OLD / ROUTINE BUSINESS – REVISITED ISSUES / PROJECTS

- PERSONNEL POLICIES & PROCEDURES (Status) Pending.
- ✓ DISASTER, EMERGENCY RESPONSE POLICY COMMITTEE (Status) We should be back before the Council for discussion on this in the near future.
- ✓ VETERANS MEMORIAL (Status) Nothing New.
- ✓ NON-RESIDENT SERVICES STUDY, RAUBINGER BRIDGE (Status) The Raubinger Bridge Project has a tentative start date of July 2009.

✓ **OVERHEAD UTILITY REORGANIZATION PROJECT** (Status)

As we discussed, the utility companies have lobbied the passing of a number of pieces of legislation that have stripped us of virtually all control of our rights of way. In regards to the aesthetics, we have little power other than to pay for changes. The next step is to get a contractor's quote for the second round of the technical review of the poles. From here, we may have some power by filing complaints on the safety issues. REI is getting a quote together from their survey division and should be back with it shortly. My thinking is to narrow down the inventory to the downtown, Miller & Elms and Bristol Road. This will hold the cost down and we can always go back and pick up additional sections of the City.

✓ MAJOR STREET FUND, TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENTS (See Individual Category)

- 2010-2013 T.I.P. APPLICATION (Status)
 Pending.
- BRISTOL ROAD T.I.P. PROJECT, VERIZON INVOICE (Status)

We have someone's attention here. I have an F.O.I.A. request from Verizon's legal department for records. I have requested a 10-day extension and am working with Mr. Figura on a response. I will keep the Council informed.

THREE LANE CONVERSION, STRIPING (Status) As we discussed, a conversion to three lanes for Miller east of Elms is not cost feasible. We will be going to bid for a conversion for all of Morrish, being Bristol south to the south City Limits. When we have better cost returns on this, we will look at the feasibility of continuing. Although it appears doubtful, we will keep our eye on the possibility of Economic Stimulus Funds for this project.

ELMS ROAD RE-SURFACING PROJECT (Status) Completed, with the exception of some minor cleanup work in the spring.

□ MORRISH ROAD RE-CONSTRUCTION PROJECT / MEIJER'S (Status)

Plans are in place to perform the Morrish Road work in accordance with the Development Agreement with Meijer and the current engineers' plans. There is a complication concerning the design of the Morrish and Bristol Road intersection due to the standards of the Genesee County Road Commission. The project cannot be completed as designed according to GCRC. To construct the intersection to their standards, increased road widths and right-of-way acquisition is required. These needs increase the cost substantially. As such, the project will end at the northern City limits for the time being and the intersection, termed 'phase two' will be completed at a later date. It is hoped that GCRC will negotiate more reasonable standards in the mean time.

GM-SPO ISLAND CUTS (Status)

This project is no longer in the 2009 TIP. The City can still evaluate the cost vs. benefit ratio and include this project in future TIP call for projects.

✓ LOCAL STREET FUND, TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENTS

2008 REPAIR ROSTER (Status)

Bid results for Chesterfield from Seymour to Winston, Jennie Lane, Worchester from Winston to Daval and Daval from Oakview to Winshall are \$398,154. We have placed all local streets re-surfacing on hold for a bit while we explore funding options.

TRANSPORTATION ASSET MANAGEMENT EVALUATION (Status) Pending report.

✓ SEWER REHABILITATION PROJECT, I&I, PENALTIES (Status)

Phase II was approved on October 13th and will begin shortly. I will keep the Council posted on progress. The manhole rehabilitation program is under contract and work is underway. Included with tonight's packet is an interesting letter of complaint. A homeowner in the woods is upset that by the City shoring up the sanitary sewer manhole in his front yard ditch, to prevent surface water from entering the system, has caused storm water to remain in his ditch. We will look at an inexpensive solution. Aside from this, any work would have to be funded via a special assessment district, which will not be popular.

✓ **FIRE DEPARTMENT EVALUATION, CONTRACT RENEWAL, BUDGET** (*Status*) I have begun meeting with Mr. Beatty. I will keep the Council posted.

✓ WWS INTERGOVERNMENTAL JURISDICTION SEWER ORDINANCE (Status)

Pending. Mr. Delzer has completed an 'almost-final' draft. There are one or two items that need to be clarified and one or two changes to be made before it is ready. As stated, my opinion is that this ordinance is adequate and justified in regards to its intent and technical requirements. However, the City has no desire to enter into a "forever" agreement that blanket transmits all authority to the County for IPP issues and anything else related to sewer regulation, rates, fees, fines, etc. For the time being, they seem acceptable to this. Look to see an ordinance and resolution that designates the County as our enforcement agency very shortly.

NON-MOTORIZED TRAIL SYSTEM, PHASE I (Status) Pending bid returns.

✓ SR. CENTER, LEVY, BUILDING & FUTURE FUNDING PLAN (*Resolution*)

As you recall, at the December 8th Meeting we endorsed a concept for an addition wherein the City would loan the SCASC funds that they were short for the construction The Center would work the debt retirement and building of a 6.000+ SF addition. upkeep, utilities and maintenance expenses into their budget. We have held a series of meetings with the Sr. Center and their architect regarding the planned addition and subsequent funding. The Center advises they are unable to make the numbers work and they request additional financial help from the City. Given the economic air and shrinking General Fund, we are unable to do this and in fact, we need relief from the expenses we now pay or at a minimum, they need to be capped. As a solution, the Center downsized the proposed addition, from 6,000+ SF to 4,616 SF, thus eliminating the need to borrow funds. In a proposal the Center made, they will fund the construction without borrowing from the City. Included with the project is a 2,880 SF basement that the City will fund. Cost estimates performed by the Architect Doug Stephens, for the entire project is \$879,863. Mr. Stephens apportions the City's cost for the basement and related ancillary expenses at \$338,430. I am in disagreement with the numbers as presented by Mr. Stephens. I recommend we bail on this project, find another solution to our storage problem and enter into a lease agreement with leasehold improvement options with the Sr. Center under the following general conditions:

- 1. The existing agreement(s) with the Center be dissolved.
- 2. As long as the County collects a levy in the City and distributes funds to the Sr. Center, the City will not levy for the authorized .5 mills for the duration of the collection period.
- 3. A new lease shall be drafted for the existing center.
- 4. Provisions within the new lease will allow for leaseholder improvements by the lessee (Sr. Center).
- 5. If the Sr. Center elects to construct an addition, the project will be theirs. The project will follow normal site plan approval process and in compliance with all applicable ordinances. All construction funding will be the responsibility of the Center.
- 6. The City will permit the expenditure of funds held by the Center for the construction of an addition to the existing building. If the Center fails to construct an addition, then the funds will be returned to the City and either refunded to the taxpayers or spent on programs or activities as provided for in the ballot language.
- 7. All expenses associated with the building and the Center will be the responsibility of the Center, including, but not limited to maintenance, utilities, janitorial, repairs, inspections, etc. The City will provide lawn care and snow removal, without charge. As long as the program is available, the City will designate the 15% allotment of C.D.B.G. Funds. Additionally, and as long as the City can afford it, an additional cash contribution of \$5,000 per year towards maintenance will be made. This contribution will terminate in the event the City is forced to reduce it's workforce due to budget constraints.
- 8. In the event of the dissolution of the SCASC, the building and all funds and assets will be turned over to the City.

On a final note, I have included a recent drawing that includes another structure added to the project, being a storage / garage to house a vehicle that the Center desires to

purchase. I have a resolution that endorses this concept included with tonight's agenda.

✓ SPRINGBROOK, HERITAGE STREET-LIGHTING (Status)

I am working on a recommendation and a policy in handling our condominium associations in an effort to treat them all the same. I will be back at a near future meeting for discussion and the adoption of a policy.

✓ LABOR CONTRACTS & RETIREE HEALTHCARE (Status)

Mr. Kehoe still needs a basic employment agreement and the Supervisor's contract has a wage re-opener. I will be back, probably at the next meeting with these.

On my contract, it probably needs visiting for update purposes. I would like to take a pass on any rate increases for another year or two and until we are on better financial ground. I am not sure how the Council desires to handle an evaluation. As you recall, a couple of years ago I created a list of accomplishments and shortfalls as I saw them. I could bring the list up to date and then bring it back to the Council for discussion and review. Unless the Council has strong input one way or the other, I will do this and set it for a discussion item, hopefully soon. We can then go from here.

The POLC, AFSCME and the Supervisor Contracts will expire on June 30th. In review, I anticipate a 1% - 3% decrease in the levy collection this year. On our other revenues, I can only predict that they will also decline, maybe significantly. The first line of defense here in preserving the level of services that we can provide will most likely be a freeze on all contract wage increases for all employees, on a year-to-year basis.

✓ MARATHON STATION BLIGHT & NON-CONFORMING USE (Status)

There have been no new developments, applications, or correspondence on this property since the late December meeting with Mr. Klein, whom is acting as a real estate broker for the sale of the property. He has two potential purchasers, one doubtful and the other somewhat better. He also has looming foreclosure with the bank. He has negotiated a sale price that is lower than the loan amount and is under time constraints to get site plan approval, which the sale is contingent. Additionally, he is asking for the amount owed the City to be adjusted off, fearing that it may block the site plan approval, that will block the sale, that will lead to foreclosure, that will lead to a long term continued abandonment of the building...hmm. Mr. Klein attributes the problems to the site contamination and Marathon Oil's mishandling of the cleanup to MI-DEQ satisfaction. Some of the contamination issues I know to be true based on our dealings with the environmental engineer-monitoring firm (Inland Seas). I think the much bigger problem was the current owner purchased the property for a cost that greatly exceeded the market value, as it pertains to the highest and best use. Like so many other speculator's, they duped a bank into writing a shaky note, and here we all are. The environmental issues only aggravate the problem. At any rate, they need to make the February Planning Commission Meeting in order to keep the bank off their back. In order to do this, they have to have an accurate site plan in before January 15th. Mr. Klein was instructed that the adjustment of the debt owed the City would be a Council decision.

COUNTY E.M.S. ORDINANCE, AMBULANCE SERVICE (Status) Pending.

✓ FEES, RATES & SERVICE CHARGES (Status)

As you are aware, we have water rate increases now in effect and a sewer rate increase on the way. We can float for a bit using Fund Balance, but we will have to do something by next summer. As we have discussed in the past, the entire water rate system is in need of re-structuring. In short, it needs to go to a ready to serve charge with a per use charge. We will be back with some recommendations for new ordinances sometime this spring.

- SALE OF CITY PROPERTY 5129 MORRISH ROAD (Status) Pending.
- ✓ WWS, STORM WATER MANAGEMENT AGREEMENT (Status) We are still looking at this.

✓ 2009 MASTER PLAN & ZONING CODE REVIEW (Status)

The City's Master Plan was last updated in 2004. Since these plans need to be revisited every five years or so, the City shall update the Master Plan sometime during the next calendar year. This can be quite a cumbersome process due to the requirements of State law; however, the impact of these plans is tremendous on all aspects of local governance. Since the last plan was adopted, there has not been significant change to the circumstances or assumptions that were used in the framing of that plan. As such, I expect a general review and acceptance will be in order, resulting in little substantial change to the 2004 Master Plan. We shall see. Expect this to show up in the form of a workshop in late spring or early summer. Additionally, the Planning Commission is having a public workshop to discuss updates to the Zoning Appendix A and zoning map. Expect some minor changes to the general provisions and the sign ordinance and some additional changes to the zoning map. There will eventually be an official public hearing and subsequent review by the City Council. Throughout this process, there may be some provisions of the Zoning Appendix A (concerning animals and parking) that shall be located with in the standard book of ordinances.

✓ SWARTZ AMBULANCE AGREEMENT (Status)

The contract/lease agreement that the City holds with Swartz Ambulance has expired and needs revisiting. There has been an idea or two proposed by staff to relocate the ambulance service to a more central location, perhaps on City property, in order to reduce the lease payments and upgrade the facilities. However, because of the need for Swartz to function closer to the urbanized area in order to make a Swartz Creek location feasible, it is not likely any such move shall occur. The status quo seems to be working for the time being so I expect a simple renewal to be in order. The holdup right now is due to the recent and untimely death of Mr. Harry Swartz, owner of Swartz Ambulance.

✓ **POLLING AGREEMENT, UNITED METHODIST CHURCH** (Status)

At the last meeting, we approved an agreement with the United Methodist Church to hold elections at the facility. The cost we approved was \$1,000 for use of the gymnasium and \$800 for the use of a smaller room referred to as the "Johnson Room". As a rule, we use the gymnasium for City Elections and the Schools use the Johnson Room for their elections. The original rent figures offered by the church were \$800 and \$600 for the day of the election only. They advised that we could probably have the facilities the afternoon before an election and the morning after, but could not necessarily guarantee it. When informed that we needed it reserved, they advised they would have to charge additional in order to hold it, henceforth the \$1,000 and \$800. In

a change of heart (after the last council meeting), the church advised they would honor the \$800 / \$600 price, inclusive of the before and after half days. At the request of the Mayor, we met with the Pastor and the Board Chair and settled on a further reduced cost of \$700 for use of the Gymnasium and \$350 for use of the Johnson Room. The agreement was executed at these numbers.

✓ CAPITAL CONFERENCE (Status)

The following Councilmembers are set for attendance at the Capital Conference: Binder, Hicks, Krueger & Abrams. If anyone needs anything, please get with me and we will take care of it.

✓ NEIGHBORHOOD STABILIZATION PROGRAM (*Discussion*)

Adam will be present at tonight's meeting to bring the Council up to date on the City's participation in this program.

NEW BUSINESS / PROJECTED ISSUES & PROJECTS

✓ GRANT OF EASEMENT, CONSUMER'S ENERGY (*Resolution*)

The Raubinger Road Bridge Project, handled by the Road Commission, will require the relocation of a Consumer's Energy utility pole. Although the pole will not relocate out of the existing Consumer's right of way, it will cause the adjoining wires to hang over property owned by the City. An easement has been requested by Consumer's. Attached is a copy of the easement and a drawing. Recommend approval.

✓ PARTICIPATE IN GENESEE COUNTY RE-CYCLING COALITION (*Resolution*)

Included with tonight's agenda is an invoice for the continued participation in the Genesee County's Re-Cycling Coalition. The cost remains the same, as it has for many years now, \$750. I have a resolution for continued participation.

CITY OF SWARTZ CREEK, a Michigan municipal corporation, 8083 Civic Drive, Swartz Creek, Michigan 48473, Grantor, for good and valuable consideration paid to Grantor by CONSUMERS ENERGY COMPANY, a Michigan corporation, One Energy Plaza, Jackson, Michigan 49201-2276, Grantee, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, Conveys and Warrants to Grantee, its successors and assigns, Forever, the easement and right to enter upon the land hereinafter described and to construct, operate, maintain, repair, inspect, replace, improve, enlarge and remove electric transmission and distribution facilities consisting of one line of poles with wires, cables, conductors, braces, guys, anchors, transformers and other fixtures and appurtenances, and lateral lines where hereinafter indicated, in, over and across said land, including all public highways upon or adjacent to said land, which land is in the <u>City</u> of <u>Swartz Creek</u>, County of <u>Genesee</u> and State of Michigan, and described as:

EASEMENT FOR ELECTRIC FACILITIES

A parcel of land in the Southeast 1/4 of Section 36, Township 7 North, Range 5 East described as: Beginning at the South 1/4 corner of Section 36; thence North 37 feet; thence Northeasterly along the South line of Supervisor's Plat of Larobardiere Acres to the West line of Lot 11 of said plat; thence South to the centerline of Swartz Creek; thence Southwesterly along said creek to the South line of Section 36; thence West to the place of beginning, and

That part of the North 1/2 of the Northeast 1/4 of Section 1, Township 6 North, Range 5 East lying Northerly of Swartz Creek.

Said line of poles is to be located in, over and across said land on a center line described as follows:

Beginning in the centerline of Consumers existing electric line at a point not more than 105 feet nor less than 55 feet North of the South line of Section 36, Township 7 North, Range 5 East at a point not more than 170 feet nor less than 120 feet East of the North and South 1/4 line of Section 36; thence Southwesterly to a point not more than 185 feet nor less than 135 feet South of the North line of Section 1, Township 6 North, Range 5 East at a point not more than 51 feet West of the North and South 1/4 line of Section 1; thence Southwesterly to a point not more than 65 feet nor less than 51 feet West of the North and South 1/4 line of Section 1; thence Southwesterly to the centerline of Consumers existing electric line at a point not more than 380 feet nor less than 330 feet South of the North line of Section 1 at a point not more than 410 feet nor less than 360 feet West of the North and South 1/4 line of Section 1.

Also conveying the right, from time to time and at no additional cost to Grantee, to cut, trim, remove, destroy or otherwise control any trees and brush which may, in the opinion of the Grantee, interfere or threaten to interfere with or be hazardous to said facilities. Grantor agrees that no buildings or other structures will be placed under or over said facilities or within such proximity thereto as to interfere with or, in the opinion of Grantee, threaten to interfere with the construction, operation or maintenance of said facilities. Guy wires and anchors may be placed at such locations on and under the land described above as may be required. Additional wires, cables and conductors may be installed on said line of poles at any time hereafter. Nonuse or a limited use of this easement by Grantee shall not prevent Grantee from later making use of the easement to the full extent herein authorized.

This easement is exempt from real estate transfer tax pursuant to MCLA 207.505(f) and from State real estate transfer tax pursuant to the provisions of MCLA 207.526(f).

WHEREAS, the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center has been in operation since 1980 and incorporated since 1982 as a public not for profit IRS 501(c)(3) entity, serving a regional area defined as the Swartz Creek School District boundaries consisting of significant portions of four Townships; Gaines, Clayton, Mundy and Flint, and the Village's of Gaines, Lennon and City's of Swartz Creek and a small portion of Flint; and

WHEREAS, operational and activities funding through the 1980's and 1990's was primarily based on private donation revenues with City funded housing and associated expenses; and

WHEREAS, a signatory effort containing 697 validated voter signatures, asking for a ballot request of 0.5 mills for services, programs and operational costs, for a period of ten years, for the voters of the City of Swartz Creek, was presented to the City Council on August 14, 2000. The City Council voted to place the request before the voters at the General Election of November 7, 2000, the electorate of the City approving the request with the first collection in July, 2001; and

WHEREAS, in 2001, the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens determined the need and desire to expand or reconstruct their facilities due to continued and anticipated membership growth, and further, have drawn conceptual plans for additions to the existing building as well as reconstruction of a new building; and

WHEREAS, the City Levy of 0.5 mill was replaced with a county-wide 10 year levy of 0.7 mill on August 8, 2006, to provide programs, activities and services for seniors, to-which the operational activities for the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center is funded; and

WHEREAS, prior to the approval of the County millage, the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center, through the City's Levy and private donations, set aside approximately \$300,000 to fund either a capital improvement project for the existing building or the construction of a new facility; and

WHEREAS, the cost of a new building was determined to be prohibitive and although an addition may present some logistical problems, it is the only cost feasible solution; and

WHEREAS, the Senior Center has retained the services of an architect and drafted two conceptual floor plans and preliminary cost estimates for an addition, copies of which are attached; and

WHEREAS, Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Commission, the medium through which the County Senior Levy funds are distributed, have indicated that the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center is eligible for a \$200,000 grant for capital improvements in the form of an addition to the existing Center, such grant would bring a total of \$500,000 the Senior Center has to spend towards an expansion to the Center; and

WHEREAS, the Swartz Creek Senior Citizens Center has requested permission to construct an addition and assistance from the City in funding the balance of construction, estimated to be between \$300,000 and \$500,000; and

WHEREAS, the City is unable to make a contribution for such an amount from its General Fund, however, under certain conditions, a loan is possible from an enterprise fund such as water or sewer.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council endorse the selection of Option Number A, as an addition to the Swartz Creek Senior Center Building, and further, directs the Administrative Staff to work with the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center Board, as follows:

1. In conjunction with the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center, initiate formal application to Genesee County for a grant in the maximum amount allowable.

2. Prepare a draft lease between the City and the Swartz Creek Senior Citizens Center.

- 3. Prepare a draft loan agreement between the General Fund and an appropriate enterprise fund.
- 4. Prepare a construction budget.
- 5. Prepare a revised draft of the Senior Citizens Center Budget.
- 6. Initiate site plan review process.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon completion of each of the directives and any other data that may be needed, that they be brought back before the City Council for review, and further, upon collection of all data, information and commitments, a final decision by the City shall be rendered.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council hereby finds and determines that the making of the proposed building improvements for the use of the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens, Inc. constitutes actions directed toward the improvement of the social, legal, health, housing, educational, emotional, nutritional, recreational, or mobility status of older persons within the purview of 1976 PA 39 [MCL 400.571 et seq].

WHEREAS, the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center has determined that the costs for the planned addition exceed the financial capabilities of the organization and without significant financial assistance from the City, they may be limited in their mission of providing programs and activities for Senior's; and

WHEREAS, the City, although desirous to assist, is facing significant financial challenges in the upcoming years and cannot commit to additional General Fund expenses in any department, and further, will need to reduce its current contributions in all General Fund supported departments in order to continue to provide adequate levels of service to its residents; and

WHEREAS, the Sr. Center has downsized the proposed addition and has drafted a conceptual budget that is economical and affordable and permits them to construct an addition that will eliminate the need to borrow funds from the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council hereby finds and determines that the making of the proposed downsized building improvements for the use of the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens, Inc. constitutes actions directed toward the improvement of the social, legal, health, housing, educational, emotional, nutritional, recreational, or mobility status of older persons within the purview of 1976 PA 39 [MCL 400.571 et seq].

NOW, THEREFORE, I move that the City Council direct the City Manager, City Attorney and staff to prepare a lease agreement with the following general conditions:

- 1. The existing agreement(s) with the Center be dissolved.
- 2. As long as the County collects a levy within the City and distributes funds to the Sr. Center, the City will not levy for the authorized .5 mills for the duration of the collection period.
- 3. A new lease shall be drafted for the existing center.
- 4. Provisions within the new lease will allow for leaseholder improvements by the lessee (Sr. Center).

- 5. If the Sr. Center elects to construct an addition, the project will be theirs. The project will follow normal site plan approval process and in compliance with all applicable ordinances. All construction funding will be the responsibility of the Center.
- 6. The City will permit the expenditure of funds held by the Center for the construction of an addition to the existing building. If the Center fails to construct an addition, then the funds will be returned to the City and either refunded to the taxpayers or expended on programs or activities as provided for in the ballot language.
- 7. All expenses associated with the building and the Center will be the responsibility of the Center, including, but not limited to maintenance, utilities, janitorial, repairs, inspections, etc. The City will provide lawn care and snow removal, without charge. As long as the program is available, the City will designate the 15% allotment of C.D.B.G. Funds. Additionally, and as long as the City can afford it, an additional cash contribution of \$5,000 per year towards maintenance will be made. This contribution will terminate in the event the City is forced to reduce its workforce due to budget constraints.
- 8. In the event of the dissolution of the SCASC, the building and all funds and assets will be turned over to the City.

BE IT FURTHER DIRECTED that upon negotiation and tentative agreement with the Sr. Center, a final draft be brought back before the Council for review and determination.

POLLING PLACE AGREEMENT

CITY OF SWARTZ CREEK And UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

This agreement is made this 9th day of February, 2009 by and between the City of Swartz Creek, a Michigan Municipal Corporation, with principal offices at 8083 Civic Drive, Swartz Creek, Michigan 48473 ("City") and the United Methodist Church of Swartz Creek, an Ecclesiastical Corporation, with principal offices at 7400 Miller Road, PO Box 268, Swartz Creek, MI 48473 ("Church" or "Owner")

WHEREAS, the City is in need of a conveniently located facility with sufficient size to serve as a polling place for various elections conducted by the City; and

WHEREAS, the Owner has a building located at 7400 Miller Road, Swartz Creek, MI 48473 which building has sufficient space for the efficient conduct of elections;

NOW, THEREFORE, the City and the Owner, acting by and through their duly authorized representatives, hereby AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- The owner will make available to the City sufficient space in its building located at 7400 Miller Road, Swartz Creek, MI 48473 (the "Facility") for the City to establish a polling place and to conduct City and school elections therein.
- 2. The space provided within the Facility shall be sufficient to accommodate voters as well as house the election workers and election equipment necessary to conduct a City election and/or a school election. To that end, school elections held on dates other than those on which a City election is held may be held in the so called "Johnson Room" which is located in the northern most room in the newest building addition, with general elections being held in the gym which is significantly larger.
- 3. The elections for which the City will use the Facility are:

- a) The February regular election held on the fourth Tuesday in February;
- b) The May regular election held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in May;
- c) The August regular election held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August;
- d) The November regular election held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November; and
- e) Other dates for special elections held in accordance with the Michigan Election law.
- 4. For each said election, the Owner shall make the space in the Facility available to the City one-half (½) day before the scheduled election date and no later than 1:00 PM, and for no more than one-half (½) day after each scheduled election date, up to 11:00 AM. Said dates will be extended whenever reasonably possible if such extension is necessary due to a change in the standard election procedures. Additional fees for such an extension may be decided by the parties. The City will need to have access to the facility by 6:00 A.M. of an election day. It is anticipated that the City personnel will vacate the facility by 10:00 P.M. of an election day. Table and chair set-up arrangements will be provided for by the Church, upon advance submittal of a diagram.
- 5. The City shall pay the Owner the sum of Seven-Hundred & Fifty Dollars (\$750) for each time the City uses the Johnson Room for an election and One-Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) for each time the City uses the gym for an election.
- 6. The term of this agreement extends until December 31, 2013, however, either party may terminate this agreement for any reason upon giving the other party One Hundred Eighty (180) days written notice of such termination. In the event the Church elects to terminate this agreement, notice of such shall be sent to the City Clerk by certified-registered mail, return receipt requested.
- 7. The Owner shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that the Facility is maintained in such a condition that election workers and voters will be able to conduct their activities at the Facility in a safe manner. If additional snow removal services are needed, other than that which may be provided by the Church, the City of Swartz Creek reserves the right to remove snow from any parking lot or sidewalk that may be

needed to conduct election services. The removal of snow shall be without cost to the Church.

- 8. The City shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that its election workers do not create any nuisance at the Facility or create any condition which would present a danger to persons using the Facility.
- 9. Each party will indemnify and hold the other party harmless for any damages to persons or property occasioned by, and to the extent of, its negligence.
- 10. The Church shall maintain a general liability insurance policy covering injuries to persons and property for persons using its Facility in an amount acceptable from time to time to the City Manager, but in no event less than One-Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Two-Million Dollars Aggregate, and shall list the City as an additional insured on said policy.
- 11. The City shall maintain a general liability insurance policy covering injuries to persons property for persons using the Facility for activities in connection with a City election. Such insurance shall be in an amount no less than One-Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Two-Million Dollars Aggregate, and shall list the Owner as an additional insured on said insurance policy.
- 12. The Owner shall maintain a policy of fire and casualty insurance on the Facility and such insurance coverage shall cover any equipment and other property of the City while such equipment and property is at the Facility for the purposes of this agreement.
- 13. The City shall provide casualty and property damage insurance coverage for its equipment and other property placed on the premises of the facility for the purposes of this agreement.
- 14. Except as stated in Section 6, any notices required to be given by either party to this agreement to the other shall be sufficient if given in writing and deposited in a United States Postal Service mailbox with sufficient first class postage thereon and addressed to:





Since 1993, a consortium of organizations have worked together to provide the collection of household hazardous waste. Collections are held twice per year in Genesee County. Since the start of this program, over 1.5 million pounds of hazardous wastes have been collected and properly disposed of from county residents.

The spring and fall events in 2008 collected over 80,000 pounds of hazardous waste at a cost of \$31,763. The next collection is scheduled for **May 9, 2009** at Lake Fenton High School.

In the past, the donations to help finance these collections have been donated to the Genesee County Recycling Coalition. Last year, the Genesee County Recycling Coalition was dissolved and their assets and programs were absorbed by the Keep Genesee County Beautiful Program with the United Way of Genesee County serving as their fiduciary (at no cost).





WHEREAS, the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center has been in operation since 1980 and incorporated since 1982 as a public not for profit IRS 501(c)(3) entity, serving a regional area defined as the Swartz Creek School District boundaries consisting of significant portions of four Townships; Gaines, Clayton, Mundy and Flint, and the Village's of Gaines, Lennon and City's of Swartz Creek and a small portion of Flint; and

WHEREAS, operational and activities funding through the 1980's and 1990's was primarily based on private donation revenues with City funded housing and associated expenses; and

WHEREAS, a signatory effort containing 697 validated voter signatures, asking for a ballot request of 0.5 mills for services, programs and operational costs, for a period of ten years, for the voters of the City of Swartz Creek, was presented to the City Council on August 14, 2000. The City Council voted to place the request before the voters at the General Election of November 7, 2000, the electorate of the City approving the request with the first collection in July, 2001; and

WHEREAS, in 2001, the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens determined the need and desire to expand or reconstruct their facilities due to continued and anticipated membership growth, and further, have drawn conceptual plans for additions to the existing building as well as reconstruction of a new building; and

WHEREAS, the City Levy of 0.5 mill was replaced with a county-wide 10 year levy of 0.7 mill on August 8, 2006, to provide programs, activities and services for seniors, to-which the operational activities for the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center is funded; and

WHEREAS, prior to the approval of the County millage, the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center, through the City's Levy and private donations, set aside approximately \$300,000 to fund either a capital improvement project for the existing building or the construction of a new facility; and

WHEREAS, the cost of a new building was determined to be prohibitive and although an addition may present some logistical problems, it is the only cost feasible solution; and

WHEREAS, the Senior Center has retained the services of an architect and drafted two conceptual floor plans and preliminary cost estimates for an addition, copies of which are attached; and

WHEREAS, Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Commission, the medium through which the County Senior Levy funds are distributed, have indicated that the

Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center is eligible for a \$200,000 grant for capital improvements in the form of an addition to the existing Center, such grant would bring a total of \$500,000 the Senior Center has to spend towards an expansion to the Center; and

WHEREAS, the Swartz Creek Senior Citizens Center has requested permission to construct an addition and assistance from the City in funding the balance of construction, estimated to be between \$300,000 and \$500,000; and

WHEREAS, the City is unable to make a contribution for such an amount from its General Fund, however, under certain conditions, a loan is possible from an enterprise fund such as water or sewer.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council endorse the selection of Option Number A, as an addition to the Swartz Creek Senior Center Building, and further, directs the Administrative Staff to work with the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center Board, as follows:

- In conjunction with the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center, initiate formal application to Genesee County for a grant in the maximum amount allowable.
- Prepare a draft lease between the City and the Swartz Creek Senior Citizens Center.
- Prepare a draft loan agreement between the General Fund and an appropriate enterprise fund.
- Prepare a construction budget.
- Prepare a revised draft of the Senior Citizens Center Budget.
- Initiate site plan review process.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon completion of each of the directives and any other data that may be needed, that they be brought back before the City Council for review, and further, upon collection of all data, information and commitments, a final decision by the City shall be rendered.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council hereby finds and determines that the making of the proposed building improvements for the use of the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens, Inc. constitutes actions directed toward the improvement of the social, legal, health, housing, educational, emotional, nutritional, recreational, or mobility status of older persons within the purview of 1976 PA 39 [MCL 400.571 *et seq*].

Dear Accounts Payable,

Attached is an invoice, net due 30 days, for cost over-runs related to the captioned project. As a brief re-cap, we designed the Bristol Road project using federal and state gas & weight tax grant funds with matching municipal funding. The project included mill, re-surfacing, shoulder re-construction and improvements to ditching to allow for road surface drainage. Verizon had existing utility poles within the ditch that needed relocating, both for construction and safety, due to close proximity to the roadway. Throughout the MDOT approval, grade inspection, bid and award phase of the project, Verizon was notified, sent plans and requested to attend a number of meetings. Verizon chose not to attend and when contacted, had no input or declined comment stating they would get back with us. The project was awarded to DiPonio Construction of Shelby Michigan by MDOT and a contract signed. At a pre-construction meeting shortly before commencement of construction. Verizon stated they would not re-locate utility structures and in fact, would invoice the City for any damage (Verizon letter dated 3/8/2006, Adam White). Verizon later changed position and stipulated that they would only "support" the structures. This decision was not acceptable to the contractor, DiPonio Construction, as they felt it presented logistical problems as well as safety concerns. A design change was initiated by DiPonio, approved by the City's Engineer that re-located the storm sewer to the north of the Verizon structures. This caused new conflicts with a buried optic fiber cable and additional expenses in time & materials. The end result is that the contractor filed a grievance with MDOT alleging significant change in the contract, asking for additional compensation. In July 2008, MDOT awarded an additional fee of \$45,000, which we subrogate to you.

The City's engineer made many attempts to get Verizon to participate in the project during the planning phase. Some of these expenses might have been unnecessary had Verizon worked with us initially. Additionally, the City feels that the original installation of the utility poles was substandard and poor. They were, and remain, much to close to the roadway and have little support at the base. As predicted by our engineer's, the pole base erodes during rainfall casing the structure to continue to lean (photo included).

A more viable solution would have been to re-locate the lines onto the Consumer's structures located a short distance away and out of the ditch. The City feels that tax-payer road repair funds should not go towards utility improvements or the re-location of structures that are located within the street right of way.

Your claim involves one issue: Increased costs due to changed physical conditions.

CHANGED PHYSICAL CONDITIONS - FORCE ACCOUNT

Underground utilities not shown in the contract documents were encountered between Sta. 5+37 to 40+00. The Contactor contends that the discovery of the underground utilities caused additional work associated with the installation of the storm sewer and meets the criteria of a significant change per Section 103.02.B1 of the 2003 Standard Specifications. The Contractor is requesting payment of \$52,011.15 which is the difference between the amount paid using line items (\$128,920.15), and the contractor cost per force account records (\$180,931.30).

ENGINEER'S POSITION (ROWE)

Section 104.07 of the 2003 Standard Specification states,

"No additional compensation will be paid to the Contractor for reasonable delay or inconvenience due to the following: C. The encountering of existing utilities shown on the plans."

Note #8 on Plan Sheet #8 states, "The Contractor shall expose and verify the location of existing underground utilities prior to construction." The contract proposal on page 90 states,

"The Contractor shall expose all existing utilities in critical areas. The Contractor is urged to explore any and all potential conflicts prior to construction."

The proposal on page 90 states,

"Public utilities will not be required to relocate poles or structures in order to facilitate the operation of construction equipment unless such poles or structures constitute a hazard to the public or are extraordinarily dangerous to the contracting operation."

Working around underground utilities is a normal construction activity and is not a basis for additional compensation.

DAVISON TSC DECISION

The contract plans do not indicate utilities in the area of the proposed storm sewer. Page 85 of the contract proposal states,

"The owner of existing service facilities that are within grading or structure limits will move them to locations designated by the Engineer or will remove them entirely from the avenue right of way."

The Contractor should not have encountered utility conflicts according to the plans, and if utility conflicts were encountered, they should have been moved according to the proposal.

The Contractor is entitled to an adjustment in unit price for the installation of the storm sewer. Per Section 103.03 of the 2003 Standard Specifications,

"An adjustment will be made when there is a change to the contract made by the Engineer as a result of the Contractor encountering a differing site condition as set forth in Subsection 103.02C or a significant change in the character of the work as set forth in subsection 103.02.B."

The Engineer is directed to reconcile time and material records with the IDR's to determine the time and materials and equipment used only in the installation of the storm sewer, not manhole construction, etc. The Engineer will use this information to calculate costs according to Sections 103.03, A, B, C and D of the 2003 Standard Specifications to compensate the Contractor within thirty (30) days of receipt of this decision.

This represents the Davison TSC's final review of this claim. You have sixty (60) days to file a request for a Region Review if you decide to pursue this claim.



Re: Utility Pole Relocation, Bristol Road Traffic Safety Improvement Project

Mr. WHITE,

In January 2003, the City applied to the Michigan Department of Transportation (STP. STU. FHWA), via the Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Commissions' Traffic Improvement Program, for funding to crush, mill and shape a one mile section of West Bristol Road between Miller and Elms. Based on the PCI (deterioration) rating, funding was approved. Design engineering was completed in late 2004 and submitted to M.D.O.T. for approval. The original plans submitted to M.D.O.T. called for the road and shoulder width to remain unchanged. M.D.O.T. engineers rejected the plan stipulating that the shoulder width must meet AASHTO Standards. The City filed for exception and was rejected. New plans, calling for 6 Ft. shoulders in compliance with AASHTO Standards, were submitted. This plan was approved.

The City began meeting with Verizon Representatives in mid 2004 asking for utility pole relocation. A number of meetings were scheduled wherein Verizon representatives did not show, or stated they were not authorized to make such decisions. In meetings that Verizon representatives were present and rendered a solution, the City was led to believe that pole relocation would be accommodated where needed. In early March of 2006, a Verizon correspondence defines the project as "sewer", declines the relocation of the lines and further, threatens cost recovery if Verizon equipment is damaged.

This project is scheduled to be let for bid by M.D.O.T. in May, with construction slated for this summer. All funding has been allocated. Quite frankly, it is disturbing that Verizon would arbitrate such a decision in the 11th hour leaving no time to seek a solution or an appeal.

The City's position is that this is a traffic improvement project on a Class A Road, the poles are located within the City's Right of Way, and they need to be relocated at the expense of Verizon. Further, the City, its contractors and sub-contractor's WILL NOT stipulate or accept ANY liability for damages and in fact, any additional cost for performing work around the poles will be invoiced to Verizon and recovery pursued.

I ask your office to evaluate this matter forthwith and provide me with a written commitment. In advance, I look to your reply

On June 28, 2006, and following site meeting with your representatives, a letter was sent to you regarding the utility conflicts on the Bristol Road Improvements Project. In that letter there were two options presented to your company. It was stated in the letter that Verizon Telephone Company must choose one of the options presented.

Due to time constraints on the project one week was given to select one of the two options. This one week time period has passed and there has been no response received from your company. Therefore, the storm sewer will be realigned in the conflicting areas and Verizon Telephone Company will be billed for any extra work beyond the original contract. This work will include all extra engineering cost and all extra construction time and materials. This project has been in the planning, design, bid letting, award, and preconstruction phase for three years. Verizon has been informed and invited at all phases. For reasons that are unclear, Verizon has chosen not to participate. We are out of options.

Additionally, and as you are aware, the Miller – Elms Safety Project has been let for bid and a contract awarded by MDOT. We see this project headed in the same direction, being the total lack of cooperation from your company. This project cannot be "adjusted". Utility poles must be relocated to make room for traffic signals. In the event you are unaware, this project was awarded by MDOT for safety purposes. The signal upgrades are to install dedicated left turn lanes. The intersection met the criteria for such improvements and delays due to an unwillingness to relocate utilities will serve to compromise traffic and pedestrian safety.

Again, and as always, we are certainly willing to discuss this, and in fact, have worked to greatly reduce Verizon's exposure to utility relocation. It appears that Verizon has assumed the position that they will not relocate utility's within the ROW for any reason. If this is true, please confirm this in writing as soon as possible.

It has been brought to my attention that there are some remaining issues pertaining to the Bristol Road improvement project within the City of Swartz Creek, more specifically, a problem regarding the ability of Verizon personnel to safely support telephone poles in and along the storm sewer construction area.

After consultation by Verizon Engineering and Construction departments, it was determined that by using a line truck. Verizon could safely support the poles in question on a temporary basis to allow the city contractor to continue work in the vicinity of these poles without requiring a costly physical relocation. At a June 8th, 2006 pre-construction meeting, these intentions were addressed to: Lou Fluery of Rowe Engineering, Tom Syrcek of the City of Swartz Creek, and Frank Diponio of Diponio Construction, by Homer Gumbs of Verizon's construction department and Adam White of Verizon's engineering department. It was also mentioned that two poles would be in conflict with the proposed curb edge and these would be moved upon staking of the new curb line.

Following a meeting on June 27th, a letter was sent to Ron Toll of Diponio Construction on June 29th addressing some safety concerns of the proposed pole supporting method. This letter was reviewed by both engineering and construction staff members within Verizon and the letter attempted to clear up any safety concerns expressed by the city contractor. Since then, Verizon has received two conflicting letters from both the city and Mr. Michael Royalty of Rowe, Inc, dated July 10th and July 28th, respectively. These letters state that Verizon can either move all poles or pay penalty of \$15,000 to redesign the sewer project. In an attempt to discuss these further concerns, a subsequent voicemail to your office went unreturned on July 18th. Furthermore, we do not consider either of these purported options to be viable.

Verizon would be happy to work with the City of Swartz Creek and its contractors to do whatever is reasonably necessary so the storm sewer improvements can be completed. However, no credible reason has been brought to Verizon's attention why the poles could not be supported by a line truck on a temporary basis other than the already addressed issue of Verizon personnel being able to safely perform this task.

Please feel free to contact me at 517.265.0611 to discuss this further. I would like to work with the city to resolve this ongoing miscommunication so we can both move forward with the project.



Please be advised we are the claims administrators for the Michigan Municipal League Liability and Property Pool, of which the City of Swartz Creek is a member. We are in receipt of your claim for damages incurred at your residence as a result of a sewer backup occurring on or about 6/12/08. In determining the liability on behalf of any municipality we look to the proper statues and/or case law to determine if that municipality is liable or "legally obligated" to the claim presented.

In the past, damages of this sort have found their legal basis in the pleading of "trespass nuisance." The Supreme Court has ruled on <u>Pohutski v City of Allen Park</u>, which concluded that trespass nuisance is not an exception to governmental immunity.

Legislation has also introduced <u>Public Act 222 (2001)</u> which finds governmental agencies are now responsible for direct and indirect storm or sewer back ups that are the result of a construction, design, maintenance, operation or repair defect that is more than 50% the cause of the plaintiffs damages. In order to qualify for such a claim; a property owner must meet all of the following criteria:

- "a claimant may seek compensation for property damage or physical injury from a governmental agency if all of the following elements existed at the time of the event:
 - a. The governmental agency was the appropriate governmental agency.
 - b. The sewage disposal system had a defect.
 - c. The governmental agency knew, or in the exercise of reasonable diligence should have known, about the defect.
 - d. The governmental agency, having the legal authority to do so, failed to take reasonable steps in a reasonable amount of time to repair, correct, or remedy the defect.
 - e. The defect was a substantial proximate cause of the event and the property damage or physical injury. '

In addition to the Act stating that all five elements must exist at the time of the event, the Michigan Court of Appeals recently held, in the case entitled <u>Willett v Waterford Township</u> that all five elements must exist at the time of the event in order for a claim to be successfully presented against a municipality. Our investigation reveals that the cause of the sewer backup was a blockage in the main line. There was no defect in the main. As the City took reasonable steps in a reasonable amount of time to determine that the main was blocked and dislodged the blockage, we find the City is not legally obligated to your claim. Based on the above but not limited thereto, we must respectfully deny your claim.

Dear Mr. Svrcek,

The company hired by the city to re-structure manholes recently did the one in front of my house. I've lived at this address for twenty-four years, am familiar with how my ditch functions, and realize there will be problems in the near future.

I completely understand the reasons for the city changing these manhole covers. For some homeowners here in Winchester Woods, however, the holes in the old manhole covers were the only way for water to be eliminated from our areas. In this case, repairing the leaky manhole covers causes other problems.

According to surveyors who were out here several years ago, the neighbor to my right (as you're on the street looking at the homes), is located on the highest ground here and has no culvert, with water on each side of his home being directed into the ditch that begins on each side of his driveway. The ditch is supposed to begin a slow downward slant from his driveway, so that water can flow to the culvert at the end of the street. In my case, the water is to flow toward Oakview Drive. The water does not flow down the ditch in front of my house, but stays there - or it will stay there once the snow melts and the rains begin.

I expect to have water in my ditch - either frozen or otherwise - during the entire year from now on (except, perhaps, during the hottest, dry summer months). This will be a dangerous situation for any small children who may be playing near there, which, if the worst happened, God forbid, could result in action by parents against the city of Swartz Creek.

A personal problem I see coming in the near future is the end of my sump drain freezing, thereby causing a flooding problem in my basement. It isn't happening right now, but that's only because there is snow not ice - in the ditch. I am in the process of rigging up an emergency way out for that water when it begins backing up into my basement.

I talked with the man who seemed to be in charge when they re-did the manholes. He said it looked to him like the ditch on the other side of my street is lower than is mine and suggested that I contact you about putting a small culvert under the street from the low spot in front of my house to the other side. I request that the city either do that or re-grade the ditch so as to achieve a proper downward slope from here to Oakview Drive.

Frost Law Weight Restrictions

DATE: February 12, 2009

SUBJECT: Seasonal Weight Restrictions

Effective **6 AM Friday**, **February 13**, **2009**, the Genesee County Road Commission will place seasonal weight and speed restrictions on all county roads within Genesee County. These restrictions will remain in effect indefinitely.

When spring weight restrictions are in effect on frost-restricted routes, axle loadings are reduced by 25 percent on rigid-based roads and 35 percent on flexible-based roads. Most restricted county roads reduce axle loading by 35 percent. Speed limits on frost restricted routes are reduced to 35 mph for every vehicle over 10,000 lbs. gross weight.

No truck, tractor or tractor with trailer, or any combination of such vehicles with a gross weight, loaded or unloaded, in excess of 5,000 pounds shall exceed a speed of 50 miles per hour on highways or streets or 55 miles per hour on freeways. Speed shall be reduced to 35 miles per hour where reduced loadings are being enforced during the period of seasonal weight restrictions.





For locals, this affects Brownfields, OPRA abatements, renaissance zones, MEGAs, PA 198 Industrial Facilities Tax abatements, Industrial Development Revenue Bonds, and dollars that the state gives out. Rep. Fred Miller (D-Mt Clemens) testified on the importance of getting dollars back into the hands of Michigan employees and employers. Some opponents had issues with these bills and claimed that they will increase costs. The House last year amended these bills to satisfy concerns from the League, and we do not have an official position at this time. We will continue to track this legislation. Revenue Sharing Left Untouched in Gov.'s

Budget – Last week, the Governor released her executive budget proposing local units of government receive the same amount of funding as last year (retaining the increase from last year). Although this is a far cry from the monies we are suppose to be receiving, the fact that we are not being cut this year is notable. As the state budget experiences a \$1.4 billion shortfall, many institutions, including higher education, found themselves on the chopping block. Federal Update

Stimulus Bill Passes – HR 1, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, was passed by the U.S. Congress late last week and is expected to be signed into law by the President today. The bill contains \$789 billion in funding for infrastructure, housing, public safety, health and renewable energy programs as well as tax cuts. Michigan's share appears to be about \$7 billion over the next two years, although given the bill's 1000+ page length, final figures and how funds are to distributed and regulated are still being reviewed. At this point though it looks like the state will see \$847 million for highways and bridges of which \$593 million will go to MDOT and \$254 million to everyone else. There is also money for transit capital grants in the amount of \$145 million. We will receive \$239 million for sewer and water projects; \$68 million for drinking water and \$171 million for clean water. States will have 120 days after apportionment (apportionment must be made within 21 days of the law's enactment) to obligate the first 50 percent of their highway apportionments and until one year after apportionment to obligate the remainder. Hopefully the state Legislature will now be helpful, where it can, to make sure these monies get out as fast as possible. Contact: Arnold Weinfeld
