and carrying out the responsibilities of the agency relationship.
 - (b) The performance of the terms of the service provision agreement.
 - (c) Loyalty to the interest of the client
 - (d) Compliance with the laws, rules and regulations of the state and any applicable federal statutes or regulations.
 - (e) Referral of the client to other licensed professionals for expert advice related to material matters that are not within the expertise of the licensed agent.
 - (f) An accounting in timely manner of all money and property received by the agent in which the client has or may have an interest.
 - (g) Confidentiality of all information, obtained within the course of the agency relationship, unless disclosed with the client's permission or as provided by law, including the duty not to disclose confidential information to any licensee who is not an agent or the client.
- (2) A real estate broker or real estate salesperson acting pursuant to a service provision agreement shall provide the following services to his or her client.
 - (a) When the real estate broker or real estate salesperson is representing a seller or lessor, the marketing of the client's property in the manner agreed upon in the service provision agreement.
 - (b) Acceptance of delivery and presentation of offers and counteroffers to but, sell or lease the client's property or the property the client seeks to purchase of lease.
 - (c) Assistance in developing, communicating, negotiating, and presenting offers, counteroffers, and related documents or notices until a purchase or lease agreement is executed by all parties and all contingencies are satisfied or waived.
 - (d) After execution of a purchase agreement by all parties, assistance as necessary to complete the transaction under the terms specified in the purchase agreement.
 - (e) For a broker or associate broker who is involved at the closing of a real estate or business opportunity transaction, furnishing, or causing to be furnished, to the buyer and seller, a complete and detailed closing statement signed by the broker or associate broker showing each party all receipts and disbursements affecting that party.

Michigan law requires real estate licensees who are acting as agents of sellers or buyers of real property to advise the potential sellers or buyers with whom they work of the nature of their agency relationship.

SELLER'S AGENTS

A seller's agent, under a listing agreement with the seller, acts solely on behalf of the seller. A seller can authorize a seller's agent to work with subagents, buyer's agents and/or transaction coordinators. A subagent of the seller is one who has agreed to work with the listing agent, and who, like the listing agent, acts solely on behalf of the seller. Seller's agents and their subagents will disclose to the seller known information about the buyer, which may be used to the benefit of the seller.

Individual services may be waived by the seller through execution of a limited service agreement. Only those services set forth in paragraph (2) (b), (c), and (d) above may be waived by the execution of a limited service agreement.

BUYER'S AGENTS

A buyer's agent, under a buyer's agency agreement with the buyer, acts solely on behalf of the buyer. A subagent of the buyer is one who has agreed to work with the buyer's agent and who, like the buyer's agent, acts solely on behalf of the buyer. Buyer's agents and their subagents will disclose to the buyer known information about the seller, which may be used to benefit the buyer.

Individual services may be waived by the buyer through execution of a limited service agreement. Only those services set forth in paragraph (2) (b), (c), and (d) above may be waived by the execution of a limited service agreement

DUAL AGENTS

A real estate licensee can be the agent of both the seller and the buyer in a transaction, but only with the knowledge and informed consent, in writing, of both the seller and the buyer.

DISCLOSURE REGARDING REAL ESTATE AGENCY RELATIONSHIPS FORM K 07/08

In such a dual agency situation, the licensee will not be able to disclose all known information to either the seller or the buyer. As a dual agent, the licensee will not be able to provide the full range of liduciary duties to the seller or the buyer.

The obligations of a dual agent are subject to any specific provisions set forth in any agreement between the dual agent, the seller and the buyer.

TRANSACTION COORDINATOR

A transaction coordinator is a licensee who is not acting as an agent of either the seller or the buyer, yet is providing services to complete the real estate transaction,

The transaction coordinator is not an agent for either party and therefore owes no fiduciary duty to either party. The transactional coordinator is not the advocate of either party and therefore has no obligation to "negotiate" for either party. The responsibilities of the transaction coordinator typically include:

- providing access to and the showing of the property.
- providing access to market information.
- providing assistance in the preparation of a buy and sell agreement which reflects the terms of the parties' agreement.
- presenting a buy and sell agreement and any subsequent counter-offers.
- assisting all parties in undertaking all steps necessary to carry out the agreement, such as the execution of documents, the obtaining of financing, the obtaining of inspections, etc.

DESIGNATED AGENCY

A buyer or seller with a designated agency agreement is represented only by agents specifically named in the agreement. Any agents of the firm not named in the agreement do not represent the buyer or seller. The named "designated" agent acts solely on behalf of his or her client and may only share confidential information about the client with the agent's supervisory broker who is also named in the agreement. Other agents in the firm have no duties to the buyer or seller and may act solely on behalf of another party in the transaction.

The city acquired this lot a few years ago because there was a county sewer initiative that included plans to bury a regional transmission line under a portion of this property. Those plans are no more, and the city is interested in selling this lot.

Information on this lot, including a map, is enclosed with this letter. Since the lot has little value to the public, the city desires to investigate interest by others in acquiring it. Because the lot is not buildable, the likely buyers are limited to the adjacent property owners. If you are interested in purchasing this lot, the city is taking 'final and best' offers in writing. The minimum offer that will be considered at this time for the entire lot is \$1,000.

It is expected that the lot would be transferred by a quit claim deed, with the city retaining a thirty (30) foot easement for the purpose of owning, operating, and maintaining an existing storm sewer. Thank you for going to the park for pictures of the tree planting today. I am so excited about the continued variety of trees we've been able to get from Frost Gardens on Torrey Rd., Flint township and Branching Out Nursery (formerly, Haddon) in Fenton. Both horticulturalists have worked to ensure that the variety of trees we get through the KGCB grants suit the soil and wet/dryness of the area. Elms Park has long had trouble with swampy regions. Now we hope to correct that naturally with the placement of river birches and red sunset maples in low lying areas and Ivory Silk Lilac trees in drought tolerant spots.

This year we received two K GCB grants; one for the City of Swartz Creek for \$958, the second for the Friends of Elms Park for \$740. Following is the list of trees received from Frost Gardens-Doug Frost is the contact person-238-6321:

Autumn Brilliance Serviceberry, Prairie Fire Crabapple, Chanticleer Pear, Green Mountain Sugar Maple, London Plane Tree, Gingko, Spring Snow Crabapple, Japanese tree lilac, Red Bud, River Birch, Catalpa.

These were planted in the area facing the volleyball Court and the Youth Football Building.

Next week-not definite on the day- Branching Out Nursery and Landscaping will give us:

River Birch, Valley Forge Elm-a new variety of elm that has been tested for 20 years by the US ABORETUM and found to be disease resistant, Red Sunset Maple, and Ivory Silk Lilac trees.

Since I began writing KGCB grants for the City, we have received 10 trees in Winchester Subdivision, 21 trees in Elms Park last year beginning in the front North West entry area and continuing down the fence line to where this year's trees are completing the project. (I think the final count will be 16 this year) For a total of 47 trees replacing those lost by the emerald ash borer beetle. I was helped so much through the joint efforts of Tom Svrcek's work crew-Dave, Rod, Jay and Rebecca and the volunteer efforts of a dedicated group of retirees-THE FRIENDS OF ELMS PARK-who maintain the pruning, repair, mulching, watering, painting, and vandalism repair of Elms Park. With their tireless efforts, along with those of the Scouts, Kiwanis, Lions Club and Rotary, our park is truly a jewel in our community. This year we welcomed the help of two school groups from Swartz Creek: Girls High School La Crosse Team and students from the Swartz Creek Learning hub under the direction of Mr. Rick Thompson.

We can now say that Elms Park is an Arboretum- a place where students and teachers can come to learn about the interdependency of trees, people, and wildlife.

The Friends of Elms Park are led by Joe Perrault, Rick Henry, Ron Schultz, Jim Florence, Larry Cummings,

Dave West, Dennis Herman, Rae Lynn Hicks and Pat Williams.

- <u>17- 3" X 100"</u> Many of theses sections of hose failed hose testing in 2013. They have small "pin hole" leaks and tend to sweat while they are under pressure. While these pieces of hose did not burst under pressure, sweating and pin hole leaks or any water seeping through the weave of the fire hose is a failure. This hose was manufactured in the late 90's and has already been replaced.
- 3-2 1/2" X 25" NFPA 1962 requires any fire hose manufactured prior to 1987 be replaced due to age and high risk of failure. I cant find accurate records on this hose, but I presume it was manufactured in the 70's. This hose has already been replaced.
- 11-2 1/2" X 50' NFPA 1962 requires any fire hose manufactured prior to 1987 be replaced due to age and high risk of failure. This hose was manufactured at various times through the 70's early to mid 80's. This fire hose is a cotton jacketed version which means the cotton jacket will rot if rolled up or re-loaded on a truck while it is wet. Dear Sirs:

Attached, you will find the 2015 Proposed Budget for the Swartz Creek Area Fire Department (SCAFD). On August 28, 2014, a meeting was held with City Manager Zettel, Township Supervisor Gehringer, Township Treasurer Caruso, Accountant Clerical Specialist Borse, Assistant Chief Merriam and myself. The results of the meeting produced the attached document. The 2015 gross budget amount is now \$300,234.50, which is a 8.58% increase from 2014. The 2014 budget is \$276,505.00. The line item that was originally created to purchase the new apparatus loose equipment (\$43,000.00) was moved to Fire Equipment-Maintenance/Repair/Upgrades (Acct.#978) and cut approximately in half. The remaining amount associated with loose equipment will be presented for purchase in 2016. In addition, quotes were received, at the suggestion of Clayton Township, for term life insurance for personnel. Those amounts are included in line item 4910.

An apparatus replacement schedule is included with the budget packet. Based on communications made during the recent apparatus purchase, a multi-purpose pumper tanker, is scheduled to be ordered in 2019, with delivery in 2020, five (5) years from the current purchase. Provisions for replacing Grass 27 and Squad 26 are based on an "as needed" basis since the amount associated with a purchase for each unit, compared to a pumper, is less than 25% or under \$100,000 per unit. A 4 door crew cab 1 ton diesel pickup truck generally can be purchased under \$75,000. Unit prices beyond the 2019 are based on the 2008 department evaluation.

Recent developments, associated with station 2, include the donation of land adjacent to the rear parking lot, that allows access to Corunna Rd. It is hopeful, enough aggregate will be provided to raise the current rear parking lot to minimize the standing water at the west end.



NARRATIVE

- 1. Project Summary- The City of Swartz Creek seeks funding for the paving of two local streets and a subdivision. Construction on Yarmy Street will include several joint and patch repairs followed by milling at a depth of ¾" and the placement of ¾" of pavement. Worchester Drive will be fully reconstructed, resulting in 7" of asphalt over 6" of an aggregate base. The subdivision of Park Ridge will be milled and repaved on the portion of Park Ridge Parkway from Elms Road to Silver Maple Lane this portion will also include several joint repairs. A slurry seal will be applied to the remainder of Park Ridge Parkway and the adjacent streets within the subdivision; these streets include Hickory Lane, Birch Lane, Mountain Ash Court, Red Oak Lane, Locust Lane, and Silver Maple Lane. All paving and slurry sealing will be completed with rubber modified product.
- 2. Why the project should be funded If the City is awarded a Scrap Tire Market Development Grant, this will be the second project using rubberized asphalt in Swartz Creek. Although rubberized asphalt has been utilized by villages and cities throughout Michigan as an overlay, the City of Swartz Creek seeks to expand its usability by way of a tire rubber modified slurry seal. Because of the high percentage of crumb rubber present in this modified slurry seal, it is estimated that a staggering 2,000 tires are used per ton of material compared with 1 tire per ton of traditional rubber modified asphalt. By utilizing scrap tires in the rubber modified product, this project will help reduce the surplus of scrap tire piles, which is consistent with the goals of the MDEQ.
- 3. Projected Quantity / Source The total asphalt quantity is estimated at 3,780 tons, from this it is expected that 3,780 scrap tires will be incorporated into the asphalt binder mix. The total slurry quantity is estimated at 102 tons. From this figure it is estimated that scrap tires will make up 10% of this quantity by weight, resulting in an estimated 2,025 scrap tires. These two products will result in a total of 5,805 scrap tires being used. All material will come from one of the approved Michigan Scrap Tire Processing plants.

SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE BILL NO. 4271

A bill to regulate medical marihuana provisioning centers and other related entities; to provide for the powers and duties of certain state and local governmental officers and entities; to provide immunity for persons engaging in medical marihuana-related activities in compliance with this act; to prescribe penalties and sanctions and provide remedies; and to allow the promulgation of rules.

 - (c) Provide adequate lighting in all areas where food or food ingredients are examined, processed, or stored, and in hand washing areas, toilet rooms, and places where equipment or utensils are cleaned.
 - (d) Provide adequate ventilation or control equipment to minimize odors and noxious fumes, dust, or vapors, including steam, in areas where they may contaminate food.
 - (e) Ensure that all provisioning center equipment and utensils are suitable for their intended use and are designed and constructed with material and workmanship that allows them to be cleanable and properly maintained.
 - (f) Ensure that the provisioning center is properly equipped with adequate sanitary facilities and accommodations.
 - (g) Ensure that the provisioning center has a water supply that is sufficient for the operations intended and is derived from an approved source.
 - (h) Ensure that all sewage and liquid waste is disposed of in a public or municipal sewerage system, or, if an adequate public disposal system is not available, in an approved septic tank system or by another acceptable method that does not create a nuisance, insanitary condition, or public health hazard.
 - (i) Provide employees with adequate, completely enclosed toilet rooms and conveniently located associated hand washing facilities that are maintained in a sanitary condition and kept in good repair at all times.
 - (j) Provide adequate and convenient facilities for hand washing that are furnished with hot and cold or tempered running water, effective

House Bill No. 4271 (H-3) as amended December 12, 2013 (2 of 3) hand cleaning and sanitizing preparations, disposable sanitary towel service or suitable drying devices, and easily cleanable waste receptacles.

- (k) Provide for conveying, storing, and disposal of rubbish and offal in a manner that minimizes odor, prevents waste from becoming an attractant or a harbor or breeding place for vermin, and prevents contamination of food, food contact surfaces, ground surfaces, and water supplies.
- (l) Maintain the building, fixtures, and other physical facilities of the provisioning center in good repair and in sanitary condition.
- (m) Prohibit live birds or other animals in the provisioning center, except that a guide dog accompanying a blind person is permitted in selling areas.
- (n) Clean all utensils and product contact surfaces of equipment as frequently as necessary to prevent contamination of food and food products and all nonproduct contact surfaces of equipment used in food preparation areas as frequently as necessary to minimize accumulation of dust, dirt, food particles, and other debris.
- (o) Conduct all operations in receiving, inspecting, transporting, packaging, segregating, preparing, processing, and food storing areas in accordance with good sanitation principles and take all reasonable precautions to assure that production procedures do not contribute contamination, such as filth, harmful chemicals, undesirable microorganisms, or any other objectionable material, to the processed product.
- (p) Conduct all food processing, packaging, storage, and transporting of food under conditions and controls that minimize the potential for undesirable bacterial or other microbiological growth, toxin formation, or deterioration or contamination of the processed product, product ingredients, or product containers.
- (q) Ensure that all food and drink is clean and wholesome, and manufactured, handled, stored, prepared, transported, offered for sale, and sold in a manner that keeps it safe for human consumption.
- (r) Not allow an individual who is affected by a disease in a communicable form, a carrier of such a disease, or afflicted with boils, sores, infected wounds, or other abnormal sources of microbiological contamination to work in the provisioning center in any capacity in which there is a reasonable possibility that food or food ingredients will become contaminated or that the disease will be transmitted to other individuals.
- (s) Require all individuals working in direct contact with food preparation, food ingredients, or surfaces coming into contact with food ingredients to do all of the following:
- (i) Wear clean outer garments, maintain a high degree of personal cleanliness, and conform to hygienic practices while on duty to the extent necessary to prevent contamination of food products.
- (ii) Before starting work, after each absence from the work station, and at any other time when hands may have become soiled or contaminated, wash their hands thoroughly in an adequate hand washing facility and sanitize their hands if necessary to prevent contamination.

- (iii) Remove any jewelry that cannot be adequately sanitized and all insecure jewelry from hands when food is manipulated by hand.
- (iv) Maintain any gloves used in food handling in an intact, clean, and sanitary condition and use only gloves made of an impermeable material, except when that usage would be inappropriate or incompatible with the work involved.
- (v) Wear effective hairnets, headbands, or caps to constrain the hair properly.
- $\left(vi\right)$ Refrain from storing clothing or other personal belongings, eating, drinking, or using tobacco in any form in areas where food or food ingredients are exposed, or in areas used for washing equipment or utensils.
- (vii) Take any other necessary precautions to prevent contamination of foods with microorganisms or other foreign substances, including, but not limited to, perspiration, hair, cosmetics, tobacco, chemicals, and medicants.]
- 13 (3) Subsection (2) does not prohibit a municipality from
- 14 imposing additional regulations on medical marihuana provisioning
- 15 centers that elect to manufacture and distribute a marihuana-
- 16 infused product.
 - [(4) The local county health department shall inspect a provisioning center at least annually for compliance with subsections (2) and (3). The provisioning center shall pay for all costs associated with the inspection under this subsection.]
