ROUTINE BUSINESS – REVISITED ISSUES / PROJECTS

✓ MICHIGAN TAX TRIBUNAL APPEALS (Update)

Huizinga (office at 6195 Miller) – This case was settled one day prior to the scheduled hearing (April 30th). The settlement included 2017 and 2018 for an assessed and taxable value of \$50,000. To prevent another immediate appeal for the current tax year (2019), the assessor had them add 2019 for an assessed and taxable of \$51,200. The assessor reports that they were very difficult to work with and would not discuss settlement until a week prior to the hearing. The current taxable value was approximately \$69,000.

The local Board of Review process is complete, but commercial/industrial appeals go straight to the Michigan Tax Tribunal. We are not yet aware of any, but we will keep the council informed as we move through spring and early summer.

✓ **STREETS** (See Individual Category)

✓ 2017-2020 TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP) (No Change in Status) Consumers Energy has their gas contractor replacing leads along Fairchild & Helmsley prior to the street work. This is a best practice to make sure infrastructure is getting upgraded in the right order (e.g. road breaks for underground work will not occur AFTER the road is replaced).

We held our preconstruction meeting with the state MDOT, staff, the contractor and our consultant on April 10th. Our street contractor is expected to begin on June 10 and be substantially complete prior to schools starting in the fall. The project includes a mill and resurface of the road way. We are also converting overhead street lights to LED and adding two additional LED pedestrian lights. Enhanced crosswalks are included in the project as well. Traffic should remain open throughout the project.

✓ 2020-2023 TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP) (No Change in Status) Morrish Road from Bristol to Miller has been funded. The city has committed the match portion to this project, which is 80-20. It is unclear what year this project will be undertaken, but we want it done subsequent to the USDA water main work. This MAY span two construction seasons.

Note that we will likely need to engage in the Qualified Bidding Selection process to pre-certify engineering firms to work on federal projects. The QBS process is something that the city has routinely done to stay compliant and to have a good faith process for ensuring quality and competitive engineering services. This process was last finalized on November 25, 2013. I am going to split this out as a separate business item until it is complete. I intend to begin this process in late spring.

✓ STREET PROJECT UPDATES (Update)

This is a standing section of the report on the status of streets as it relates to our dedicated levy, 20 year plan, ongoing projects, state funding, and committee work. Information from previous reports can be found in prior city council packets.

Helmsley Drive is a go for 2019 reconstruction. With the school schedule now known, the start date is officially June 10. The contractor is Glaeser Dawes. The project includes full depth road reconstruction, new drive approaches, new sidewalk (for areas not included in the previous water main replacement), some forestry, and three new pedestrian LED's.

The engineering proposal for 2020 local streets with OHM is approved and work is underway. The scope includes a section of Oakview, Chelmsford, and Oxford (including the last small stretch of Winston). Note that it is unlikely we will have a budget to do all of those sections in 2020 since state revenues have not been forthcoming as expected. However, it is work that needs to be completed for the USDA watermain on those streets in the next three years.

Notable issues currently include the proposed layout and ownership (school or city) of the bus lane on Oakview by Syring. We will liaise with the school regarding this and how they wish to proceed with the bond improvements.

✓ WATER – SEWER ISSUES PENDING (See Individual Category)

✓ **SEWER REHABILITATION PROGRAM** (No Change in Status)

We have flow meters installed at key collector lines in the city. We need to ascertain what the remaining capacity is before we can enable the progress of new projects (Applecreek, Springbrook East expansion, future Morrish Road users, etc). If the lines are not sized properly, investment may be warranted. This would alter our rehabilitation plan to include capital investment for future users. For this reason, we are not altering rates until the capacity information is available.

2018-2019 winter sewer projects have been approved. The scope includes lining improvements and video service at a cost of \$197,772. There are some small connections between collectors in the Winchester Village that need to be done. Liquiforce will also complete the large collector on Durwood and a downtown line, School Street. As of writing, the lining crew is in town!

This multi-year program is on schedule and budget. Based upon current rates and existing fund balance, staff may recommend expending more in the next year or two on the sewer rehabilitation plan in order to get some higher risk assets completed more quickly.

✓ WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT (No Change in Status)

The USDA has reviewed the first draft agreement and made recommendations. We are following through. The Kroger easement has been executed. We also have a request by the engineer to consider zinc coated pipe, which could be an innovation that reduces costs (pipe thickness) and increases durability. We are checking. The previous report follows:

A water use agreement is being reviewed by USDA staff. Easements for public water main that are required, but previously undocumented, are now complete and we are seeking signatures from Kroger and the school to make them official. Engineering continues. Bond counsel and other team members have been tentatively assembled and await progress. The previous report follows:

On September 13th, we met with the feds about other steps and conditions of funding. We are in a good position to benefit from the nearly \$5,000,000 grant/loan, with the understanding that we will be putting the project out to bid in 2019, with some components to be completed in 2020 and 2021.

Concerning the Genesee County Drain Commission - Water and Waste Services Division Water Master Plan, we received notice that they are considering a northern loop to provide redundancy and stability to the system. This is good news since Gaines and Clayton Township rely on the overstressed Miller line. There is currently not any cost or participation information available. I will keep the council informed.

The city has been working with the county to abandon the Dye Road water main in the vicinity of the rail line. Note that we are holding this action pending the master plan review. This line is prone to breaks, which can be very costly and dangerous near the rail spur. The intention would be to connect our customers to the other side of the street, onto the county line. It appears the transition cost would be about \$25,000. We will work with the county on this matter and report back on our findings.

Lastly, the city should probably complete full demolition on the "Brown Road" site (the old well head) and sell this property. This is not a high priority, but it is now on our radar.

✓ HERITAGE VACANT LOTS (No Change of Status)

The last of the lots acquired prior to the special assessment have been approved for sale. The city has two more lots that were acquired through the tax reversion process. If there is no objection, I will look to prepare instruments for the two units acquired in 2017 at new, negotiated pricing if requested by the buyer, JW Morgan, at some point in the future.

✓ **NEWSLETTER** (No Change of Status)

The spring newsletter is out. Let me know what you think.

✓ CONSTRUCTION & DEVELOPMENT UPDATE (Update)

This will be a standing section of the report that provides a consolidated list for a brief status on public and private construction/developmental projects in the city.

- 1. The **streetscape project on Miller Road** has been approved for construction. The start date is scheduled for June 3. Holland Square is to be paved and illuminated, with a decorative fence/wall. Miller Road is to have lighting, landscaping, new walkways, knee walls, and pedestrian crossings.
- 2. The reconstruction of the expanded **Sharp Funeral Home** continues and should be done in summer of 2019. This is a ~14,000 square foot building in downtown.

- 3. **Façade grants** are complete for Robertson Insurance and Howe Art Supplies (she still intends to paint the doors). Renovations on 5015 Holland and 7530 Miller are pending. All work (public and private) will be in excess of \$250,000.
- 4. The city hopes to commence construction on **about \$1 million of grant support recreational path in 2020**. The MDOT grant is conditionally awarded and we await word on the DNR grant portion.
- 5. The Chamber, Women's Club, and other downtown business owners continue to plan and expand **events in downtown**. The Fall Family Fun Day is expanding into the Jeepers Creekers event, which will cover multiple weekends in October of 2019. This will include a zombie walk, city-wide decorating, trunk or treat, separate youth and adult movie nights, and related activities.
- 6. The **raceway has new ownership**. They intend to use the site for thoroughbred horse racing, but they did not get state approval for live races or simulcasting in 2019. They are open to finding additional users for the site to supplement the racing. They are also communicating well in regards to partnering with community groups such as Hometown Days. I find the new owners to be very astute and capable.
- 7. A Flint based group has a purchase option for **Mary Crapo.** The intent is to use the building and site for senior housing. This would result in new residents in the downtown and the potential for new construction on part of that site.
- 8. The **school bond** passed and many improvements are expected in 2019 throughout the district. Total investment for this effort will exceed \$50 million over two to three years.
- 9. **Street repair in 2019** is to include Fairchild (with decorative lighting) and Helmsley (full reconstruct). The city also has grants and loans for about **\$5 million in water main work** to occur between 2020 and 2022.
- 10. The **Applecreek Station** development of 48 townhomes is in the engineering phase. These units range in size from 1,389 to 1,630 square feet, with garages. Construction will occur on vacant land in the back of the development, by Springbrook Colony. Site engineering plans have just been submitted by the owner. Rents are expected to be about \$1.00 per square foot (~ \$1,600 a month) which matches rents in Winchester Village. If this project occurs in 2019, 2020 DDA revenues will be positively and substantially improved.
- 11. The **Brewer Condo Project** is moving to site plan. This includes 15 townhome condos off Morrish Road in downtown. They are approximately 1,750 square feet, with two car garages and basements.
- 12. The city council approved the use of **state tax incentives** and local utility waivers for redevelopment sites in downtown, rounding out our efforts to be a certified Redevelopment Ready Community.
- 13. There are **soft inquiries for vacant downtown land** for new buildings/users. However, there has not been any new movement on this issue.

✓ HOLLAND SQUARE & STREETSCAPE (Update)

Green Tech Systems, LLC has been approved to construct the 2019 streetscape project by the city council and DDA. The preconstruction meeting was held on April 10. This project appears to be in good hands and will commence on or about June 3rd, after Hometown Days. The city's engineer and contractor are working on details for masonry specifications and pedestrian island installation. We are also working with Consumers Energy to convert this entire section of street (Morrish to Hayes) to LED for overhead and pedestrian lights. Some of the overhead lights are already converted, but we have concerns over the timeliness of the decorative lights.

We finally had the last probe stub pole removed! However we are not getting cooperation from all property owners in the improvement zone as it relates to temporary and permanent easements for construction.

✓ **TRAILS** (No Change of Status)

The second application to the DNR Trust Fund grant has been submitted. We await notification, which should come this fall.

The DNR grant is crucial to offset the 35% that the city must cover to match the Enhancement Grant. The MDOT Enhancement Grant is conditionally awarded. We hope this covers 65% of the investment. Work with Consumers Energy and CN Rail is positive for those project components that require their engagement. We are still working with the MTA and GM on some easements and permissions.

Note that the city will still be heavily invested in this, even if both grants are awarded. Count on a general fund outlay of \$200,000 for the local match and additional engineering, construction, and inspection services. Any overages (price changes and change orders) will be locally covered as well.

The project timeline will be revised. At its core, it should still reflect a 2020 construction timeframe. The difference is that we plan to engineer the project sooner than anticipated so we can bid it upon a conditional DNR award in a year's time.

✓ REDEVELOPMENT READY COMMUNITIES (Business Item x2)

The planning commission continues to work on zoning amendments. A public hearing was held on April 2nd. Based upon input, additional changes are proposed, and another hearing is likely in June. We expect completion by June or July.

The commission also reviewed a draft of the public participation strategy in April. The council had this plan in one of the April packets. Since then, the required flow charts are included, and the strategy is ready for acceptance. This is another crucial piece to the puzzle that brings us closer to certification. A resolution is included.

The Economic Development Strategy is complete, and the planning commission has reviewed it. Within the document, we find a strong sense that downtown design, function, and events are a priority that will require a strong partnership with the city, DDA, and Chamber of Commerce. Much of what is in here is reflected in the city's other functional documents, but the state MEDC requires a consolidation of economic initiatives in this plan, as crafted by their consultants. Though there is not a lot of new findings or recommendations, it is an important statement and will add value. A resolution is included to accept this. See the quarterly RRC report (March 11, 2019 packet) for details on progress. In short, the following RRC components are still pending:

- Development review flowchart and checklist
- Economic Development Strategy (business item)
- Public participation plan and tracking methods (business item)
- Property marketing packages, including incentives (see incentives section)

✓ **DOG PARK** (No Change of Status)

Following the GFWC donation at our meeting on the 11th, the scouts are apparently within about \$1,000 of their goal. I am hopeful they can make this a 2019 project.

✓ **DURAND AREA INDUSTRY - PROJECT TIM** (No Change of Status)

This project seems cold and quiet. However, it appears there are still valid purchase agreements in place for the development, and there are state and local bureaucrats continuing work on contingency plans for utility and traffic modelling. It is anyone's guess at this point. Please see prior packets for information on the project and its evolution.

✓ **TAX REVERTED PROPERTY USE** (No Change of Status)

I expect transactions for the approved sales of vacant land on Wade Street and in Heritage Village before June.

✓ **8002 MILLER** (No Change of Status)

The contractor is working. A completion timeline has not been set. Time is on our side with this since it gives the user more time to establish their new business and contribute more monthly payments to the project.

✓ GROUNDWATER WITHDRAWAL ORDINANCE (Update)

The Michigan-based consultant that is working for Exxon contacted us in April. They are working with the state on finalizing the groundwater withdrawal ordinance for Holland Square. This is something that still needs to be approved by the city council per the executed site license agreement.

The consultant is also looking to close another chapter in this saga by getting permission from the state to remove the monitoring wells on this site. This would make our development and maintenance of Holland Square much easier. As of writing, this appears likely.

Concerning the ordinance, the practical impact of this is small since wells are no longer permitted in the city and there are no known 'grandfathered' wells in the impacted area. The city attorney sees no issues with this ordinance, so we will look to have this before the council when Exxon and their consultant are confident the timing is right.

The council held a public hearing at our meeting on April 23, 2018. ExxonMobil, the Michigan DEQ, and other representatives spent the last year reaching out to property owners to research if there are any well impacts.

✓ SCHOOL FACILITY PROPOSAL (No Change of Status)

The school received high bids for initial security work. They are rebidding with the addition of fall/winter work in the hopes that the scope and timing of the new work expectations will be more enticing to contractors. It is expected that elementary security entrances and related work will be the first phase of the investment.

Additional bond work shall continue in 2020 and 2021. It will include all facilities, including athletic facilities at the high school. We expect cooperation and benefit in terms of establishing safer connections for walkers, better land grades (e.g. the football field), and more attractive gateways.

✓ BREWER TOWNHOMES (Update)

I expect a site plan to be on the July planning commission agenda. It is possible it could be submitted in time for the June 4th meeting. The previous report follows:

The developer, RBF Construction, has submitted a substantially complete site plan to the DDA. The concept now includes expanded use of porches (lower and upper levels) to enable more 'protected space' for occupants to enjoy and observe the outdoors, while maintaining their privacy. This concept went over very well with the DDA, who made some material, layout, and maintenance recommendations. The plan still includes fifteen two-story homes, with two car garages and basements, on the property across from the post office.

You will also note the proposed name. Brett Jory spent some time considering the character of the area in the larger community context. He believes that naming the townhomes after the late Brigadier General Margaret Brewer is appropriate due to the proximity to the Veterans Memorial. General Brewer was a Swartz Creek native, attended the Ryno School at the crossroads of Miller and Van Vleet, and the first General of the United States Marine Corps. I am not sure what steps can be taken to gauge the interest of the family, but I support the concept to promote some community character, while memorializing a most worthy person.

I expect the planning commission to have this in front of them for site plan consideration in May or June. In tandem with this, **the city council will be deliberating the entire project from the standpoint of a land owner/partner, incentives, and site plan.** This will include consideration of quality of life impact, sale instruments, site plan specifics, and condominium documents (deed and bylaws). There is a lot going on, so please expect to have many facets to look at as this project approaches final consideration in May and June.

✓ SPORTS CREEK RACEWAY & GAMING COMMISSION (No Change of Status)

I have asked the owner to attend a council meeting, as requested. He indicates a willingness to do so, but he has requested additional time to see to essential matters. The previous report follows:

The property has sold! Staff met with the new owners, utilities have been transferred, and we have recorded a property transfer affidavit. It appears the plan is to proceed with use of the raceway for thoroughbred racing, however the state approvals and legislation relating to this are not looking promising. It appears that 2019 live racing and simulcasting are unlikely.

The owner appears very communicative and interested in making the facility more community oriented. They are open to cooperative planning, potential reuse of parts of the site, and engaging in stronger hospitality uses related to racing. However, there are many unknown and important circumstances at play, such as the racing industry as regulated by the state, the potential (right or wrong) for sports gambling, and demand from Project Tim.

Summarily, I believe the transfer will enable some sort of positive economic use in the years to come, but the path is not clear at this point due to the circumstances. However, I have a high degree of trust and confidence in the owner so far and will wait for the dust to settle for them with a renewed sense of optimism.

Future reports will obviously follow. Immediate steps for us are to work with the owner on site safety and compliance, as well as the potential for short term use as a horse racing venue. We will also connect them with our Downtown Development Authority and the Redevelopment Ready Communities Program state resources.

✓ **CDBG** (No Change of Status)

At this point, we are looking to upgrade street name/stop signs in the downtown area using these funds. I will keep the council informed of the timeline.

✓ FACILITY LIGHT CONVERSION (Update)

Work is complete, and we already have our first transaction amounts in. Projections look favorable to the city. I am certain we will have reports in the future, especially after the first full year, by which to gauge use and savings. The program is expected to save \$3,000 in the first year and about \$180,000 overall.

✓ SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL (Update)

The city and school have approved cooperation to proceed with the technical assistance grant offered by the Crim Fitness Foundation. We had a meeting on April 23rd to kick things off, and I am including Cade's report from that, which paints a pretty good picture of where we are at. Please check it out.

✓ INCENTIVE PACKAGES & RRC PROPERTIES (Update)

The Planning Commission has been given the preliminary data necessary to consider an incentive policy or set of guidelines. Because of their workload, an introduction to the concept was all that occurred at their May meeting. I expect the resulting policy to take 3-4 months to complete.

Per our council resolution, specific instruments by which we can target commercial and industrial properties downtown, include:

- 1. Public Act 198 of 1974: Industrial Property Tax Abatement
- 2. Public Act 255 of 1978: Commercial Redevelopment Act
- 3. Public Act 210 of 2005: Commercial Rehabilitation Act Tax Abatement
- 4. Water & Sewer Connection Fee Waiver Policy
- 5. Tax Increment Financing Public Improvements (already enabled via the façade program)

6. Expedited permitting

Suggested policy provisions include incentives for:

- 1. RRC sites
- 2. Hospitality, culture, entertainment, and recreational uses
- 3. Historic preservation and/or consideration
- 4. Build-to lines for development (little or no setbacks)
- 5. Outdoor uses
- 6. Walkable design
- 7. Mixed uses
- 8. Multiple stories
- 9. Total investment and job creation

I do not expect this policy to be prescriptive or rigid in nature. Instead, the council will have latitude to consider each project independently and award any incentives on an incremental/percentage basis using the site-specific circumstances.

✓ BUILDING AND ZONING SERVICE DELIVERY (Update)

Our staff and that of Mundy are beginning the conversion by installing use parameters in the software. The staff at Mundy, having done this already on their end, indicate the process could take up to four months to go live. The previous report follows.

We have ordered services to upgrade the functionality of our integrated software (BS&A) to enhance building and zoning matters. The enhancements will improve our internal work flow/checklists and increase our online abilities by enabling the integration with the existing BS&A platforms. This means that we will be using less paper and relying more on digital submissions of applications, as well as the potential for online payment and permit delivery. Projects, both big and small, will then be coordinated and viewable by all users (Swartz Creek and Mundy) within the software at all times.

This is an enhancement that Mundy staff are already engaged in and will look to apply their knowledge to bring us into the 21st century as well. In fact, combined with other RRC initiatives, this should make us cutting edge among municipalities. I will keep the council informed.

✓ SWARTZ CREEK STUDENT COUNCIL COLOR RUN (Update)

The group has approval for their color run on Saturday, May 18, 2019 from 5pm to 7pm, using the same route as originally applied for. Let me know if there are any issues resulting from this event.

✓ NON-COMMERCIAL MARIJUANA REGULATIONS (Update)

Regardless of the position of the city regarding commercial activities for medical and recreational marijuana, there are still regulatory considerations for residential growing, processing, possessing, and using. There are also concerns with outdoor and/or public use. Chief Bade and Councilmember Hicks have been educating themselves, as have I, about the pitfalls observed with individual home operations/use and public use.

Generally, the concerns boil down to odor, as it relates to neighborhood and public impacts of growing and use. There is also concern for the scope and scale of residential growing as it relates to safe irrigation, lighting, ventilation, etc. Problems associated with home growing include odor, mold, pests, electrical fires, and theft.

To address these issues, I have been consulting the city attorney about providing regulations related to home grows (inside, outside and accessory structures; number of plants; applicability of building codes). Many codes already exist and can be enforced. However, ventilation is a tough one. For this, regulators recommend a general odor ordinance. This is something we are looking into.

On the use side, we are considering options for ordinances that might control outdoor consumption. This will almost certainly include publicly owned lands and rights of way. There is also consideration for outdoor use on private property as well.

I expect to work with Metro and our attorney in the coming weeks to create some ordinance language to regulate grow operations at residences, as well as outdoor use. Should the city adopt an ordinance to opt out of all commercial recreational marijuana activities (see Recreational Marijuana Ordinance below), this ordinance may also be the conduit to control general marijuana activities.

✓ CENSUS COMPLETE COUNT COMMITTE (Update)

Mr. Cramer will lead the Swartz Creek Complete Count Committee. I am hopeful that we will have more resources for him to use as we proceed. At this time, there are no meetings or activities planned. The 2020 census count will be vital to the city's ability to understand our service needs and in calculating many state and federal funding streams.

✓ **OTHER COMMUNICATIONS & HAPPENINGS** (See Individual Category)

✓ MONTHLY REPORTS (Update)

There are a couple additional reports included from April. Contact myself prior or during our meeting with questions.

✓ **BOARDS & COMMISSIONS** (See Individual Category)

✓ PLANNING COMMISSION (Update)

The planning commission met on May 7th. The commission did a very detailed analysis and review of draft language of the zoning code. The revisions include changes to conditional uses, site plan review standards, condominiums, and the related land use category sections. This was a lot of work by everyone!

I am confident that the revisions have us very close to final form. A public hearing will again be held at the June meeting, and I expect a recommendation to approve. Council should see the ordinances in final form at their June 10 meeting. See the online planning commission packet for details.

In addition, the planning commission did a final review of the Swartz Creek Economic Development Strategy. This is in the packet for acceptance. See the report section on Redevelopment Ready Communities for details.

Lastly, incentives were introduced. There was not deliberation or comment due to the heavy meeting agenda, but we should be on schedule for a late summer adoption of guidelines for incentive use.

The next meeting is scheduled for June 4th. I expect the zoning changes and the Fortino Town Home site plan to be on the agenda.

✓ DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY (Update)

The DDA met on May 8th. They heard an update concerning the bridal shop façade project, the 2020 budget, and new training opportunities for officials. They will convene for budget adoption in June, at their regular meeting on the 13th.

✓ ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS (Update)

We have a filing for a dimensional variance. However, based upon site circumstances, it appears this may not be necessary. I will keep the council informed.

✓ PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION (Update)

The Park Board met on May 1st at city hall. The draft minutes are included. Summer projects include staining parts of the Elms playscape, the Elms trail loop, Abrams Park forestry, and the potential for the dog park.

The next meeting will be on June 5th.

✓ BOARD OF REVIEW (No Change of Status)

The BoR held hearings on:

March 18th 9am-12pm & 6pm-9pm March 19th 9am-12pm March 20th 9am-12pm

Though I do not have a detailed report of the 26 cases that were heard, my understanding is that ten were disabled veteran exemptions.

NEW BUSINESS / PROJECTED ISSUES & PROJECTS

✓ HOMETOWN DAYS PERMITS (Business Item)

Included with the packet are the resolutions related to the Hometown Days events for 2019, with the exception of the 5K footrace. I have also included the applications for street use for the general grounds and parade. Insurance documents, property permission slips, and related documents will be collected and verified by staff as a condition of the approval.

An additional resolution is included for the traffic control barricade rental cost. The city has always absorbed the cost of the contracted cost for barricade rental, and has formalized this contribution formally for the last four years via resolution. Prior to this, it

was unclear if the cost was billable to Hometown Days or if it was a city cost. This practice resulted in the generation of invoices that were eventually written off as uncollectable. The solution is to have the city council affirm or deny the appropriation. I wrote a resolution in the affirmative to start since this conforms to prior year expectations. The cost is not expected to exceed approximately \$1,750.

✓ 5K FOOT RACE PERMIT (Business Item)

The annual race during the kickoff of Hometown Days is back! We have approved this as a stand-along permit the last two years. Though it coincides with Hometown Days, it is a separate group conducting a separate event and should be distinguished as such. The route and other operations are the same. Reviews are complete, and we have a resolution to enable this street permit.

✓ PRELIMINARY SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS (Business Item)

Included with the packet is the list of all current special assessments for snow removal (sidewalks) for the 2019 tax roll. Letters went out notifying those with invoices of the application of these debts to the tax roll if unpaid by May 31st (cash or money order only after May 23rd). Some of these will likely be paid before that time but council will need to review the initial list of items for information purposes. A resolution to move this forward is included.

✓ BUDGET (Business Item)

We have a draft budget prepared and available for council members. We can field questions and take comments at both May meetings, with the public hearing proposed for May 28th. The budget can then be formally adopted at the first meeting in June. A resolution is included to set the hearing.

We continue to add data into the budget book, with the first full version available last year. The budget now includes the city's capital improvement plan, useful visual aids, departmental narratives, and much more.

In additional to being able to supply more details about how the budget ties into our goals and objectives through the use of user-friendly summaries and illustrations, Mrs. Korth has been investing time in creating new wage tables and estimates for standard operating expenses. We believe this will provide a more accurate picture of our base operating level and enable more nuanced input regarding any capital investments and discretionary spending.

The full budget book will be ready by the second meeting in May. For now, the budget is purely a numerical, functional instrument. Please see the digital copy and feel free to contact myself or Mrs. Korth with questions, comments, or for a detailed sit-down explanation of any and all features.

As you consider this draft and the date of the public hearing, please also consider the need for a special workshop. If needed, we can convene the council at a special date and time to go into more detail with our budget. We can discuss this at the meeting.

✓ **RECREATIONAL MARIJUANA ORDINANCE** (Business Item)

Included with the packet is some information related to the municipal 'opt out' for commercial activities related to recreational marijuana. Though we were initially under the impression that no action translated to opting out, we now can affirm that an ordinance is necessary to demonstrate this.

I am including some information from the Michigan Municipal league as it relates to this. I am also including an example of an ordinance from Sterling Heights. As you can see, it doesn't take much, but if Swartz Creek is to affirm its position of opting out, then something like this will be required.

I have this on the agenda for discussion only. My opinion is that the community has already made its decision on this matter by virtue of the well vetted process we explored previously. As such, the council can proceed immediately (May 28th) with a general ordinance. However, if other positions are advocated, this can be sent to the planning commission for consideration, among other options. I hope to get a sense of the council's desire at our meeting.

✓ INTERSECTION SAFETY STUDY (Business Item)

Included with the packet is a proposal from OHM to study the intersection of Cappy and Fairchild. This intersection has justifiably garnered much attention in recent months as an area of concern. Despite having this be a focus for the Safe Routes to School focus, we still need to have a professional and qualified review to understand the function and options for this intersection.

I propose we get ahead of this process and bring the results of such a study to the public before we begin discussions about this intersection and corridor. OHM has qualified staff that can study the intersection and recommend options. The scope of work and fee for services (\$1,500) is attached. I recommend we proceed.

Council Questions, Inquiries, Requests, Comments, and Notes

Miller Settlement Award: It looks like this will be presented at the City Council meeting on Tuesday, May 28th.

7512 Grove Street: A citation ordering a court appearance was written in February. The last time we show taxes being paid to the city was 2008. Because the property has not gone into tax foreclosure, one can assume the taxes were paid in sufficient amounts to the county treasurer. The property is currently in foreclosure proceedings at the County but has not officially announced an auction of the properties not redeemed. It appears on their website as delinquent and in possible foreclosure. The city will not be paid for any previous weed assessments from prior years. If the city invests in any repairs to this property during private ownership/foreclosure, it would become a special assessment and we would not be reimbursed.

Citizen Recommendations: Myself, and at least one council member, have been contacted by a city resident that wishes to see a law prohibiting plastic shopping bags and glitter.

GAIN Membership: GAIN dues were paid January 4, 2019 in the amount of \$500.



PLANNING PROCESS

This economic development strategy for the City of Swartz Creek is a collaborative planning project between the MEDC's Redevelopment Ready Communities program and the City of Swartz Creek. The result of this project will be an economic roadmap to assist with job creation, marketing and branding along with redevelopment and investment strategies for the community. These actions will both strengthen and diversify the local economy. The roadmap will also help guide the coordinated effort between the I-69 Thumb Region, Genesee County and the City of Swartz Creek to work in a cooperative manner that will integrate aspects of the regional economic development strategy with the local economic development effort.

When creating an economic development strategy, it is important to answer several questions.

- 1. Who are the largest employers in the community?
- 2. What drives the local economy?
- 3. What is the city's role in the larger region?
- 4. What are the strengths of the community and how can they contribute to growth?
- 5. What could be potential challenges to growth?
- 6. What overall image is the city working to create?
- 7. What strategies can be implemented to execute the end vision?

As part of the planning process, a local steering committee has been assembled comprised of local leaders, businesses and other key stakeholders with a direct interest in the economic success of the City of Swartz Creek. The steering committee will help guide the development of the overall strategy, as well as provide critical input on the future economic vision for the city. Lastly, the steering committee will assist with the identification of implementation projects throughout the community which can be benchmarked and monitored for success.

This report could not have been completed without the guidance and assistance of the members of the steering committee, the City of Swartz Creek and the Michigan Economic Development Corporation.

Economic Landscape

The City of Swartz Creek is located in central-western Genesee County. The city is surrounded by Gaines, Flint and Clayton Townships. The current population of the City of Swartz Creek is 5,617 according to 2016 US Census estimates with 62.8% of the current population within the work age group between 16 and 65 years of age. Of that percentage, 55.1% are active in the labor force with 44.9% not currently active in the labor force for any number of reasons. Currently, the US labor participation rate is 62.7%, which Swartz Creek nearly mirrors.

Historically, labor participation rate has been a good indicator of the strength or weakness within a local labor market. The higher the rate, $_{Figure 1}$

a local labor market. The higher the rate, the greater the availability of quality employment opportunities.

Since the last recession, labor participation rates have generally been in decline, locally, regionally and nationally, but not because of reduced employment opportunities. To better understand the decline in labor participation, we need to look at the age distribution within the City





Figure 3: Age Distribution, City of Swartz Creek




At quick glance, it is easy to see that the population is aging, meaning a greater percentage of the workforce is nearing the age of retirement. During the recent recession, a considerable number of workers that became unemployed permanently left the labor force. As employment opportunities declined, it became more difficult for workers aged 55+ to find meaningful employment, so many either took part time work, worked off the record, signed up for permanent disability or simply retired.

Income, Employment and Education

The median household income of the City of Swartz Creek is relatively strong compared to Genesee County and the State of Michigan at \$52,788. When you look deeper in to the income data, the median household income for families is \$59,643. Median non-family income is \$35,114 which would generally be a single income, head of household. This again reinforces the idea that the City of Swartz Creek is a great community to raise a family.

The largest income cluster for the City of Swartz Creek is from \$35,000 to \$75,000, which Figure 3 according to PEW Research Center, is statistically the middle-class of the United States. Of the total households within the city, 51% fall within this income range. Given such a high percentage of the community is middle class or above, it is safe to assume that Swartz Creek is a bedroom community for employment centers such as Flint, Lansing, Owosso, Saginaw or other industry centers in southeast Michigan. Looking at the educational attainment of the City of Swartz Creek, a large percentage of the population is a high school graduate or equivalent or has completed some level of higher education.





When looking to grow the economy of any community, it is extremely important to have a highly skilled and educated workforce. This has been identified as the highest priority for employers when seeking to expand their operations. It has also been identified as a top priority by the



The State of Michigan and many of its communities have been emerging from one of the most extensive economic recessions on record since the Great Depression. At its height, unemployment topped 16% across the I-69 Thumb Region. Locally, unemployment wasn't nearly as high as seen in Figure 5, but the same pattern was present as identified regionally, across the state and across the nation.

Comparatively speaking, from a workforce perspective, the City of Swartz Creek and Clayton Township fared better than the rest of the State of Michigan along with the I-69 Thumb Region, but still felt the pinch of the recession.

Looking at the industry of the City of Swartz Creek, the largest employment base within the city is manufacturing. Of the civilian employed population aged 16 years or over, 461 of the total 2,335 are employed within that category. Other large employment categories of note include healthcare and social assistance (426), retail trade (300) and educational services (167).

It is important to note, that while figure 6 identifies the industries of employed

workers in the City of Swartz Creek, it is not indicative of the industries found within the City of Swartz Creek. In fact, much of the working population of Swartz Creek commute out of the city for daily work. The average commute time for workers living in the city of Swartz Creek is 26.8 minutes, indicating that many workers are traveling to larger metro areas for employment including Owosso, Durand, Lansing, Flint and other communities within a 30-minute drive where there are more options for employment opportunities.

Regional Economic Development

In 2013, the I-69 Thumb Region, also known as Prosperity Region 6 completed a 7-county economic development strategy called "Accelerate". This plan is intended to find and promote economic development opportunities across the region as well as promoting the region for outside investment. Swartz Creek sits in a very strategic location within the region with its two

exits onto I-69 and proximity to I-75, I-475, US-23. This positions Swartz Creek well for attracting regional investment projects near the GM Assembly facility, as well as becoming a hub for potential employees in the area due to having good housing options and a high-level school system.

SWOT Analysis

On July 31, 2018, the City of Swartz Creek Economic Development Steering Committee completed as SWOT Analysis as a way of obtaining perceptions of the city's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats. The intent of the sessions was to gain insight, but more importantly, to establish a community identity and how the city fits into the larger region.

Goals and Objectives

The goals identified in this plan were identified from the City of Swartz Creek Master Plan and relate directly to economic development within the city. Goals are high level policy statements that drive future decisions around projects and investment opportunities that can contribute to community growth.

Objectives are specific ideas, strategies, policy statements or projects that achieve goal results. The objectives identified in this plan will assist the City of Swartz Creek by providing measurable tasks that revolve around increasing economic activity within the city. Further these objectives will support other planning efforts in the city such as the Master Plan, the Swartz Creek DDA Community Improvement Objectives along with future capital improvement plans. Integrating all the above planning efforts with a committed leadership will be the most important driver of success for the community.

Goal 1: To provide attractive commercial areas that create a stable tax base and quality shopping and service uses for residents

Goal 2: To encourage the attraction of a variety and mix of new businesses to Swartz Creek

Action Table

For the City Economic Development Strategy to be an effective document for the next several years, steps must be identified to guide community leaders towards implementation. This chapter summarizes the goals and the recommendations described throughout the plan and serves as a quick reference for the City Leadership and others to monitor progress or serve as a checklist for implementing the plan.

The following table identifies major steps and projects designed to maintain and improve the City of Swartz Creek. Implementation of these items will have a positive impact on the character and vitality of the community. Many of the implementation recommendations presented herein will require the close cooperation of many bodies. The third column in the table indicates the primary group(s) responsible for implementation.

Implementation

This plan serves as the policy guide for moving Swartz Creek forward, guiding decisions about future physical and economic development. Transforming the plan's goals into reality will require a long-term commitment and political consensus. The plan is designed to be a road map for action, incorporating strategies, specific projects, and programs that will achieve the desired results.

This chapter synthesizes the many plan recommendations and identifies the actions and timing needed to transform the plan's vision into reality.

Tenets of Successful Implementation

The input received through the master plan process provided a foundation to help achieve the city's vision, community support, commitment, and involvement must continue.

Commitment

Successful plan implementation will be directly related to a committed city leadership. While elected and appointed officials will have a strong leadership role, many others - city department directors, staff, and leaders from the community's many institutions and organizations - will also be instrumental in supporting the plan.

However, commitment reaches beyond just these individuals and includes the array of stakeholders. Citizens, landowners, developers, and business owners interested in how Swartz Creek develops must unite toward the plan's common vision.

Integrate with Project Design

City officials and departments must embrace the plan, applying its recommendations to help shape annual budgets, work programs, and the design of capital improvements. For example, the City's engineering practices can support implementation through infrastructure improvements, streets, and storm systems designed consistent with plan policies and recommendations. Each department, staff person, and elected official should find it a benefit, if not an obligation, to reference the plan when making decisions and setting priorities.

Guidance for Development Decisions

This plan is designed for routine use and should be consistently employed during any process affecting the community's future. Private investment decisions by developers, corporations, and land owners should consider the plan's direction as it is the guide for economic growth and stability of the community and supports the goals and objectives of the overall master plan.

Evaluation and Monitoring

This plan has been developed with a degree of flexibility, allowing nimble responses to emerging conditions, challenges, and opportunities. To help ensure the plan stays fresh and useful, periodic reviews and amendments may be required. This will ensure plan goals, objectives, and recommendations reflect changing community needs, expectations, and financial realities.

Redevelopment Strategies

How to Attract Developers?

Developers typically look for project locations where the potential for success is fairly certain and risks limited. This means that they are attracted to communities with strong markets where the infrastructure is in place, reasonably-priced, quality development sites are available, and the development review process is quick. They also look for opportunities to enter a market right before it "takes off" and capture the heavy demand and associated real estate price or rent increases.

Good developers are usually inundated with requests from municipalities and DDA's to develop in their community, citing the advantages they can offer. Yet only a small percentage of communities provide the information necessary to interest developers. There is specific information they look for that will minimize the amount of time it takes to make a go- no-go decision. For example, is there a market for the type of development being sought by the community? What is the role of the community within the region (i.e. bedroom community, employment destination, transportation hub, etc.)? Are reasonably priced sites available for development or redevelopment? Is necessary infrastructure in place or will this be needed and add to the cost of the project? How accessible is the development location and how large a market area can they draw from?

These are all vital questions that can be partly answered by the community, making it easier to pique the interest of a developer. Time is money and the less time developers have to commit to looking at a project/community, the more likely they are to dig deeper and hopefully show interest in moving forward. Some of this information might already be available while additional work is needed to gather the remaining data. It is up to the City, DDA, business leaders, and civic associations to work together to assemble developer information and then actively recruit developers and businesses.

Why Swartz Creek?

Since developers look for strong or emerging markets, Swartz Creek must prove that it fits into this classification and may have just been overlooked. What are the positives with Swartz Creek that have created unmet demand for housing, commercial, office or industrial uses? This is information that must be gathered and uncovered to create the "elevator speech" for developers: meaning why invest in Swartz Creek as opposed to all the other communities that contact you? Also, what has changed in recent years causing the private sector to overlook the City as a place to develop? A one-page handout summarizing this key information will be a good start. After that, a separate sheet can be created for each marketing item like housing, retail, office, hospitality, etc.

Understand the Market

Developers may not take the time to fully understand the dynamics of the local market and especially not unmet demand. The City can prepare a fact sheet for different market segments, working with local real estate professionals and companies. For example, some compelling information might be increased housing prices and vacancy rates; potential demand for certain types of housing using the Target Market Analysis; voids in the retail market that could be served by local businesses, etc.

Developer Matchmaking

Once the above information is collected and organized, invite developers to come in and learn about available sites and why they should consider Swartz Creek for their next project. It would be best to invite them individually and be concise, enthusiastic, and to the point with what you would like them to consider. Be sure to share success stories from other companies and developments so they can see that others have already tested the market. It is equally important to have as much information available regarding property availability, price, rental rates, recent purchase prices, traffic volumes, etc. This will provide a positive impression regarding the recruitment effort and limit the number of items that need follow-up.

DDA/City Property Acquisition

Property acquisition will be a necessary part of implementing the development projects contained herein, particularly for site development and redevelopment. By purchasing property in an area identified for new development, the DDA or the City will have an added tool to attract developers and build the desired project. For example, to develop new housing, the DDA or City can acquire several of the vacant lots and can contribute them to the project. This will provide an incentive to lower the cost, and minimize the risk, for the developer. Should the first phase be successful, the developer will more than likely undertake construction of additional units without any form of subsidy. The goal is to use tax increment financing to attract developers by minimizing risk, leverage private investment and eventually eliminate the need for financial assistance.

Gap Funding

Some projects may need financial assistance to kick-start the development. The City may, at its own discretion, commit project-specific future tax increment capture back to private projects for a specified period of time. The goal is to provide funding to close the "gap" that prevents the project from becoming a reality due to financial feasibility. There are many additional incentives that can also be utilized to support "gap" funding.

Business Retention

Business Development/Retention Program – Develop a program to take and keep the pulse of the local business community. Regular touches, or retention visits will begin to engage the business community beyond traditional networking opportunities. Typical discussions during retention visits include business growth plans, marketing, employment and obstacles that can hinder growth. There are many resources available to the business community for finding, hiring and retaining employees, obtaining financial support, learning about import and export programs

and government contracting opportunities. Having a strong business retention program can be one of the most successful tools for supporting the local business community.

Business Attraction

Now that the City of Swartz Creek has completed a Marketing and Branding Strategy, it will be important to engage fully with the Flint & Genesee Chamber of Commerce as well as the MEDC to implement a business attraction strategy that works for the community based on the outcome of the Master Plan, land available for growth and target sectors the city is looking to attract.

It will be equally important for the city to develop an attraction strategy for general retail and specialty businesses the city would like to attract to the downtown. The MEDC RRC program may assist with this as well as working with local commercial property brokers.

Marketing and Branding

The City of Swartz Creek has actively promoted specific economic development projects. For example, the Holland Square Project fundamentally encourages downtown reinvestment by redeveloping a former gas station into a new public pavilion for community events. Increasingly, communities around Michigan (and nationally) are taking similar steps to both stimulate development through actions that make surrounding property more appealing, and steps to become directly engaged in seeking development proposals for key property.

Frequently, a tool known as the Developer RFQ is used to obtain development proposals for key property. A key property might be a vacant lot, or an underutilized building in a prominent location. Typically, a community, or development organization secures site control for a key property, defines a range of development possibilities, and then offers the opportunity to offer a development proposal given incentives and parameters defined in the RFP. In this way, the community assumes a proactive role in the development process and begins to think as a developer might. This connects to marketing and branding as communities need to build a business case for a development project and provide compelling reasons to invest in the community (compared with a growing number of options elsewhere).

Swartz Creek should continue to try to set itself apart from other places and strive to offer a unique identity and brand. This can be supported by drawing attention to considerations such as city rankings, local awards, walkscores, and favorable statistics.

Increasingly, communities are also preparing optional concept plans and offering third party feasibility studies to draw a clearer picture of development potential. (see https://www.miplace.org/globalassets/media-documents/rrc/rrc-guide---developer- rfq.pdf for more information on developer RFQ).

Additionally, efforts to build a compelling argument for local investment can be supported by crafting a succinct, clear and focused municipal "elevator speech." An elevator speech is a short (minute or less) statement designed to grab attention. The word elevator is tied to the time it takes for a typical elevator ride. The following material was generated as a starting point for more

local consideration and refinement, but it is grounded in what residents offered when asked had to offer three words that best describe Swartz Creek and the top strengths of Swartz Creek.

DRAFT - SWARTZ CREEK ELEVATOR SPEECH

Swartz Creek celebrates a hometown spirit like few other places. Our friendships with each other are lasting and our residents work hard to build the kind of community people care deeply about. We welcome those who share our love for small town charm, local pride, family, safety, friendliness and fun. Swartz Creek is loaded with opportunity for those who want to be successful here. This opportunity flows from unique community attributes and, most importantly, from the people of Swartz Creek who support and encourage each other - because that is what friends do.

Redevelopment Ready Sites

The City of Swartz Creek has identified the following sites as priorities for future redevelopment projects.

Sports Creek Raceway

The Sports Creek Raceway is a former horse racing facility located at the intersection of Morrish Road and I-69. While there are plans taking shape to reopen the facility as a race track in 2019, this site has the potential to provide the greatest economic return to the City of Swartz Creek, either as a tourist destination, or as a repurposed site for future industrial/commercial/mixed use development in the future.

The existing site is nearly 100 acres fully served by infrastructure. If the site is reopened as a race track, it will be imperative to focus development efforts along the Morrish Road Corridor to Downtown. Further, it will be important to work with MDOT to potentially widen the Morrish/I-



69 overpass to ensure traffic capacity is met given new commercial developments at that intersection. Additionally, the city should work with a hospitality consultant to determine the feasibility of a potential hotel to be located at that intersection if the demand is present. Lastly, if the track is reopened, the city will want to engage the Flint & Genesee Convention and Visitors Bureau to develop a destination marketing plan to support the track. If the facility is not reopened as a track, the site should be repurposed into a mixed-use business park that could include a mix of industrial, office and commercial uses to increase the muchneeded supply of industrial facilities within Genesee County. With access to I-69 and the I-69 International Trade Corridor, this site could be a prime destination for key industrial suppliers with both local and international clients.

Mary Crapo School

The former Mary Crapo School is located just west of Downtown Swartz Creek and is a prime property for redevelopment into high density residential housing. This would also add new tax revenues to the city's tax roll as this site was formerly owned by the Swartz Creek Community Schools and was not taxed, creating a net win for the city.

Family Worship Center

This site is a former church located on the western side of Morrish Road just north of Miller Road near downtown. This site is ideal for repurposing as a destination hospitality/dining establishment, craft brewery/distillery or other type of establishment given the close proximity to I-69 and downtown. This site could become an anchor establishment similar to the Clarkston Union or Fenton Fire Hall and could serve both the local population as well as capture a share of the ever-growing craft food and beverage industry throughout Michigan.

8057 Miller Road

This site was the home of Assenmacher Bicycle Company, now located on Hill Road in Mundy Township. This site is perfectly located on the south side of Miller Road, downtown Swartz Creek and is adjacent to the west of city-owned property that will be redeveloped in the near future.

Ideally, this site will be repurposed with a restaurant or some type of specialty retail. The goal is to preserve the building to the extent possible, but this would also make



a prime site for a two to three-story mixed-use building if the right opportunity presents itself.

5203 Morrish Road

This is the site of the Swartz Creek Grain Elevator which is a non-designated historic site on the south side of the City. This site offers a prime opportunity for future mixed-use development. The site has been a host to a number of businesses over the years and is in need of improvements. This site could also be an extension of the industrial uses located to the west on Morrish Road.

Incentives Available to Assist Development

As soon as possible, the City of Swartz Creek should develop incentive guidelines to help determine when incentives are appropriate and how much incentive to offer. With any State of Michigan Incentive Program, a local contribution will need to be included. This can be in the form of cash, in-kind support, tax abatements, Tax Increment Finance or other.

The following programs are a sampling of incentives available to both local communities and developers to assist with redevelopment projects.

Business Development Program – The MiBDP is an incentive program available from the Michigan Strategic Fund, in cooperation with the MEDC. The program is designed to provide grants, loans or other economic assistance to businesses for highly competitive projects in Michigan that create jobs and/or provide investment.

PA 198 Industrial Facilities Exemption – Industrial property tax abatements provide incentives for eligible businesses to make new investments in Michigan. These abatements encourage Michigan manufacturers to build new plants, expand existing plants, renovate aging plants, or add new machinery and equipment. High technology operations are also available for the abatement. Depending on the scope and type of project, real property taxes can be abated up to 50% for a period not to exceed 12 years for new construction. Further, the 6-mil SET may be abated up to 100% with approval from the MEDC.

In the case of a rehabilitation, the current assessed value of the property prior to improvement is frozen. This results in a 100% exemption from property tax on the value of the improvements.

Commercial Rehabilitation Abatement – Encourages the rehabilitation of commercial property by abating the property taxes generated from new investment for a period up to 10 years. Commercial property is qualified facility that includes a building or group of contiguous building of commercial property that is 15 years or older, of which the primary purpose is the operation of a commercial business enterprise or multi-family residential. The CRA freezes the taxable value of the building and exempts the new investment from local taxes.

Community Revitalization Program - The Michigan Community Revitalization Program (MCRP) is an incentive program available from the Michigan Strategic Fund (MSF), in cooperation with the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC), designed to promote community revitalization that will accelerate private investment in areas of historical disinvestment; contribute to Michigan's reinvention as a vital, job generating state; foster redevelopment of functionally obsolete or historic properties; reduce blight; and protect the natural resources of this state. The program is designed to provide grants, loans, or other economic assistance for eligible investment projects in Michigan.

New Market Tax Credits - Historically, low-income communities experience a lack of investment, as evidenced by vacant commercial properties, outdated manufacturing facilities, and inadequate access to education and healthcare service providers. The New Market Tax Credit

Program (NMTC Program) aims to break this cycle of disinvestment by attracting the private investment necessary to reinvigorate struggling local economies.

The NMTC Program attracts private capital into low-income communities by permitting individual and corporate investors to receive a tax credit against their federal income tax in exchange for making equity investments in specialized financial intermediaries called Community Development Entities (CDEs). The credit totals 39 percent of the original investment amount and is claimed over a period of seven years.

Brownfield - The Brownfield Program uses tax increment financing (TIF) to reimburse brownfield related costs incurred while redeveloping contaminated, functionally obsolete, blighted or historic properties. It is also responsible for managing the Single Business Tax and Michigan Business Tax Brownfield Credit legacy programs (SBT/MBT Brownfield Credits). The Michigan Strategic Fund (MSF) with assistance from the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC), administers the reimbursement of costs using state school taxes (School Operating and State Education Tax) for nonenvironmental eligible activities that support redevelopment, revitalization and reuse of eligible property. The MEDC also manages amendments to SBT/MBT Brownfield Credit projects approved by MSF. The Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) administers the reimbursement of environmental response costs using state school taxes for environmental activities, and local units of government sometimes use only local taxes to reimburse for eligible activities (i.e., "local-only" plans).

Michigan Transportation Economic Development Fund - The mission of the Transportation Economic Development Fund (TEDF) is to enhance the ability of the state to compete in an international economy, to serve as a catalyst for economic growth of the state, and to improve the quality of life in the state. The funds are available to state, county, and city road agencies for immediate highway needs relating to a variety of economic development issues.

City Properties and Utilities – The City can negotiate both property costs and utility/development fees for city owned property. The city would require a developer to submit a development proposal which would be reviewed internally for economic impacts. If the economic impacts are high for the city, fees may be potentially reduced to support the project.

Using this Plan

This Economic Development Strategy is a key piece of the development puzzle for the City of Swartz Creek. This plan should be seen as a living document and constantly reviewed and refined as projects are completed. Further, this plan should serve as a link between the City's Master Plan, Zoning Ordinance, Marketing and Branding Strategy and other tools developed through the Redevelopment Ready Communities program.

Additionally, economic development requires a team effort. The City of Swartz Creek has done a good job of developing a strong network of support to assist with economic development within the city. Efforts will need to be made to strengthen and enhance this network while building new partnerships. This would include adding capacity to the Swartz Creek Chamber of Commerce to

assist with local promotions of events, hosting business to business events and working to promote Swartz Creek as a great place to live, do business and grow business.

Finally, the city should be utilizing all available resources to assist with promotion of the community. Some of these resources include

- 1. Travel Michigan This is the tourism arm for the State of Michigan. As noted in the marketing and brand strategy, the city should be registered with Travel Michigan to promote tourism opportunities, especially when the race track comes back online.
- 2. MEDC Continue to work with the RRC development team to promote development/redevelopment opportunities within the city.
- 3. Flint & Genesee Chamber of Commerce Work with the Economic Development team to provide resources to local companies as well as to build a business attraction plan for the city
- 4. Genesee County Visitor and Convention Bureau Work with the CVB to promote local events and tourism opportunities within the community.

Notice to Special Licensees

(Authorized by Act 58, P.A. of 1998)

Like any other licensee of the MLCC, Special Licensees are responsible for following the Liquor Control Code and the MLCC Administrative Rules. Organizations any persons who are running the events should take time to familiarize themselves with the rules that govern the sale of alcoholic beverages. Failure to comply may lead to steep fines and penalties as well as causing dangerous situations to develop.

The following is a synopsis of some important laws and rules. The list is not all inclusive but it will assist you in maintaining a legal and successful operation at your event. Do not take a chance on violating the law or rules. If in doubt about the legality of any activity or function for your event, call your local police department or the closest Liquor Control District Enforcement office (located in Southfield, Lansing, Grand Rapids and Escanaba).

Questions can also be answered at the MLCC Special License unit. You may purchase a copy of the Liquor Control Code and MLCC Administrative Rules by submitting to the address printed above, a check or money order for \$15.00 made payable to the State of Michigan/MLCC. The Code and Rules are also available for download from the MLCC web site at www.michigan.gov/lcc.

Purchases

All your alcoholic beverages must be purchased from an MLCC licensee. Do NOT permit BYOB (bring your own bottle) at your event. Do not sell, offer to sell or advertise an unlimited quantity of alcoholic beverages for a single price.

Profits

Do not permit any person, organization or business entity, other than the licensee, to receive any profit or loss from the sale of alcoholic beverages.

Gambling/Contests

Do not allow gambling other than that what is legal under the state lottery and gaming laws. You must obtain a license for legalized gambling from the State Lottery Commission and or the Michigan Gaming Control Board. Ensure that any contests are of a legal nature, and they do not violate any state laws.

Minors

Do not allow anyone who is less than 21 years old to purchase or consume alcoholic beverages. Ask for identification and examine it closely. Employment of a minor under the age of 18 must be in accordance with the Youth Employments Standards Act of June 1, 1978, being MCL436.1707.

Intoxication

Always watch for signs of intoxication and limit sales. Do no allow anyone who is intoxicated to purchase or consume alcoholic beverages, or to loiter or congregate on the licensed premises.

Legal Hours

Do not sell alcohol other than beer or wine, on Sundays, unless you have been licensed by the Commission to do so. Do not sell any alcohol between 2:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. on Sundays without an AM Sunday Sales Permit. Do not allow consumption of alcohol between 2:30 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. on weekdays and 2:30 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. on Sundays with an AM Sunday Sales Permit. Do not sell alcoholic beverages between 11:59 p.m. on December 24 and 12:00 Noon on December 25.

Licensed Premises

It is your responsibility to control and properly police the area where the alcoholic beverages are being sold and consumed. Do not permit persons to carry their alcoholic beverages outside the area approved for consumption. If your event is near a residential area, make sure your guests do not disturb or intrude on your neighbor's property.

Other Rules

It is your responsibility to comply with all state and local building, plumbing, zoning, sanitation, and health laws, rules and ordinances as determined by the state and local law enforcement officials who have jurisdiction over the licensee, pursuant to MAC 436,1003.

Cooperation

It is your responsibility to cooperate with all law enforcement officers. Do not allow within or upon the licensed premises any illegal occupation or illegal act.

Remember:

-All codes and rules which apply to a regular licensee of the commission who sells alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premise also apply to a special one-day licensee.

-Violations of any of the Codes and MLCC Administrative Rules, or any other regulations governing the sale of alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises or the provisions of the liquor control code may result in a stop being placed against your organization for issuance of any additional special licenses.

Sales Tax Return for Special Events

Issued under authority of P.A. 167 of 1933 and 122 of 1941 as amended. Filing is mandatory.

All retail sales of food, drink, auction items and other items made by an organization during a fundraising event are subject to Michigan sales tax. The Michigan Sales Tax Act (MCL 205.52(1)) provides that anyone making retail sales is subject to 6 percent sales tax on gross proceeds. The act specifically includes non-profit organizations in this definition.

Groups currently holding a sales tax license must remit the tax on their current sales tax return. Write the sales tax license number in the space provided on Part 1 of this form and return it to the Discovery and Tax Enforcement Division. If the group does not have a sales tax license, use this form to report and pay the sales tax due from an event.

You must submit this return. If no sales tax is due, complete Part 1 and include an explanation.

This return and payment is due three business days after the fundraising event. Make all checks payable to "State of Michigan."

Purchased from caterer, or other preparer, and sales tax is paid on the purchase. There is no further tax obligation on the food. * Purchased from caterer or other preparer under a resale exemption. Your organization must pay the sales tax based on the fair market value (FMV) of the food sold. Usually, the FMV is the price of admission or a donation to attend the event or the cost to purchase and prepare the food. ** Prepared by members of your organization. You must pay the sales tax on the FMV of the food sold.	Purchased from supplier and sales tax is paid on the purchase. There are no separate or additional charges to customers/members on the alcoholic beverages at the event such as an "open bar." If there is a "cash bar" or any separate charge for alcoholic beverages, sales tax is due on the total gross proceeds of the beverage sales. If sales tax was paid to the supplier, you may request a refund from that vendor. A credit can not be taken on your Sales Tax Return for the amount of tax that was paid to the supplier. If the sales tax was not paid when purchased and there is no separate charge at the event, sales tax will be due on the fair market value of the alcoholic beverages.	Food sold at concessions at special events and entertainment facilities (including but not limited to theaters, fairs, recreation centers, athletic events, parks and zoos) that is "prepared food" is taxable. This would include, for example, popcorn or nuts sold hot, sandwiches made by the seller (not sold by weight or volume as single items), soda pop in a cup, and a dish of ice cream with a spoon provided by the seller, a slice of a pizza sold hot, and a hot dog heated by the seller. Food sold at such concessions that is not "prepared food" is not taxable. This would include, for example, fresh fruit, prepackaged items (e.g., candy bars, chips, nuts, cans or bottles of soda pop) not heated by the seller and sold without eating utensils provided by the seller, and cookies, doughnuts and muffins sold without eating utensils. ***

* Your organization will need to furnish the caterer/other preparer with a sales tax number to qualify for this exemption. To obtain registration forms for a sales tax license or other information, call (517) 636-4660. Generally, you will only need a sales tax license if you want to claim a "resale exemption" from your supplier or if you have more than two fundraising events in one calendar year.

** If the admission price or donation exceeds the fair market value (FMV) of the food or drink, FMV may be determined by any reasonable method.

*** Eating Utensils, as defined, would include knives, forks, spoons, glasses, cups, napkins, straws, or plates. It would not include a container or packaging used to transport food. If eating utensils are "provided by the seller," the item is deemed taxable. AC, Rule 86(5)(a): For a seller with a prepared food sales percentage greater than 75 percent, eating utensils are "provided by the seller" when the utensils are made available to purchasers. Hence, the utensils would not necessarily have to be handed to the customer, by the seller. If the eating utensils are available on the premises for customers, they are considered "provided by the seller."

Special Rules for Nonprofit Organizations

P.A. 156 of 1994 (effective January 1, 1994) exempts from sales tax sales at retail made by certain organizations if aggregate sales at retail are less than \$5,000. If total sales are more than \$5,000 in a calendar year, sales tax is due on all sales, including the first \$5,000.

CAUTION: Any sales tax collected by a nonprofit organization must be remitted to the State of Michigan even if aggregate retail sales for the calendar are less than \$5,000.



APPROVAL OF AGENDA: Motion by Plumb, to approve agenda of May 1, 2019 with the addition of the Lyngel Tree Donation and Parade Float, supported by Henry. Motion carried.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: Motion by Cummings, to approve minutes of March 6, 2019, supported by Henry. Motion carried.

MEETING OPEN TO THE PUBLIC: No comment.

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE BOARD:

- A. April 3, 2019 Minutes
- B. Staff Letter

REPORTS:

- A. DPW REPORT: The parks are wet, with some turf damage still unrepaired. Bathrooms are open, but attendance is still low. The swing is installed in the Abrams tot lot, but it was noted that this is not for adults. Tom said the Elms trail loop can be narrower than other trails, perhaps six feet. He said this would not be a big issue to install this year.
- B. CITY MANAGER: Adam indicated that council would be putting the budget together for the next fiscal year. The park plan calls for a new backstop at Elms, the trail loop, clearing of brush at Elms, and an investment at the Abrams tennis courts. The board did not object to funding these initiatives. Concerning the Elms Park brush, it was thought that maintaining the bigger trees was desired.

BUSINESS:

- A. Elms Storage: Mrs. Zuniga was present. She indicated that a single slab is proposed for higher ground by the volleyball court. Mr. Shumaker noted that the trail is proposed for this location. There was no objection to placing both sheds on a single slab in a new location near the volleyball court, subject to marking and board approval. Lacrosse will need a double door shed. Heidi also noted vehicle damage to turf and asked about a gate. It was decided to maintain the open drive.
- B. Playscape Stain: Kiwanis will be in touch with Tom about staining a section of the equipment. They are also interested in providing a wheelchair swing to Elms Park.

- C. GFWC: The group is seeking a grant for work at Abrams Park.
- D. Float: The float will be put together at RH's house on Wednesday, May 29th at 6pm. There is no theme.

Motion by Barclay, to donate \$807.50 of slip and slide proceeds to the Swartz Creek Area Chamber of Commerce to support the bounce house activities for Jeepers Creekers, with additional proceeds to go to the Swartz Creek Firemen's Association, supported by Farmer. Motion carried.

- E. Cappy Lane: The board is not opposed to participating with the school to enhance the corner of Cappy and Fairchild. Tom noted the dead trees would be replaced by the greenhouse. It was thought that benches and a walkway might be the best way to improve this area.
- F. Lyngel Trees: Five trees are to be donated to Elms Park, four native pines and one magnolia.

MEETING OPEN TO THE PUBLIC: Brenda Huyck explained Hometown Days new mission statement and said the group is going to be more inclusive of area businesses and groups. They are also giving back proceeds to community events and needs.

BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS: Mr. Barclay reported about the county park meeting. He indicated that they will not invest in a new park near our area, but they might be able to run or take over a park if held by a local government. Discussion centered on the 20 acres near Heritage as a potential disc golf course.

ADJOURNMENT: Meeting adjourned at 6:27 p.m.

Processes for Planning and Projects


The City engages in various processes for proactively planning for its future and for acting on petitions for specific projects or developments.

Proactive planning ultimately falls under the purview of the city council to engage and approve various planning initiatives, including the city master plan, parks and recreation plan, zoning ordinance, Downtown Development Authority Plan, capital improvement plans, and miscellaneous plans. Such efforts, though approved by the city council, are often processed, publicly vetted, and heavily deliberated by other boards and commissions such as the Park Advisory Board, Planning Commission, Downtown Development Authority, and ad hoc committees of the City Council. At times, joint responsibility is exercised between boards and commissions.

Project specific planning typically includes a petition for private investment that involves a zoning change, site plan, special use, or variance. The reviewing entities are the Planning Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals, in addition to the legislative responsibilities of the City Council. Planning for and review of public work projects can also be undertaken by the Downtown Development Authority, Planning Commission, and City Council.

Both plan creation and plan review necessitate public hearings and engagement. Objective notices, outreach, publication, hearings, and reporting are required for most formal plans and review processes. In addition, the city recognizes the need for more effective engagement for the purpose of informing the public, encouraging deliberation, and enabling stakeholder influence on the decision-making processes.

The flowcharts below indicate the required and expected form of the processes and public engagement:



Planning and Project Review Bodies

City Council

The Swartz Creek City Council is composed of seven members from the eligible electorate of the city. Four members are from wards, and three members are at-large. Terms are four years and are staggered two years apart for wards and at-large members. This is the city's legislative body and is responsible for all ordinances (including zoning/signs), the budget, and appointment of various administrative and official positions.

Planning Commission

The Planning Commission is a nine member body, including the mayor and one other city council member. Terms are staggered and are for three years. The planning commission is the final authority for site plan approval. The commission is also responsible for guiding revision of the city's master plan, reviewing zoning amendments, reviewing special land uses, and consideration of the composite capital improvement program.

Zoning Board of Appeals

The ZBA consists of five members, including the planning commission chair, and city council member, and two alternates. The commission has three primary functions. The first is to consider interpretations of the zoning code. The second is to rule on appeals of decisions made by staff, the planning commission, and city council as it relates to zoning. The last is to consider use and dimensional variances.

Downtown Development Authority

The DDA is a nine member body, with the majority of said members having and interest in real property in the district. This body has many charges, but does not have statutory review authority. Due to its role in improving the downtown area for physical, economic, and social change, the DDA often is involved in public processes that involve investment in physical infrastructure, development of programming, and investment in private property.

Park Advisory Board

The Park Board is composed of nine members of the community. They current serve three year, staggered terms. The primary function of the board is to revise the city's park plan and oversee its implementation. This board is involved in planning the physical and social role of parks it the community.

The city has many boards and commissions, which serve as the most direct conduit between the individual members of the electorate, the general public, and the decision making process of the city council.

The city encourages service on such boards and commissions by eligible stakeholders, as well as involvement of the general public via direct meeting participation, written correspondence, electronic communication.

The city's webpage is a one-stop shop for meeting packets (including minutes), existing plans and studies, meeting schedules, board/commission job descriptions, project review flowcharts/checklists, and much more:

Open Meetings

All meetings of the city's council, boards, commissions, and committees shall be open to the public in accordance with the Open Meetings Act, PA 267 of 1976 as amended. Public notices for regular meetings are posted at city hall, are included in the community calendar, and on the city's webpage. Special meetings are posted at city hall, on the city's webpage, and are published/mailed/posted/delivered in accordance with applicable statute.

The city conducts a mailing to all properties within 300 feet of a property subject to zoning (9 or less parcels), special land use, ZBA appeal, and ZBA variance. Such notices are also published in a newspaper of general circulation 15 days or more prior to the meeting.

All meetings are held in a facility accessible to persons with disabilities, and the City provides reasonable accommodations.

Methods and Expectations of Engagement

Inform

- Website: <u>www.cityofswartzcreek.org</u> contains all meeting packets (with minutes), the community calendar, forms/applications, routine service information, online services, contact information, and much more.
- **Newsletter:** The city distributes a paper and digital newsletter, which is mailed to all occupants of record. Information covers routine services, resident/business expectations on matters such as sidewalk maintenance, and coming events/projects.
- **Newspaper:** The Swartz Creek View is the newspaper of general circulation. Writers attend nearly all city board, commission, and council meetings. The weekly paper is used for formal notices and all editions are shared on the city's Facebook page.
- **Printed Postings/Announcements:** The city maintains a well-used notice board at the city offices. Notices are also distributed on utility bills. Announcements and the upcoming meeting schedule is included in each city council packet.

- **Notices:** Notices of the city shall meet statutory standards. Notices shall also endeavor to describe locations, projects, impacts, and standards in common terms. E.g. property subject to a variance will be identified with its street address, common business name, and other visual cues in addition to a parcel identification number; zoning standards shall be described in addition to being listed by their Section number.
- **Email:** All elected officials and the city manager can be emailed through the city website. The city maintains a distribution list for all boards, commissions, and council. Any entity can subscribe to receive such emails.
- **Social Media:** The city uses Facebook to communicate public emergencies, public notices, share news stories, and announce events. The city also receives and responds to personal messages.
- SeeClickFix Notice: The Service Creek Application enables the city to post and communicate community information to participating members of the free application. It also enables reverse 911 style email and notice distribution to subscribers. For example, a water main break can be GIS located and emailed/noticed to subscribers with an image and description of the issue, impact, and time of action.
- **Public Meetings:** These meetings are always conducted as an open meeting of a public body and are used to share information with the public and to receive formal comments from stakeholders.
- **Open Houses:** These events are less formal information sharing proceedings in which city official (or representatives) are able to host information sharing and potential feedback solicitation regarding a specific plan, project, or other matter of interest. For example, the city may set up an open house in the conference room of a restaurant for a day to share information and received feedback on the 20 year street asset management plan.

Interact

• SeeClickFix (311 Service) Report: The city operates on online and application based service by which members of the public can report issues, recommendations, and problems in a public format. The reports are public to all members, including the city response and actions taken. For example, a member might report that there are no accessible swings in a park, and the city will acknowledge the request (to be able to remedy the situation or not) and will eventually close the case with the solution. Reports can be made anonymously by device application (Service Creek), Facebook, or the website and can include images and a GIS location.

- **Surveys:** Surveys, in digital and traditional form, are used to canvass large swaths of stakeholders for objective and subjective data that can be used in shaping a vision, project, or plan objective. For example, the city engaged the general public in an online and print survey regarding its self-perception during the branding and marketing process.
- **Workshops:** Workshops are specific events hosted by the city and inviting all key stakeholders to communicate and coordinate strategy creation for a specific plan or project. This might include community input and deliberation regarding a proposal park feature, trail plan, or downtown investment.
- Focus Groups: These groups are assembled by commissions or boards to resolve issues or make recommendations regarding specific projects. Focusing on developer projects and their relationship to the community, these groups usually consist of a development applicant, city staff, known or self-identified key stakeholders, and board/commission representation. For example, the group might be charged with addressing a stakeholder concern about drainage or noise from a proposed development.

Impact

- **Boards & Commissions:** Qualifying individuals are encouraged to study the job descriptions of various board and commission roles and to make application to serve. Membership on a board or commission is the most direct manner to gain information, deliberate relevant matters, and contributed to the decision making process. For example, a local church that is concerning about community change could request a representative seat on the Downtown Development Authority to increase their impact as a stakeholder.
- Ad Hoc Committees: Mayoral Ad Hoc committees are critical to communicating and resolving in-depth and technical matters. Such groups can be formed of any array of key stakeholders to resolve the details of a street reconstruction project, neighborhood forestry objectives, streetscape design, and more. These are specific purpose committees formed under the council by-laws, and they dissolve upon completion of their dedicated task.
- **Public Comment:** Comments made at the various meeting, open house, workshop, and related venues (as well as all electric/written correspondence) is the most fundamental way to impact the decision making process for those stakeholders not directly involved in an official capacity. This option is readily available, transparent, and immediate.

Communicating Results

- **Minutes:** Minutes from boards, commissions, and committees communicate expert level findings, recommendations, public comment, and outcomes.
- **City Manager Reports/Packets:** City Manager packets, including reports, are the backbone of consolidated communication regarding the status of all plans and projects. The reports are in every city council packet and are on the city's webpage in current and archived form, enabling the public to view the progress of such plans and projects over time. Raw data, including survey results, all city minutes, routine reports, and staff/consultant findings are available and filed with the packets.
- Annual Reports: Annual reports (filed for PC, ZBA, Park Board, and DDA) contain succinct data, findings, outcomes, and other valuable information that is used to report all substantial activity for the respective body's policy, plan, and project activity for that calendar year. The report findings and recommendations often impact the decision making processes at the highest levels of city government.

Evaluating Results

In communicating results, an expectation of outreach will be to include attendance and participation data for staff, council, and related bodies to gauge effectiveness of outreach, venues, and related engagement circumstances.

Surveys, workshops, and related events/input instruments shall include questionaries that include the following at a minimum:

- How did you learn of this event/project?
- How would you rate the venue/materials provided/speaker/etc?
- What can the community do to improve information sharing/feedback collection/inclusion in the decision making process?

Updating the Community Engagement Strategy

The City of Swartz Creek includes a Redevelopment Ready Communities section in the city manager's report. Quarterly audits are included in the packet and administrative processes are in place to review best practices of the RRC program, including the Community Engagement Strategy. This strategy will be reviewed by the city planning commission with their annual report and recommendations for changes will be made at that time.

Hello, Adam!

Thank you for your time this morning. Here is an overview of what we discussed.

The City of Swartz Creek will be involved in many of the engagement and planning processes for the Safe Routes to School grant over the next several months. This may include staff or elected leaders participating in engagement meetings, as well as a commitment to using best practices for pedestrian improvements on city owned infrastructure.

We are expecting to use the month of May to collect important data which will help guide our future conversation. I'll be working with Ben and the principals of all three candidate buildings to get the process started. This includes a series of surveys which will be administered at/by the candidate schools, the mapping of student addresses for all candidate schools, and the mapping of pedestrian and cycle traffic/crash data for the City of Swartz Creek.

We (Theresa and Cade) encourage you to share articles and posts from the "<u>Crim Active</u> <u>Communities</u>" Facebook page. We will also send you relevant links and post ideas on occasion to help you promote pedestrian safety and the Safe Routes to School process.

We are planning on holding one or more "walking audit" upon the completion of the data collection mention above. These audits will likely take place in June.

Once the data collection and walking audits are completed, we will conduct at least one "Action Planning" meeting, where we will prioritize safety interventions at each school. We will encourage participation of students, parents, and representatives from the city at these meetings. Additional programming, educational, and enforcement related interventions can also be included in these meeting discussions.

An engineering firm (contracted by the City of Swartz Creek) will work from the completed priority lists in order to create a construction/improvement budget which can be submitted with the rest of the application materials in October 2019.

The Swartz Creek City Council will need to pass a "Safe Routes to School" resolution prior to the submission of the application in October of 2019. I will provide basic language for this resolution.

Please let me know if there is anything that I've left out or misrepresented.

Recreational Marihuana Q&A



Updated April 2, 2019

MMMA –	Michigan Medical Marihuana Act, patient/caregiver model
MMFLA –	Medical Marihuana Facilities Licensing Act, medical facilities licensed by the State and located in municipalities that opt in
MRTMA –	Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act, recreational (non- medical) marihuana businesses to be licensed by the State and located in municipalities that do not opt out
LARA –	State of Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs, department responsible for rule making and licensing of marihuana

Opting In/Opting Out

- Q1: If a municipality chooses to do nothing in response to the new recreational MRTMA law, how will the law affect it?
- A. If you do nothing, then you are effectively "opting in" to permit recreational marihuana commercial businesses.
- Q2. What is the timeline for a municipality to opt out?
- A. Applications for recreational marihuana business licenses will begin to be accepted on December 6, 2019. Under the terms of the MRTMA, LARA has one year from the date of the November 2018 election certification to prepare. However, there is word that Governor Whitmer would like the timing fast-tracked to perhaps as early as June 2019.
- Q3. How does a municipality opt out?
- A. Although the statute doesn't provide language for municipalities opting out, nor how to do it, since ordinances are mentioned in the statute you are likely better protected if you opt out by ordinance rather than resolution. Additionally, the MRTMA permits the

complete prohibition of recreational commercial establishments by voter initiative.

- Q4: May municipalities opt out of the MRTMA now and opt in later? What about the reverse: opt in now and opt out later?
- A. Yes, you can opt out now and opt in later. You can change your mind and later revise your ordinance. Opting out after opting in is likely more problematic. The licenses are for one year only, though. A lawfully licensed and established recreational marihuana business which is not in violation of any regulation might argue that is should be permitted to continue to operate as a nonconforming use, or that by prohibiting its continued operation that such amount to a unconstitutional regulatory taking. However, Federal courts would not likely recognize that form of "taking" in the context of marihuana due to it being an unlawful Schedule 1 substance, since one might have a recognizable "reasonable investment backed expectation" by trading in an unlawful substance.
- Q5: Does a village have to opt out of both the MMFLA and MRTMA, or just recreational? We don't want either.
- A: The MRTMA requires an opt out. The MMFLA does not—medical marihuana facilities can only locate in your municipality if you opt in.
- Q6: Our municipality didn't do an ordinance to opt out but instead recently passed a Resolution setting a "moratorium" on recreational marihuana businesses in our community until December 31, 2019. We wanted time to do more research, let State of Michigan establish rules, regs, etc. Are we vulnerable to allowing marihuana businesses to come in since we didn't opt out?
- A. While moratoria are generally not favored by courts, they are not unlawful either. It is recommended that a moratorium not last any longer than one year, and a six-month term, even if extended by another 6-month term is likely preferred, so long as the community is actively working on defining the issues and working on options as to how to best address the issues.
- Q7. Can municipalities decide to allow only microbusinesses?

- A. The statute isn't clear on this, but we think the answer may be a "qualified yes" since the language of the MRTMA permits a municipality to "provide for the number of marihuana establishments." Ostensibly, a community could solely provide for a certain number or perhaps an unlimited number of micro businesses but provide that no other types of recreational marihuana establishment be permitted. However, given the less than certain and vague language of the statute, final guidance will likely come from the courts or clarifying legislation.
- Q8. Does "prohibit" mean all, or can the municipality pick and choose the businesses and only choose some?
- A: The statute is less than clear on whether municipalities can pick and choose which type of establishments they will allow. However, there is an argument for doing so. If deciding to take this type of course of action, consult with your municipal attorney for guidance.
- Q9: If a township opts out, does that mean a village within that township has opted out—and the inverse as well? If township opts in is the village allowed to opt out?
- A: The statute doesn't mention counties—just cities, villages, and townships. Villages are governmental entities and pass their own ordinances separate from townships.
- Q10. Does the 150-plant limitation for a micro business mean 150 growing plants in addition to additional plants drying?
- A. No. "Cultivate" means "to propagate, breed, grow, harvest, dry, cure, or separate parts of the marihuana plant by manual or mechanical means" under the MRTMA. Since cultivation includes both growing and drying, the 150-plant limitation at any one time would include both operations.
- Q11. Does a general law village need to hold public hearings on MRTMA? Our zoning person thinks it's a police action that doesn't need a hearing.
- Licensing is the exercise of the police power; determining where a particular business may locate is a zoning issue subject the process set forth in the Michigan Zoning Enabling Act.

Interaction with other Marihuana Statutes – MMMA and MMFLA

- Q12: Can a caregiver grow recreational marijuana for his own use?
- A: Probably, yes. Being a registered caregiver does not preclude one from growing recreational marihuana for yourself. There's an argument for growing 24 plants on the premises—12 plants could be grown for medical, and 12 plants for recreational.
- Q13. Where do caretakers fall? Can they sell directly to consumers?
- A. Under the MMMA, the patient/caregiver act, caregivers can be compensated for the costs associated with assisting their patients in the use of medical marihuana. Under the MMFLA, provisioning centers may only sell to registered caregivers and patients. Under the MRTMA, only a micro business or a marihuana retailer may sell marihuana; individuals cannot sell recreational marihuana—it can only be "gifted," so long as the transfer is not advertised or promoted to the public.
- Q14. What impact would opting out of medical marijuana have on caregivers using their homes for their businesses?
- A. The MRTMA will not affect the MMMA. The patient/caregiver model will continue, the same as it was before the recreational proposal was passed. However, note should be taken that the Michigan Court of Appeals has ruled that municipalities may not limit caregivers to "home occupations" under local zoning ordinances.
- Q15. If a municipality opted in to MMFLA can it keep out recreational marihuana retailing centers?
- A. This is not clear in the statute. There are two schools of thought. One approach argues that given the language in the MRTMA permitting municipalities to completely prohibit recreational marihuana establishments, that even though a community has opted to permit medical marihuana facilities, it need not permit recreational marihuana businesses. The

other approach argues that since the MRTMA prohibits a municipality from adopting an ordinance which prohibits a grower, processor or retailer from operating at a location shared with a facility operating pursuant to a MMFLA license, means that a community opting in to permit medical marihuana facilities may not prohibit recreational growers, processor or retailers. The final answer will likely come from the courts. Again, consult with your municipal attorney.

- Q16: Could a municipality opt in to medical establishments, but out of recreational? If so, can this be in the same ordinance, or would it have to be in two separate ordinances?
- A: See the answer to the question above, but arguably a community can say yes to opt in to medical and no to recreational. Two separate ordinances would seem to be a better approach, but there is nothing that legally requires it, so it might be done with a single ordinance.
- Q17: If a business has been licensed as a medical facility, must it also be licensed as a recreational facility if it applies?
- A: The business would have to separately qualify for a recreational license. For the first 24 months after the State begins to accept applications, applicants for a recreational retailer, process, class B or C grower, or transporter must be licensed under the MMFLA to engage in the medical marihuana business. For the first 24 months, LARA will only accept applications from Michigan residents for licensure as a class A grower or a microbusiness. However, after one year, LARA may accept applications from anyone, if it determines that additional licenses are needed to minimize the illegal marihuana market, to efficiently meet the demand for marihuana or to provide reasonable access to marihuana in rural areas of the State.
- Q18. Has the \$5,000 municipal licensing fee (under the MMFLA) been challenged (if municipality is not even doing fire inspections, etc.)?
- A. You must be able to demonstrate that the cost of enforcement and administrating of the law is costing the local government approximately \$5,000. If those costs are substantially less than \$5,000, the fee needs

to be reduced to reflect the actual cost of those services.

* Kalamazoo requires an upfront application fee for its medical marihuana licenses but refunds a portion of the application fee for those who didn't get a license.

Licensing

Q19: When will LARA start issuing licenses?

- A. Under the MRTMA, LARA has one year from the law's effective date of December 6, 2018 to put its regulatory framework in place and begin to accept applications. But indications are that Governor Whitmer would like LARA to start accepting applications as early as the summer of 2019. If the State isn't ready by December 2019, then municipalities are on the front line—businesses can come to your community and ask for a license. Your municipality becomes the regulatory agency for a year, not the State.
- Q20: Can municipalities license and regulate recreational marihuana businesses ahead of the State?
- A: Only in the circumstance where the State is not ready to accept applications in December 2019. Otherwise the MRTMA says that a business needs a State license first. Once a business gets a State license then it can get a municipal license (if the municipality wants to license; municipalities don't have to). It is ill-advised for a municipality to regulate before a State license is issued. Municipalities will be the regulatory agency IF, after one year, the State hasn't put in a regulatory framework.
- Q21. What are the pros and cons of a municipality deciding to license marihuana?
- A. LARA will come up with rules but will not decide anything about zoning (where businesses can be located) and hours of operation, for instance. So, zoning needs to be addressed at the local level, regardless. Licensing at the local level may permit greater ability to inspect and monitor recreational marihuana businesses, but the ability for law enforcement inspections under the MRTMA is not as broad as under the MMFLA. Additionally, if the municipality seeks to limit the number of licensed recreational marihuana establishments, it must

employ a "competitive process intended to select applicants who are best suited to operate in compliance with (the MRTMA) within the municipality." Unfortunately, the statute provides no other guidance as to what that process should look like so as to provide a safe harbor; as a result, this may put municipalities at risk of lawsuits from applicants who do not receive a license.

- Q22. Will LARA regulate how many licenses are in one municipality, such as with liquor licenses?
- A. No.
- Q23. Will a village with 10 empty buildings be forced to potentially allow 10 recreational marihuana businesses if they allow one?
- A. It depends on whether the village chooses to limit the number of establishments and how its zoning ordinance is written regarding the applicable zones where the various types of marihuana establishment are permitted to operate, along with separation distances from schools and residential zones.
- Q24: Can a municipality charge an application fee along with the annual license—for example, a \$2,500 application fee? This is done in Colorado with many communities.
- A: The statute is silent on this. The \$5,000 fee set forth in the MRTMA is for administration (and enforcement) costs—seems like processing an application would be included in this fee. Also, keep in mind that an administrative fee must approximate the actual cost of providing the service; otherwise it is an unlawful tax. It is also not a good idea to follow another state's process since the underlying statutory authority is likely to be different from that in the Michigan law.
- Q25: Are the licensing restrictions applicable for the first 24 months after the effective date of the Act, or first 24 months after LARA's rules and regulations are released?
- A: 24 months from the effective the date of Act (December 6, 2019).

- Q26: If a municipality does have a license fee of up to \$5,000, what types of expenses CAN it go toward for enforcement? (Since the new law doesn't allow for inspections like officers do routinely for liquor).
- A: Anything your municipal clerk, law enforcement agency, or inspections staff does to review the application, the applicant, or proposed site of the business. Then once the business is established, if you can demonstrate that that these businesses generate complaints or more calls for services so as to demonstrate the need for increased resources, then those costs ought to be included as well so as to demonstrate the need to charge up to \$5,000 as a fee.
- Q27: It seems this will cost villages a bit to get their lawyer/zoning official up to speed on this. Couldn't an argument be made that the \$5,000 is used to help recoup upfront costs?
- A: Probably. Legal services associated with administration and enforcement would be part of a legitimate argument to support the amount of the fee.

Effects of Opting In

- Q28: If a municipality opts in is it required to have 24-7 police support?
- A: No. Police support is not required by this new Act.
- Q29: If a municipality opts in, how will that affect eligibility for federal/State grants? If a municipality is getting federal grant money, won't the federal government deny it because the municipality allows recreational marijuana?
- A: You will have to look at the language of the grants for instance, is there language on maintaining a drug free work place or anything like that? Certain municipal employees who are federally-grant funded, could be made subject to a zero-tolerance drug policy. Otherwise you are probably OK. If the grant language poses a problem, a municipality might consider whether the federal government is co-opting local and State government to carry out federal drug policy? Several communities have successfully challenged law enforcement grants that require compliance with federal immigration law by the local

municipality. The issue is currently in litigation in several federal courts.

- Q30: May the municipality increase the distance from preexisting schools to further than 1,000 feet?
- A. 1,000 feet is the limitation set forth in the MRTMA. You would likely get challenged if you increased the distance. 1,000 feet is a standard under both Michigan and federal Drug-Free School Zone laws. It should be noted that the MRTMA permits a municipality to reduce the distance requirement.

Miscellaneous

- Q.31: What can a city do if a citizen calls and says his neighbor is selling marihuana out of his home?
- A. Not much. This would be very hard to prove.
 Marihuana has been decriminalized—violations are now a civil infraction.
- Q32: Can home growers sell their marihuana?
- A. No, the recreational statute says that it may be "gifted," but not sold. Caregivers, under the MMMA, can get paid as recompense for the cost of providing the service/product.
- Q33: Since people can't "sell" recreational marihuana, can they sell other things, such as t-shirts or \$75 and give a "gift" baggie of marihuana as a thank-you, like we've seen in other States?
- A. A real possibility. That is already happening in Michigan—there is a company that is selling and delivering chocolate and the driver is giving away free pot to those that purchase chocolate. This practice will likely be challenged. It will be up for the courts to decide.
- Q34: Can you clarify if it is 12 plants per person per household or 12 plants per household?
- A. 12 Plants per person over 21 in the household. That said, there may be argument to assert that it is a 12 plant per premises limit. The MRTMA at § 5.1 (b) says "provided that not more than 12 marihuana plants are possessed, cultivated, or processed on the premises at once," leading to the assertion of a 12 plant per premises limit. However, the introductory language to

\$5.1 says "the following acts by a person 21 years of age or older are not unlawful", and then subsection (b), begins with the phrase "within the person's residence" before stating the 12-plant limit. Like other issues with the MRTMA, this issue of the proper interpretation of the language in question will likely be decided by the courts

- Q35: Can municipalities pass odor control ordinances?
- A. This will depend on whether and to what extent LARA addresses the issue. Any local regulation may not be inconsistent with State administrative rules, but a municipality could adopt a provision to require system to diffuse odors consistent with an applicable State rule or in the absence of a rule, look to see what the Stille DeRosset Construction Code allows you to do.
- Q36: Can tourists come to Michigan and purchase marihuana?
- A. As long as they are 21 years of age or older.
- Q37: Can the DDA prohibit marihuana establishments in the downtown district?
- A: It is not likely that a DDA can do that—the municipality has authority for zoning, etc. not the DDA. A DDA is not really empowered to regulate businesses. But ask your municipal attorney.
- Q38: How does CBD oil/products fit into all this? Is a store allowed to sell CBD oil if the municipality opts out?
- A: In the lame duck session of the Legislature, several bills (PA 641, 642, and 648 of 2018) were adopted addressing hemp and hemp products which severely limited or prohibited local regulation. Currently (April 1, 2019) the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD) is developing a licensing program for hemp growers to meet both state and federal laws. At this time, the FDA has not approved CBD for use in food or drink or as a dietary supplement.
- Q39: On the subject of the taxes going toward municipalities, schools, etc. with a cash-based business, how can we be sure there is accurate reporting of the sale prices and actual income a

business may have? Couldn't they charge a steep price and only report a lesser price to avoid paying as much tax?

- A: LARA (and the Michigan Department of Treasury) will probably address this issue in their rules. Most likely there will be a tracking system to track recreational seed to sale just like medical marihuana.
- Q40. Can a city charge a city sales tax on the sale of the recreational marijuana?
- A. No. Michigan cities are not authorized to charge sales tax.
- Q41: Has there been any input from the Michigan Building Codes Commissioner as far as ventilation requirements for odors, fire suppression requirements due to flammability concerns...can a municipality restrict an establishment based on building code issues?
- A: LARA has addressed some of that in the rules for medical marihuana, so we expect similar standards will be applicable to recreational. As a municipality, you cannot be stricter than LARA rules.
- Q42: It is my understanding that municipal governments cannot limit marijuana related accessory business? i.e.: hydroponic stores, smoking supplies.
- A: Pipes and bongs can be used for tobacco and pipe tobacco—not specifically for marihuana. Soil and fertilizer aren't just for marihuana. The definition of "marihuana accessories" in the MRTMA states that the equipment, product, or material must be "specificallydesigned" for marihuana. This language makes it very difficult for a municipality to somehow regulate or say someone violated a law because they are trading in marihuana accessories. It would have to be shown that it is exclusively designed for marihuana.
- Q43. How effective is the testing of under the influence of marihuana in a motor vehicle?
- A. This area is still under development. Tests can show if an individual has used marihuana, not whether he or she is presently under the influence. On March 26th, a report was issued from the Impaired Driving Safety Commission appointed by then-Governor Snyder that suggests there not be a THC limit to be considered

driving impaired. The conclusion was reached due to findings that there is no set number of nanograms of TCH that causes a certain degree of impairment.

- Q44. If a car is pulled over for speeding and the police find marihuana, what happens to the marihuana?
- A. If possible, the driver can a) turn it over to person who is 21 years of age or older; or b) secure it in the motor vehicle. If those options are not available, and it is confiscated by police officers a municipality should consider requiring the individual to seek a court order for its return. Under the federal Controlled Substances Act, there is a law enforcement exception, but it is an open question whether returning marihuana in this circumstance falls within the exception. California courts say it does, while Colorado courts say that it doesn't. This issue will likely have to be decided by Michigan courts.
- Q45. Are hemp products now legal in Michigan?
- A. In the lame duck session of the Legislature, several bills (PA 641, 642, and 648 of 2018) were adopted addressing hemp and hemp products which severely limited or prohibited local regulation. Currently (April 1, 2019) the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD) is developing a licensing program for hemp growers to meet both state and federal laws. Consult with your municipal attorney to see how these new laws might impact your community.
- Q46. Can a community pass an ordinance that the city is the only entity allowed to sell retail marijuana? A community in Oregon has done this.
- A. Interesting question. More research is necessary to provide an answer.
- Q47. Do you agree that a city-owned campground can prohibit recreational marijuana use inside their mobile homes?
- A. The MRTMA permits a landlord to prohibit or regulate the consumption and cultivation of marihuana on rented premises, but a landlord may not prohibit a tenant from lawfully possessing or consuming marihuana in a manner other than smoking.

Q&A with Andrew Brisbo, Director of LARA's Bureau of Marijuana Regulation

(from the League's Capital Conference on March 20, 2019)

- Q48. Now that recreational has been decriminalized, will the medical marihuana industry go away?
- A. It may be reduced some, but most likely will not go away. There are several reasons for this: medical marihuana is used by people under the age of 18 (for seizure disorders, for instance); some patients prefer to purchase it in a medical setting; and medical marihuana purchases do not have the 10 percent excise fee that recreational purchases will have. In Colorado, the number of medical patients went from 115,000 to about 85,000 after recreational marihuana was passed there.
- Q49. For the standard of a marihuana establishment being required to be located 1,000 feet from a school— where does that 1,000 feet measurement start?
- A. That standard will have to be addressed/defined in your municipal zoning ordinance.

- Q50. When LARA receives and application for recreational marihuana, how will it contact the municipality where the applicant proposes to locate?
- A. LARA staff will look on the municipality's website for the clerk's phone number.
- Q51. Our municipal attorney recommended our city pass a one-year moratorium. Some on our council are uncomfortable with that, because it is not a firm "yes" or a firm "no." How will LARA interpret a city's moratorium?
- A. You can inform LARA that a moratorium means "no," and we will follow that.
- Q52. Are social club licenses OK during the year before the recreational rules come out from LARA?
- A. They aren't prohibited, but they are also not authorized by the voter-initiated statute. If this activity gets underway, it may have to be rolled back once the regulatory program is in place. We do not know yet.

AN ORDINANCE TO ADD SECTION 35-70 TO CHAPTER 35 OF THE CITY CODE TO PROHIBIT MARIHUANA ESTABLISHMENTS WITHIN THE CITY

THE CITY OF STERLING HEIGHTS ORDAINS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. Section 35-70 is added to Article IV of Chapter 35 of the Code of Ordinances to read as follows: 35-70. PROHIBITION OF MARIHUANA ESTABLISHMENTS.

The Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act was initiated by the voters of the State of Michigan pursuant to Proposal 1, the Marijuana Legalization Initiative, on November 6, 2018. The Act authorizes cities, villages, and townships to completely prohibit marihuana establishments within their boundaries. Pursuant to that authority, marihuana establishments as defined in the Act are hereby prohibited within the City.

SECTION 2. All other provisions of the Code of Ordinances not specifically amended shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 3. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding pending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any cause or causes of action acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby revised as cited in Section 1 of this ordinance; nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired, or affected by this ordinance.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon publication of a notice of adoption.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit this proposal for professional services for the intersection review. This letter represents our scope of services. It also notes a time schedule, expected compensation and our standard contract terms and conditions. To indicate the City's acceptance, please have copies of this agreement signed by the appropriate officials and have one returned to us at your earliest convenience.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Fairchild St at Cappy Ln is a tee intersection but posted as a 2-way STOP. In itself, this is very unusual. The City is now looking to see if an all-way STOP should be authorized. The process is straightforward. Warrants for an all-way STOP are clearly delineated in MMUTCD Section 2B.07 and are based on crash data and / or minimum volumes of vehicles and pedestrians.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

OHM will obtain and analyze a minimum of two years of crash data for this intersection. The volume part of the warrant will require the threshold being met for a minimum of 8 hours, so approach vehicle volumes are usually collected for a 24-hour period. Moreover, we will want to get pedestrian counts of crossing Fairchild to supplement the analysis. OHM will use a data subconsultant, Traffic Data Collection, Inc., to collect 24-hour video capture of the intersection. The video capture will allow for processing for both vehicle and pedestrian movements.

OHM will take the crash and volume data, summarize the data and analyze to see if the location meets warrants for an all-way STOP. Our report will provide a recommendation on reasonable measures to improve the safety of the intersection.

PROJECT MANAGEMENT

OHM has assembled a team of professionals and specialists to plan and deliver the services required to achieve the School's goals and objectives. The team is comprised of practiced traffic engineers, with extensive safety experience. The project manager will be Stephen Dearing, PE, PTOE, and the evaluation efforts will be led by Taryn Juidici, PE.

STANDARD TERMS and CONDITIONS

1. <u>THE AGREEMENT</u> – These Standard Terms and Conditions and the attached Proposal or Scope of Services, upon their acceptance by the Owner, shall constitute the entire Agreement between Orchard, Hiltz & McCliment, Inc. (OHM ADVISORS), a registered Michigan Corporation, and the Owner. The Agreement shall supersede all prior negotiations or agreements, whether written or oral, with respect to the subject matter herein. The Agreement may be amended only by mutual agreement between OHM ADVISORS and the Owner and said amendments must be in written form.

4. <u>PERIOD OF SERVICE</u> – The services called for in this Agreement shall be completed within the time frame stipulated in the Proposal or Scope of Services, or if not stipulated shall be completed within a time frame which may reasonably be required for completion of the work. OHM ADVISORS shall not be liable for any loss or damage due to failure or delay in rendering any service called for under this agreement resulting from any cause beyond OHM ADVISORS reasonable control.

5. <u>COMPENSATION</u> – The Owner shall pay OHM ADVISORS for services performed in accordance

with the method of payment as stated in the Proposal or Scope of Services. Method of compensation may be lump sum, hourly; based on a rate schedule, percentage of the construction cost, or cost plus a fixed fee. The Owner shall pay OHM ADVISORS for reimbursable expenses for subconsultant services, equipment rental or other special project related items at a rate of 1.15 times the invoice amount.

6. <u>TERMS OF PAYMENT</u> – Invoices shall be submitted to the Owner not more often than monthly for services performed during the preceding period. Owner shall pay the full amount of the invoice within thirty days of the invoice date. If payment is not made within thirty days, the amount due to OHM ADVISORS shall include a charge at the rate of one percent per month from said thirtieth day.

7. LIMIT OF LIABILITY - OHM ADVISORS shall perform professional services under this Agreement in a manner consistent with the degree of care and skill in accordance with applicable professional standards of services of this type of work. To the fullest extent permitted by law, and not withstanding any other provision of this Agreement, the total liability in the aggregate, of OHM ADVISORS and its Officers, Directors, Partners, employees, agents, and subconsultants, and any of them, to the Owner and anyone claiming by, through or under the Owner, for any and all claims, losses, costs or damages of any nature whatsoever arises out of, resulting from or in any way related to the project or the Agreement from any cause or causes, including but not limited to the negligence, professional errors or omissions, strict liability, breach of contract or warranty, express or implied, of OHM ADVISORS or OHM ADVISORS' Officers, Directors, employees, agents or subconsultants, or any of them shall not exceed the amount of \$25,000 or OHM ADVISORS fee, whichever is greater.

12. <u>TERMINATION</u> – Either party may at any time terminate this Agreement upon giving the other party 7 calendar days prior written notice. OHM ADVISORS makes no warranty, expressed or implied, as to the accuracy of such opinions as compared to bid or actual cost.

15. JOB SITE SAFETY – Neither the professional activities of OHM ADVISORS, nor the presence of OHM ADVISORS or our employees and subconsultants at a construction site shall relieve the General Contractor or any other entity of their obligations, duties, and responsibilities including, but not limited to, construction means, methods, sequences, techniques or procedures necessary for performing, superintending or coordinating all portions of the work of construction in accordance with the contract documents and the health or safety precautions required by any regulatory agency. OHM ADVISORS has no authority to exercise any control over any construction contractor or any other entity or their employees in connection with their work or any health or safety precautions. The Owner agrees that the General Contractor is solely responsible for jobsite safety, and warrants that this intent shall be made clear in the Owners agreement with the General Contractor. The Owner also agrees that OHM ADVISORS shall be indemnified and shall be made additional insureds under the General Contractors general liability insurance policy.

16. <u>DISPUTE RESOLUTION</u> – In an effort to resolve any conflicts that arise during the design or construction of the project or following the completion of the project, the Owner and OHM ADVISORS agree that all disputes between them arising out of or relating to this Agreement shall be submitted to nonbinding mediation, unless the parties mutually agree otherwise.
