OLD / ROUTINE BUSINESS – REVISITED ISSUES / PROJECTS

✓ 2009-2010 FISCAL BUDGET (Status)

It's that time of year again. This gets harder and harder every year... somewhere there must be an end in sight. Today though, I don't see it. Instead of making a dollar stretch to a dollar-ten, this year we will have to make a dollar stretch to a dollar-thirty. At any rate, here is a tentative schedule:

- PERSONNEL POLICIES & PROCEDURES (Status) Pending.
- DISASTER, EMERGENCY RESPONSE POLICY COMMITTEE (Status)
 We should be back before the Council for discussion on this in the near future.
- ✓ VETERANS MEMORIAL (Status) Nothing New.
- ✓ NON-RESIDENT SERVICES STUDY, RAUBINGER BRIDGE (Status) The Raubinger Bridge Project has a tentative start date of July 2009.

✓ OVERHEAD UTILITY REORGANIZATION PROJECT (Status)

As we discussed, the utility companies have lobbied the passing of a number of pieces of legislation that have stripped us of virtually all control of our rights of way. In regards to the aesthetics, we have little power other than to pay for changes. The next step is to get a contractor's quote for the second round of the technical review of the poles. From here, we may have some power by filing complaints on the safety issues. REI is getting a quote together from their survey division and should be back with it shortly. My thinking is to narrow down the inventory to the downtown, Miller & Elms and Bristol

Road. This will hold the cost down and we can always go back and pick up additional sections of the City.

✓ MAJOR STREET FUND, TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENTS (See Individual Category)

2010-2013 T.I.P. APPLICATION (Status) Pending.

BRISTOL ROAD T.I.P. PROJECT, VERIZON INVOICE (Status)

We have someone's attention here. I have an F.O.I.A. request from Verizon's legal department for records. I have requested a 10-day extension and am working with Mr. Figura on a response. I will keep the Council informed.

ELMS ROAD RE-SURFACING PROJECT (Status)

Completed, with the exception of some minor cleanup work in the spring.

□ TRAIL SYSTEM, PHASE I ELMS ROAD – PARK ENHANCEMENTS (*Resolution*)

As you recall, we appropriated the lighting costs at the meeting of February 9th. We went out to bid for the rest of the enhancement improvements. The bid package was prepared and the bid process conducted by REI, in compliancy with Federal CDBG Distribution Guidelines. Six bids were submitted, ranging from a low of \$14,450 to the high of \$27,837. Included with tonight's agenda is a resolution to accept the low bid of \$14,450 from Lang Construction of 8065 Sunset, Flint. Following is a table of the costs as of date:

As you can see, we are about \$6,500 short to finish this project. The resolution incorporates a transfer from General Fund for the balance.

MORRISH ROAD RE-CONSTRUCTION PROJECT / MEIJER'S (Status)

Plans are in place to perform the Morrish Road work in accordance with the Development Agreement with Meijer and the current engineers' plans. There is a complication concerning the design of the Morrish and Bristol Road intersection due to the standards of the Genesee County Road Commission. To construct the intersection to their specifications, increased road widths and right-of-way acquisition is required. These needs increase the cost substantially. As such, the project will end at the northern City limits for the time being and the intersection, termed 'phase two' will be completed at a later date. It is hoped that GCRC will negotiate more reasonable standards in the mean time.

□ MORRISH ROAD SOUTH RE-SURFACING PROJECT (Resolution)

We have some good news here. The "American Recovery and Re-Investment Act" (economic stimulus package) poured an additional \$9.3 million into the Genesee County TIP Program. We were fortunate enough to have a ready to go project, being the mill & re-surfacing of Morrish between I-69 and the Rail Road Tracks. \$300k has been allocated for this project. The \$9.3 million is round #1 of the funding. Included with tonight's packet is a project priority list established by the T.A.C. Committee and approved by the Metropolitan Alliance. If the projects that are identified in the first round of funding do not meet the deadline or criteria, then the list will be followed in the priority rankings. Additionally, further transportation dollars coming into the County T.I.P. will follow this list. Miller Road is in round #2. As it looks now, Morrish Road South Project Design Engineering will be a non-participating cost and

Construction Engineering will be a participating cost. Construction is 100% funded. Included with tonight's agenda is a resolution to construct along with an appropriation for design and construction engineering.

✓ LOCAL STREET FUND, TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENTS

2008 REPAIR ROSTER (Status)

As an FYI, none of the funding that was released via the "American Recovery and Re-Investment Act" (stimulus package) can be used for local streets. All funding followed the existing channels to which federal funds are distributed and/or allocated. Bid results for Chesterfield from Seymour to Winston, Jennie Lane, Worchester from Winston to Daval and Daval from Oakview to Winshall are \$398,154. We have placed all local streets re-surfacing on hold for a bit while we explore funding options.

TRANSPORTATION ASSET MANAGEMENT EVALUATION (Status) Pending report.

✓ SEWER REHABILITATION PROJECT, I&I, PENALTIES (Status)

Phase II was approved on October 13th and is underway. I will keep the Council posted on progress. The manhole rehabilitation program is under contract and work has begun.

✓ **FIRE DEPARTMENT EVALUATION, CONTRACT RENEWAL, BUDGET** (*Status*) I have had a couple of meetings with Mr. Beatty. We are working on a draft.

✓ WWS INTERGOVERNMENTAL JURISDICTION SEWER ORDINANCE (Status)

Included with tonight's packet is a draft of the City's proposed Sanitary Sewer IPP Ordinance. It is substantially identical to the County's, the difference being that instead of permanently transferring all control, inspection, enforcement, fines, rates, permitting, etc., to them, we will appoint them as our agent for these services. As you may recall, the County sent us the ordinance along with a non-expiring permanent intergovernmental agreement. The County's position is we have no choice but to turn control over to them. I disagree. In conversation with Mr. Figura and Mr. Delzer, coupled with discussions with MI-DEQ as to compliancy with state and federal regulations, we simply need to comply. The means as to how, is our decision. This solution accomplishes compliancy and leaves this Council, and future Council's with options. I provide this tonight to give the Council some time to review it. I have action only to set a public hearing in the near future. We can administratively set a Public Hearing in a meeting or two and look to take action then.

✓ SR. CENTER, LEVY, BUILDING & FUTURE FUNDING PLAN (Status)

Mr. Stephens has a concept drawing into the Zoning Administrator's office for review. We are awaiting a draft lease from Mr. Figura.

✓ SPRINGBROOK, HERITAGE STREET-LIGHTING (Status)

Frankly speaking, we simply do not have any additional funds to consider any new adventures. I will be looking for "nickels & dimes" in funding that we have in our system that can be transferred, i.e., amphi-theater lawn-care, youth football lawn-care, etc. This probably fits that category.

✓ LABOR CONTRACTS & RETIREE HEALTHCARE (Status)

Mr. Kehoe still needs a basic employment agreement and the Supervisor's contract has a wage re-opener. I will be back, probably at the next meeting with these.

On my contract, it probably needs visiting for update purposes. I would like to take a pass on any rate increases for another year or two and until we are on better financial ground. I am not sure how the Council desires to handle an evaluation. As you recall, a couple of years ago I created a list of accomplishments and shortfalls as I saw them. I could bring the list up to date and then bring it back to the Council for discussion and review. Unless the Council has strong input one way or the other, I will do this and set it for a discussion item, hopefully soon. We can then go from here.

The POLC, AFSCME and the Supervisor Contracts will expire on June 30th. In review, I anticipate a 1% - 3% decrease in the levy collection this year. On our other revenues, I can only predict that they will also decline, maybe significantly. The first line of defense here in preserving the level of services that we can provide will most likely be a freeze on all contract wage increases for all employees, on a year-to-year basis.

- ✓ MARATHON STATION BLIGHT & NON-CONFORMING USE (Status) Patiently waiting for an open door.
- COUNTY E.M.S. ORDINANCE, AMBULANCE SERVICE (Status) Pending.
- ✓ FEES, RATES & SERVICE CHARGES (Status)

As you are aware, we have two water rate increases and a sewer rate increase now in effect. We can float for a bit using Fund Balance, but we will have to do something by this summer. As we have discussed in the past, we need to go to a ready to serve charge with a commodity purchase charge. Sewer will be as the County desires, either a unit charge or water use calculated capacity charge. As we have discussed at past meetings, we have some models that can be very easily implemented. The only loose end is how we manage irrigation systems if the County desires a capacity use sewer charge. We are working to resolve this now. I have a tentative August date in mind for the billing system switch and implementation of the new rates.

- ✓ SALE OF CITY PROPERTY 5129 MORRISH ROAD (Status) Pending.
- ✓ WWS, STORM WATER MANAGEMENT AGREEMENT (Status) We are still looking at this.

✓ 2009 MASTER PLAN & ZONING CODE REVIEW (Status)

The City's Master Plan was last updated in 2004. Since these plans need to be revisited every five years or so, the City shall update the Master Plan sometime during the next calendar year. This can be quite a cumbersome process due to the requirements of State law; however, the impact of these plans is tremendous on all aspects of local governance. Since the last plan was adopted, there has not been significant change to the circumstances or assumptions that were used in the framing of that plan. As such, I expect a general review and acceptance will be in order, resulting in little substantial change to the 2004 Master Plan. We shall see. Expect this to show up in the form of a workshop in late spring or early summer. Additionally, the Planning Commission is having a public workshop to discuss updates to the Zoning Appendix A and zoning map. Expect some minor changes to the general provisions and the sign ordinance and some additional changes to the zoning map. There will eventually be an official public hearing and subsequent review by the City Council. Throughout this process, there may be

some provisions of the Zoning Appendix A (concerning animals and parking) that shall be located with in the standard book of ordinances.

 SWARTZ AMBULANCE AGREEMENT (Status) Pending.

✓ NEIGHBORHOOD STABILIZATION PROGRAM (Status)

As we discussed at the last meeting, I am highly skeptical of the County Planning Commission's desire to get into the real estate business. I am even further troubled that they have partnered with the Land Bank and MSHDA as a solution to the foreclosure problem. This program might be good for extreme urban blighted neighborhoods, but I see no value in its use in the neighborhoods we have in the City. In fact, I think it will further damage them. To use federal money to purchase these houses, take them off the tax roll, transfer them to the Land Bank where all assessments will be discharged (water, sewer, weeds, sidewalks, etc.), and then look to rent them, most likely to low income tenants whom will marginally care for them, or to have them sit vacant where the General Fund will pay for upkeep, compounds our problems. Additionally, I think they would remain with the Land Bank for many-many years. A better idea would have been a grant process where-in we negotiated a settlement with the financial lender below the current market rate, repair and re-sell them. Interestingly, here is the introduction of this program on the US-HUD site:

"HUD's new Neighborhood Stabilization Program will provide emergency assistance to state and local governments to acquire and redevelop foreclosed properties that might otherwise become sources of abandonment and blight within their communities. The Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) provides grants to every state and certain local communities to purchase foreclosed or abandoned homes and to rehabilitate, resell, or redevelop these homes in order to stabilize neighborhoods and stem the decline of house values of neighboring homes."

It is also interesting that the local communities who have partnered with the County for distribution of CDBG Funds had no input into this program. The County developed it, placed it with their planning commission, and wants our unbridled participation. Here is a county owned home in Winchester Village. It has been abandoned for two years now (well before this recent housing crisis). In the summer, our General Fund keeps the weeds cut and the rocks and garbage picked up:



Given the number of homes currently owned by the County, my guess is any further houses they own in the City will look the same as this one and off the tax roll with maintenance supported by the General Fund. We have put two properties into the program that we believe have no other alternative other than demolition. We are watching the Marathon as a possibility for demolition under this program, if it forecloses. I recommend we participate no further than this with this program.

NEW BUSINESS / PROJECTED ISSUES & PROJECTS

GUEST APPEARANCE, DRAIN COMMISSIONER WRIGHT (Presentation)
 Mr. Jeff Wright, Genesee Count Drain Commissioner, has asked to speak for a few minutes on the feasibility of the Port Huron Water Pipeline.

✓ COUNTY BAR ASSOCIATION, LAW DAY PROCLAMATION (*Resolution*)

The Genesee County Bar Association's annual Law Day observation and events will be held in May. As is customary, they ask for a proclamation of observance from the City. I have one included with tonight's agenda.

✓ PARK FEE WAIVER REQUEST, FIRE DEPARTMENT (*Resolution*)

The Fire Department has requested that the fees for the use of Elms Road Park Pavilion #4 be waived for their annual picnic, to be held on Saturday June 27, 2009. A resolution of approval is included with tonight's agenda.

✓ MMERS RATE INCREASE (Information)

For Council information. If you get a minute, browse this letter from M.M.E.R.S.... ugly.

✓ AED, CPR & FIRST-AID TRAINING (*Information*)

Officer John Sheerin will conduct an AED (the heart shocker device we have in the lobby), CPR and kind of a crash First Aid Course for anyone who wishes to attend. Our office staff will attend. The training session will be held on Wednesday March 25^{th} from 2:00 PM – 4:00 PM at City Hall Council Chambers. If you have an interest in attending, please let me know.

✓ MDOT PARK & RIDE (Information)

A bit of good news here. MDOT has agreed to fund, up to \$4,000 per year, the maintenance of the Park & Ride (I guess my whining paid off) at Miller & I-69. Under their offer, we will pick-up and empty the garbage, cut the grass, pay the utilities, plow and salt the lot. Additionally, they will pay a one-time fee for the installation of lights and maybe some benches and a picnic table or two. I would like to make this kind of a "mini-park" that looks appealing and is well maintained. MDOT is preparing an agreement. I will be back as soon as I have a draft.

✓ **VATHAN BEAUCHAMP** (Information)

Nathan, our MSU Internship scholar turned part-time planner, will be leaving us effective immediately. He has been hired by the Department of Defense (Navy) as a civilian urban planner and will be moving to the Alexandria Virginia area. As you may have noticed, Nathan has been the author of a number of the in-depth studies you have seen as of recent. Additionally, he operated the Movies in the Park and the Farmers Market Programs last summer. He was an asset and will be missed. Keep an eye on the DC news, who knows... maybe in a few years we will see him hanging around as a White House staffer.

Council Questions, Inquiries, Requests and Comments

- C.S.O. Plaques, Lobby. I am looking at options.
- Mast Arm Traffic Lights, Street Sign Anchors (Silver vs. Black). I have passed this along to our engineer who is checking into the replacement.

- Council Name Tag Replacements. I am getting ready to order new name tags for Councilmember's Binder & Krueger. Anyone else who needs a replacement, please get with me and we will add them to the order.
- □ *Term "Stranded" and "Embedded" Cost Associated With Consumer's Rate Increases Before the MPSC.* Probably more of an accounting term. Here is the official definition:

EMBEDDED COSTS EXCEEDING MARKET PRICES (ECEMP) - Embedded costs of utility investments exceeding market prices are: i) costs incurred pursuant to a regulatory or contractual obligation; 2) costs that are reflected in cost-based rates; and 3) cost-based rates that exceed the price of alternatives in the marketplace. ECEMPS may become "stranded costs" where they exceed the amount that can be recovered through the asset's sale. Regulatory questions involve whether such costs should be recovered by utility shareholders and if so, how they should be recovered. "Transition costs" are stranded costs which are charged to utility customers through some type of fee or surcharge after the assets are sold or separated from the vertically-integrated utility. "Stranded assets" are assets which cannot be sold for some reason. Nuclear plants are an example of stranded assets which no one would buy. (Also referred to as Transition Costs.)

□ *Public Safety Building Lot, Lighting.* Should be repaired. We will check it at various points throughout the evening hours to be certain.

APPROPRIATION, DESIGN & CONSTRUCTION ENGINEERING, MORRISH ROAD SOUTH PROJECT, AMERICAN RECOVERY & RE-INVESTMENT ACT FUNDED

WHEREAS, the City of Swartz Creek is a Local Governmental Unit and recognized Street Authority eligible to receive funding from the Michigan Department of Transportation and the Federal Highway Administration; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Swartz Creek is a member of the Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Alliance, an urban transportation planning cooperative charged with allocating funds to eligible street authorities in Genesee County; and

WHEREAS, the City of Swartz Creek has identified a need to make repairs and improvements to Morrish Road from the I-69 viaduct to the North City Limit at Bristol Road and further, repairs have been allocated in the Genesee County Traffic Improvement Program and is scheduled for construction in the summer of 2009; and,

WHEREAS, in conjunction with this project, the City initiated preliminary design on December 15, 2008, in the amount of \$11,162 to the City's Engineer, Rowe Incorporated, to repair, mill, re-surface and configure to three lanes, Morrish Road from I-69 to the CNA Rail Crossing, approximately .9 miles; and

WHEREAS, an emergency funding package, titled the American Recovery & Re-Investment Act, designed to create jobs and stimulate the economy, was enacted, appropriated and distributed by the United States Congress and the office of the President, the package resulting in an additional allocation of \$9.3 million dollars in transportation money to Genesee County Street Authorities, funds limited to use on Federal Aid Eligible Highways and "shovel ready" projects that can be submitted to the Michigan Department of Transportation for Grade Inspection within 45 days; and

WHEREAS, the Morrish Road South Project was submitted to the Genesee County Traffic Improvement Program for criteria evaluation and found to meet the specifications and qualifications for funding and was subsequently approved for funding at \$300,000 maximum in the first round of projects; and

WHEREAS, the allocation specifics are 100% of construction and construction engineering funded, design engineering being the agency responsibility, cost estimates as follows:

Resolution No. 090309-8B APPROPRIATION & BID AWARD, C.D.B.G. PHASE I TRAIL SYSTEM, ELMS PARK – ROAD ENHANCEMENT

WHEREAS, on July 14, 2008, the City of Swartz Creek amended its three year Community Development Block Grant Distribution Plan, in the total amount of \$37,672, and authorized these funds to be allocated as follows: 15% to the Swartz Creek Senior Citizens Operations in the amount of \$5,650.08, and the remaining 85% to the Elms Road Enhancement Project Phase I in the amount of \$32,021.02; and

WHEREAS, the Elms Road Enhancement Project consists of lighting, landscaping, and other streetscape amenities; and

WHEREAS, all CDBG projects must be approved by the GCMPC to be bid in accordance with federal statute, the City's engineer having prepared design and construction plans approved by the GCMPC; and

WHEREAS, Consumers Energy is, by contract, the sole provider of public lighting services on city streets and is responsible for all installation of new lines and lights and therefore exempt from the bidding process. An amount of \$21,237.23 was appropriated at the February 9, 2009 Council Meeting for the Elms Road Enhancement Project lighting; and

WHEREAS, the remainder of the enhancement improvements were let to bid by the City's Engineer, Rowe Incorporated, bids opened and tabulated on Wednesday March 4, 2009, the low bidder being Lang Construction of, 8065 Sunset Drive, Flint, in the amount of \$14,450, total project costs as follows:

Senior Center Building Addition Concept

WHEREAS, the City passed a resolution on December 8, 2008 that endorsed a concept for the construction of an addition to the Sr. Center facility with the City loaning a portion of construction costs, the resolution as follows:

Senior Center Addition, Construction Concept

Resolution No. 081208-04

(Carried)

WHEREAS, the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center has been in operation since 1980 and incorporated since 1982 as a public not for profit IRS 501(c)(3) entity, serving a regional area defined as the Swartz Creek School District boundaries consisting of significant portions of four Townships; Gaines, Clayton, Mundy and Flint, and the Village's of Gaines, Lennon and City's of Swartz Creek and a small portion of Flint; and

WHEREAS, operational and activities funding through the 1980's and 1990's was primarily based on private donation revenues with City funded housing and associated expenses; and

WHEREAS, a signatory effort containing 697 validated voter signatures, asking for a ballot request of 0.5 mills for services, programs and operational costs, for a period of ten years, for the voters of the City of Swartz Creek, was presented to the City Council on August 14, 2000. The City Council voted to place the request before the voters at the General Election of November 7, 2000, the electorate of the City approving the request with the first collection in July, 2001; and

WHEREAS, in 2001, the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens determined the need and desire to expand or reconstruct their facilities due to continued and anticipated membership growth, and further, have drawn conceptual plans for additions to the existing building as well as reconstruction of a new building; and

WHEREAS, the City Levy of 0.5 mill was replaced with a county-wide 10 year levy of 0.7 mill on August 8, 2006, to provide programs, activities and services for seniors, to-which the operational activities for the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center is funded; and

WHEREAS, prior to the approval of the County millage, the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center, through the City's Levy and private donations, set aside approximately \$300,000 to fund either a capital improvement project for the existing building or the construction of a new facility; and

WHEREAS, the cost of a new building was determined to be prohibitive and although an addition may present some logistical problems, it is the only cost feasible solution; and

WHEREAS, the Senior Center has retained the services of an architect and drafted two conceptual floor plans and preliminary cost estimates for an addition, copies of which are attached; and

WHEREAS, Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Commission, the medium through which the County Senior Levy funds are distributed, have indicated that the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center is eligible for a \$200,000 grant for capital improvements in the form of an addition to the existing Center, such grant would bring a total of \$500,000 the Senior Center has to spend towards an expansion to the Center; and

WHEREAS, the Swartz Creek Senior Citizens Center has requested permission to construct an addition and assistance from the City in funding the balance of construction, estimated to be between \$300,000 and \$500,000; and

WHEREAS, the City is unable to make a contribution for such an amount from its General Fund, however, under certain conditions, a loan is possible from an enterprise fund such as water or sewer.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council endorse the selection of Option Number A, as an addition to the Swartz Creek Senior Center Building, and further, directs the Administrative Staff to work with the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center Board, as follows:

- 1. In conjunction with the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center, initiate formal application to Genesee County for a grant in the maximum amount allowable.
- 2. Prepare a draft lease between the City and the Swartz Creek Senior Citizens Center.
- 3. Prepare a draft loan agreement between the General Fund and an appropriate enterprise fund.
- 4. Prepare a construction budget.
- 5. Prepare a revised draft of the Senior Citizens Center Budget.
- 6. Initiate site plan review process.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon completion of each of the directives and any other data that may be needed, that they be brought back before the City Council for review, and further, upon collection of all data, information and commitments, a final decision by the City shall be rendered.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council hereby finds and determines that the making of the proposed building improvements for the use of the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens, Inc. constitutes actions directed toward the improvement of the social, legal, health, housing, educational, emotional, nutritional, recreational, or mobility status of older persons within the purview of 1976 PA 39 [MCL 400.571 et seq].

Discussion Took Place.

WHEREAS, the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens Center has determined that the costs for the planned addition exceed the financial capabilities of the organization and without significant financial assistance from the City, they may be limited in their mission of providing programs and activities for Senior's; and

WHEREAS, the City, although desirous to assist, is facing significant financial challenges in the upcoming years and cannot commit to additional General Fund expenses in any department, and further, will need to reduce its current contributions in all General Fund supported departments in order to continue to provide adequate levels of service to its residents; and

WHEREAS, the Sr. Center has downsized the proposed addition and has drafted a conceptual budget that is economical and affordable and permits them to construct an addition that will eliminate the need to borrow funds from the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council hereby finds and determines that the making of the proposed downsized building improvements for the use of the Swartz Creek Area Senior Citizens, Inc. constitutes actions directed toward the improvement of the social, legal, health, housing, educational, emotional, nutritional, recreational, or mobility status of older persons within the purview of 1976 PA 39 [MCL 400.571 et seq].

NOW, THEREFORE, I move that the City Council direct the City Manager, City Attorney and staff to prepare a lease agreement with the following general conditions:

- 1. The existing agreement(s) with the Center be dissolved.
- 2. As long as the County collects a levy within the City and distributes funds to the Sr. Center, the City will not levy for the authorized .5 mills for the duration of the collection period.
- 3. A new lease shall be drafted for the existing center.
- 4. Provisions within the new lease will allow for leaseholder improvements by the lessee (Sr. Center).
- 5. If the Sr. Center elects to construct an addition, the project will be theirs. The project will follow normal site plan approval process and in compliance with all applicable ordinances. All construction funding will be the responsibility of the Center.
- 6. The City will permit the expenditure of funds held by the Center for the construction of an addition to the existing building. If the Center fails to construct an addition, then the funds will be returned to the City and either refunded to the taxpayers or expended on programs or activities as provided for in the ballot language.
- 7. All expenses associated with the building and the Center will be the responsibility of the Center, including, but not limited to maintenance, utilities, janitorial, repairs, inspections, etc. The City will provide lawn care and snow removal, without charge. As long as the program is available, the City will designate the 15% allotment of C.D.B.G. Funds. Additionally, and as long as the City can afford it, an additional cash contribution of \$5,000 per year towards maintenance will be made. This contribution will terminate in the event the City is forced to reduce its workforce due to budget constraints.
- 8. In the event of the dissolution of the SCASC, the building and all funds and assets will be turned over to the City.

BE IT FURTHER DIRECTED that upon negotiation and tentative agreement with the Sr. Center, a final draft be brought back before the Council for review and determination.

Assistant City Manager Zettel made a brief presentation regarding the Neighborhood Stabilization Program. Mr. Zettel stated that the City's foreclosed houses are scattered about the city, with the exception of Winchester Village, which makes it difficult to target a specific neighborhood for the program. Mr. Zettel stated that the Land Bank organization would be owning, operating and maintaining these properties for rentals or for sale some time in the future. Mr. Zettel said that he wasn't sure that organization has the capacity to do that in the City based on past experience with the one Land Bank owned parcel in the City. Mr. Zettel stated that the City has more ability, in extreme circumstances, to rehabilitate or tear down buildings that are bank foreclosed than if they are owned by the Land Bank. Mr. Zettel stated

that there are two houses in the City that need to be demolished. He stated that those two houses will be submitted to Genesee County Planning.

Discussion Ensued.

Councilmember Binder talked about the training that she attended in Frankenmuth. Ms. Binder stated that she enjoyed the training.

Councilmember Krueger had questions about the City Manager's report. Mr. Krueger wanted to know if the drainage problem on Young Drive had been taken care. City Manager Bueche stated that the problem has not yet been addressed, but that it may be taken care of in the Spring. Mr. Krueger questioned the term "stranded cost" that appeared on page 92 in the City Manager's report. Mr. Bueche stated that he was unsure but that he will check into it.

Mayor Pro-Tem Porath talked about the FANG meeting that was upcoming. Mr. Porath stated that he may not be able to attend and asked if someone could cover for him at the meeting.

ADJOURNMENT:

There being no objection, Mayor Abrams declared the meeting adjourned at 7:55 p.m.

ROWE Professional Services Company is pleased to provide the City of Swartz Creek with a design and construction engineering proposal for the above referenced project. Based on your recent meetings with the Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Commission, this project will receive \$300,000 in grant funding through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). Construction will involve milling and resurfacing the existing pavement, pavement and joint repairs, and reconfiguring the existing lane layout on Morrish Road from I-69 south to the Railroad crossing.

As you are aware, plans were initially developed to be bid as a local project. In order to utilize the grant funding. the MDOT bidding process must be incorporated. Our fee for updating the plans, specifications, and estimate to the MDOT format is \$19.866 (see fee breakdown attached).

We anticipate a 5-week construction schedule for this project; ROWE can provide construction observation and administration based on this time frame for a fee of \$49,824 (see fee breakdown attached). Approval of Local Project Prioritization SUBJECT:

The list of stimulus projects has been prioritized to program projects in accordance with the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 allocation. Genesee County is expected to receive \$8,306,302 to be utilized for urban federal-aid eligible roads and \$624,753 to be utilized for rural federal-aid eligible roads.

All projects were separated into categories including non-federal-aid eligible, bridges, enhancement, safety, urban and rural projects. The non-federal-aid projects are ineligible for funding and the bridge, enhancement, and safety projects have options to receive financial support from another source of funding so were not considered for funding.

Through prioritization process of the urban projects, seven (7) projects are recommended for funding totaling \$8,306,302 and one (1) rural project is recommended for funding for a total of \$624,753. Three (3) additional urban projects are being recommended as Round 2 or back-up projects for inclusion into the TIP totaling \$1,376,180 in the event that additional funds become available for Genesee County.

All of the projects recommended for funding will have the federal funds limited at the approved cost per the lump sum method, all Preliminary Engineering (PE) will be 100% funded by the local road agency, and all agencies must have PE plans submitted and a Grade inspection (GI) requested within 45 days of project approval by the Metropolitan Alliance. If the 45 day time frame is not met, the road agency will not be eligible to receive funding for that project or any other project on the prioritized list.

If further funding becomes available, a prioritized list of projects is recommended as Round 3.

TAC is recommending endorsement of the attached prioritized list of local projects.

*The following methodology was utilized to prioritize all of the Urban Projects:

- 1. Staff requested a copy of the engineering plans from all local road agencies
- Staff utilized the scoring system from the 2010-2013 TIP Application to score the ADT and PASER Ratings to determine a Total Score for each project
- 3. Projects were prioritized by Total Score then by ADT
- 4. All ADTs, PASER ratings, and costs were rechecked.
- 5. Staff reviewed all project costs and project limits to determine reasonableness. This was done utilizing \$60 per lane foot as a guide.

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- 1. All Preliminary Engineering (PE) to be 100% funded by Road Agency
- 2. Compare cost submitted to cost at \$60 per lane foot, fund at lowest reasonable cost
- 3. All funds will be limited to the amount of Federal Funds identified per the lump sum method
- 4. Separate all projects into 3 rounds of funding

ROUND 1

Split the funding total of \$8.3 Million into 2 portions

A. 50% target of the funding to go to projects with high Total Scores and that submitted a copy of their plans and are ready for a Grade Inspection (top projects)

This includes 4 projects for a total of \$3,886,960.

B. 50% of the funding to go to projects with high Total Scores (top projects) and can be ready to submit plans and request a Grade Inspection within 45 days of approval of projects by the Metropolitan Alliance (45 day clock begins the day after approval or the day funds are made available, whichever occurs first. Road Agencies will be notified in writing when the clock begins.)

This includes 3 projects for a total of \$4,438,000.

(GCRC: 43%, City of Flint: 28%, Small Cities: 20%, Burton: 9%)

ROUND 2

In order to be ready for any available additional funds, if any of the Round 1 projects are not able to meet the 45 day requirement of submitting plans and requesting a Grade Inspection, staff is proposing that the top rated projects by additional communities be chosen.

If the Road Agency does not meet the 45 day requirement, that Road Agency is out of the running for all ARRA funding.

This will get us approximately to the \$9.3 Million amount which was the funding amount provided by the Federal Government for this area.

This includes 3 projects for a total of \$1,376,180.

If additional money is not available, staff proposes that these projects be given top priority in the 2010-2013 TIP at the 80/20 cost.

ROUND 3

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If additional funding becomes available, projects will be funded from the top of the list down according to high Total Score.

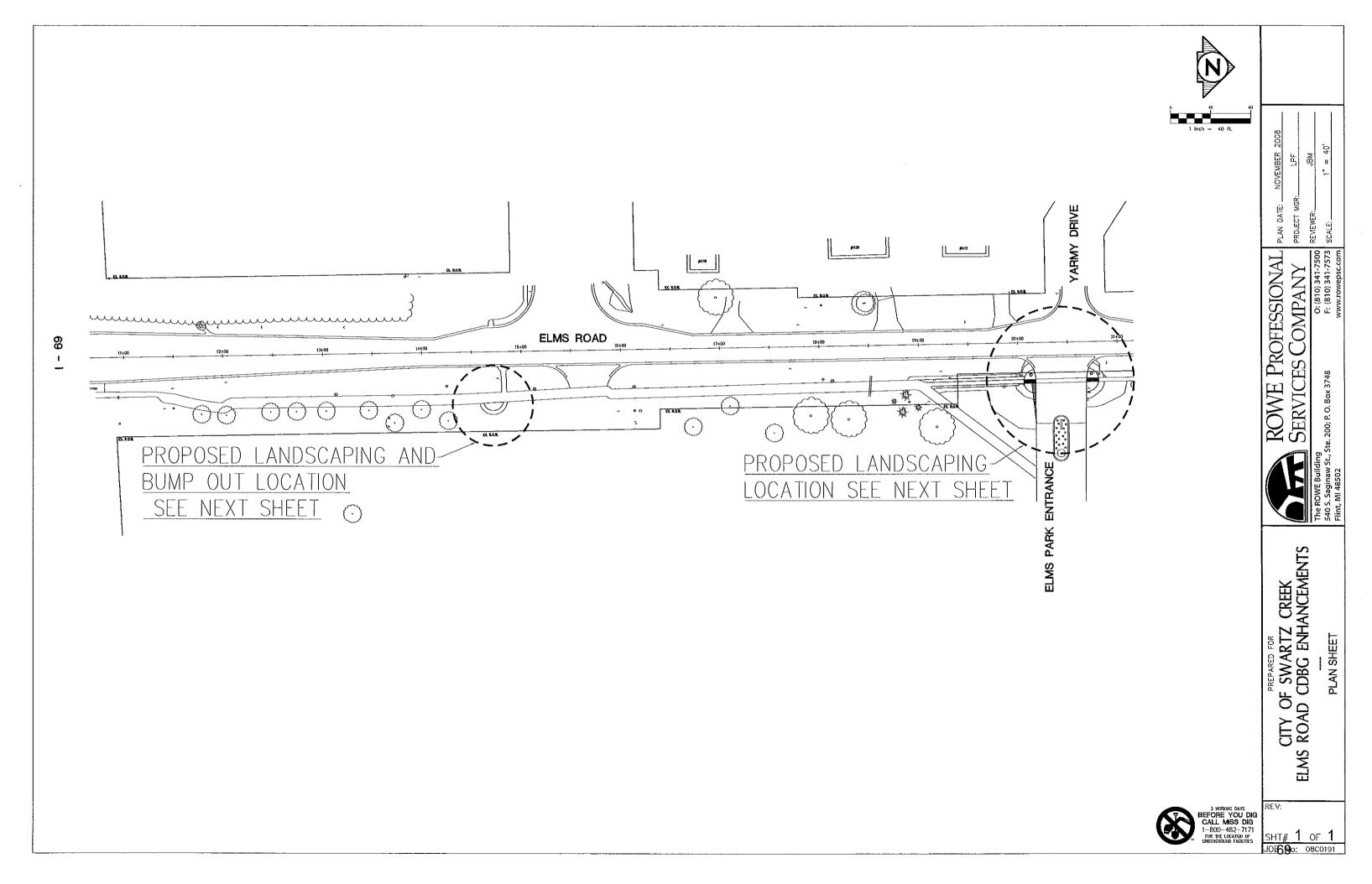

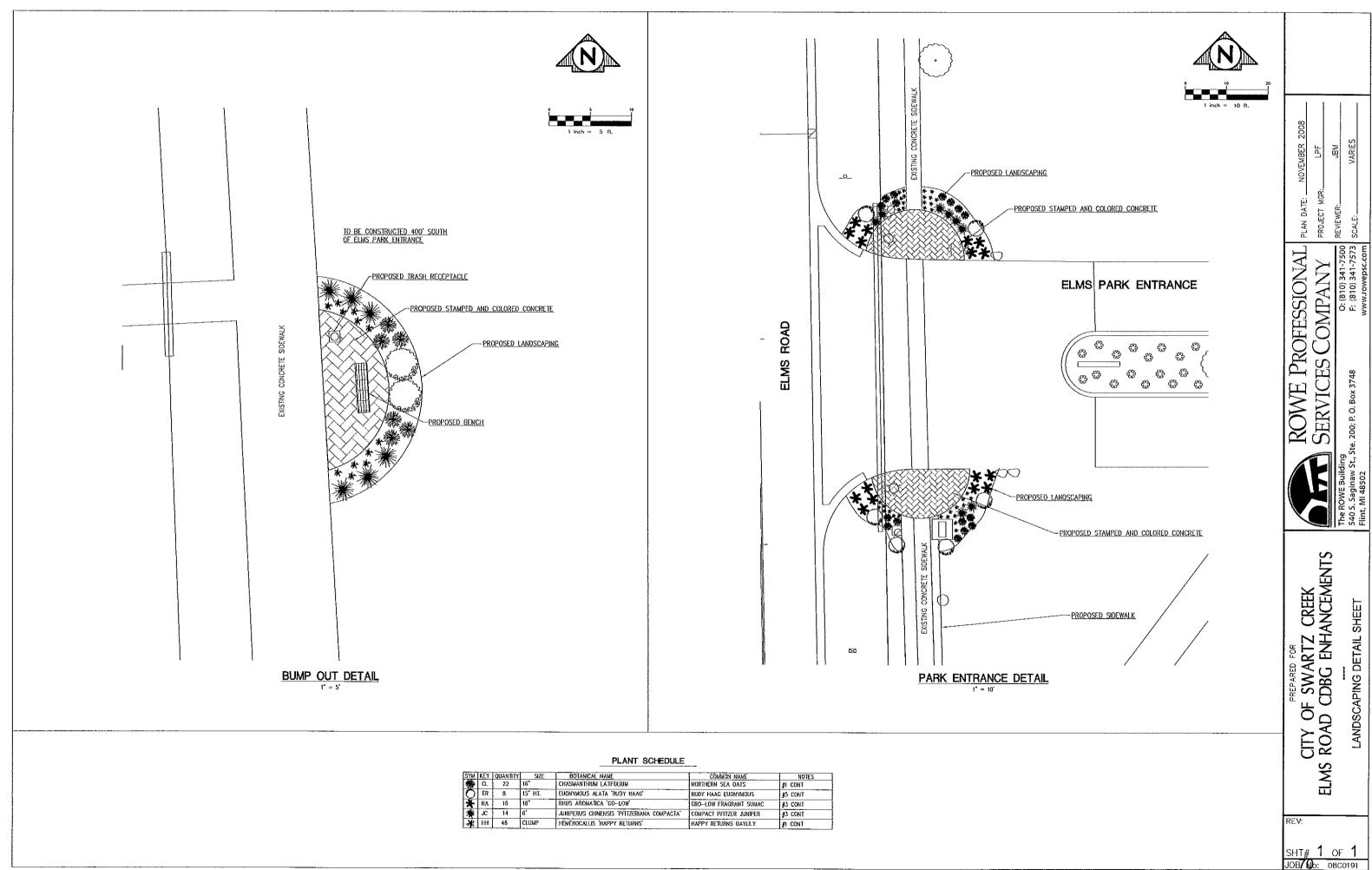

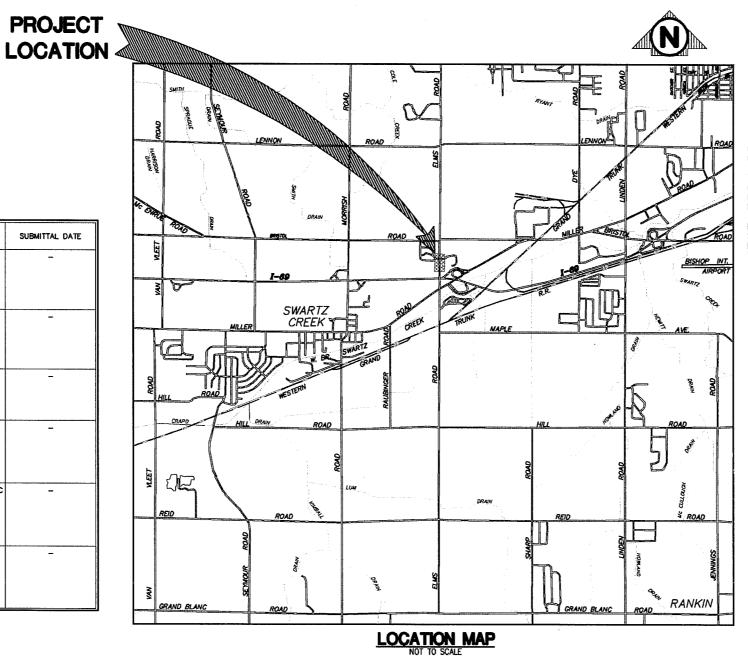

IF ADDITIONAL FILL MATERIAL WUST BE PROVIDED TO ATTAIN THE FINISH GRADES SHOWN ON THE PLANS, THE CONTRACTOR SHALL PROVIDE THE REQUIRED FILL MATERIAL, UNLESS A SPECIFIC BORROW AREA IS IDENTIFIED ON THE PLANS,

EXCESS SOILS RESULTING FROM EXCAVATION AND EARTHWORK SHALL BECOME THE CONTRACTOR'S PROPERTY AND DISPOSED OF PROPERLY, UNLESS AN AREA(S) HAS BEEN DESIGNATED FOR STOCKPILING OR "BLENDING IN" THE EXCESS MATERIAL WITHIN THE PROJECT LIMITS.

BACKFILL AND EMBANKMENT

DAVARTILL AND EMBANYAMENT BACKFILL FAID EMBANYAMENT BACKFILL OF AN EXCAVATION UNDER OR WITHIN THE ONE ON ONE INFLUENCE OF AN EXISTING OR PROPOSED ROAD, SIDEWALK, DRIVEWAY, PAVEMENT, OR AGGREGATE SURFACE, SHALL BE SAND, MEETING THE REQUIREMENTS OF GRANULAR MATERIAL CLASS III AS DESCRIBED IN THE 2003 MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION STANDARD SPECIFICATIONS FOR CONSTRUCTION. THE SAND BACKFILL SHALL BE COMPACTED TO AT LEAST 95% OF ITS MAXMUM UNIT WEIGHT.

DRAINAGE

THE CONTRACTOR SHALL MAINTAIN DRAINAGE OF THE PROJECT AREA AND ADJACENT AREAS. WHERE EDISTING DRAINAGE FACILITIES ARE DISTURBED OR BLOCKED BY CONSTRUCTION, THE CONTRACTOR SHALL PROVIDE AND MAINTAIN TEMPORARY PROVISIONS FOR DRAINAGE

WHERE CONSTRUCTION HAS DISTURBED EXISTING DITCHES, SWALES, OR OTHER DRAINAGE FACILITIES; THE CONTRACTOR SHALL RESTORE THEM TO THEIR GRADES AND DIMENSIONS WHICH EXISTED PROR TO THE BEGINNING OF CONSTRUCTION, UNLESS DIRECTED OTHERWISE.

THE CONTRACTOR SHALL NOTIFY THE ENGINEER WHEN SIDEWALK FORMS HAVE BEEN SET AND THE SAND BASE PREPARED. CONCRETE SHALL NOT BE PLACED UNTIL THE ENGINEER HAS OBSERVED THE FORMS, CONCRETE DELIVERY SHALL BE SCHEDULED TO ALLOW SUFFICIENT TIME FOR ADJUSTMENT OF THE FORMS, IN THE EVENT THAT ADJUSTMENT IS NECESSARY.

THE CONTRACTOR SHALL PROTECT FRESH CONCRETE FROM DAMAGE BY THE WEATHER, TRAFFIC, OR VANDALISM. DAMAGED CONCRETE SHALL BE REPLACED BY THE CONTRACTOR'S EXPENSE.

Road maintenance funding sees major reduction

Flint, Michigan. ---

The Genesee County Road Commission was informed this week that its funding from the Michigan Transportation Fund (MTF), from which they and all road agencies in Michigan receive money for road maintenance activities, will be decreased by 4.88 percent from 2008-2009 fiscal year level – which was itself down nearly 4% from 2007. This means that the Road Commission will have \$1 million less to spend on road maintenance in 2009 than in 2008. And almost \$2 million less than in 2007!

This bad news comes on the heels of a very snowy, extremely cold winter which saw salt prices skyrocket and a series of quick thaws accelerate pothole formation. Road Commission Manager-Director John Daly explained that this funding hit likely means less routine maintenance on the roads this summer. "This is a substantial reduction in our funding and something will have to give. We cannot expect to be able to deliver the level of service our residents demand and expect with skyrocketing costs and continually falling revenues."

While no firm decisions have been made as to how to accommodate the shortfall, some possible reductions include reducing roadside ditching operations from 10 days per township to 8 days; reducing roadside mowing to 1 pass per year; reducing curbside sweeping to 1 per year for primary roads and one every 2 years for subdivision streets; reducing gravel road gradings to 3 per year; or eliminating overtime (when most work on the local road system is done) unless deemed an emergency.

"This is significant. Motorists and residents will notice this", he said. "We can't reduce winter maintenance very much more than we already have because we have to keep the roads safe, so routine summer maintenance activities that have already been cut way back will have to be cut more or maybe even eliminated altogether."

Unless adequate maintenance money is made available to seal the roads and perform other essential routine maintenance, GCRC Manager-Director John Daly expects the condition of Michigan's roads to worsen in coming years, as roads continue to age.

"Roads in Michigan have been underfunded to such a large degree for such a long time and the roads have deteriorated so badly as a result that there is simply not enough money to adequately maintain them properly let alone rehabilitate all the aging roads that require it. Without a significant increase in road funding, roads will get worse every year as the pavement continues to age and crack," he said.

As one example of the costs involved to maintain roads, every year Road Commission workers hand shovel more than 3.5 million pounds of patching material into potholes. Including labor, material and vehicle usage, the annual pothole repair price tag is more than \$4 million dollars.

While GCRC monitors its roads closely, it welcomes calls from the public reporting regarding dangerous conditions such as large potholes or severe gravel road problems. As you know, the MERS Retirement Board is charged with the fiduciary responsibility of overseeing the retirement system. Specifically related to carrying out their duty, the Board requires the actuary to conduct an Experience Study on a five-year cycle. Over the years, the findings of those studies have resulted in adjustments to various assumptions to accurately reflect the actual experience of the plan. This study process ensures the health and sustainability of the plan. Please find attached an analysis from MERS actuary, Gabriel Roeder, Smith & Company, on the effect the most recent experience study will have for your specific retirement plan.

For the calendar year ending December 31, 2008, the MERS portfolio returned -25%. The 10-year smoothing of assets adopted by the Board in 2006 will mitigate some of the impact of these losses to your plan by recognizing only $1/10^{th}$ of the loss in the 2008 actuarial valuation report. During these difficult economic times, the Retirement Board is very concerned about the impact increased contributions may have on your budget. For this reason, the Board has chosen a phased-in approach to assumption rate changes.

New Actuarial Assumptions for Fiscal Years Beginning in 2010, 2011 and 2012

At the May 14, 2008 meeting of the Retirement Board, the Board adopted a timetable for implementation of new Board-approved actuarial assumptions recommended by Gabriel, Roeder, Smith & Company, MERS' actuary. These assumption changes represent the final recommendations made by the actuary in the most recent study of MERS experience covering the 1999 - 2003 valuation years. Updating the assumptions to better match actual experience, with the resulting changes in near-term employer contributions, may prevent potentially larger changes in employer contributions at some point in the future.

Actuarial assumptions are reviewed every 5 years, and sometimes more often. The purpose of the periodic reviews is to increase the security of members' retirement benefits, by more accurately reflecting the 'real life' experience of MERS. This allows the actuary to better project future benefit payments, and better plan for the employer contributions needed to make those benefit payments secure. The implementation timetable for the new assumptions provides:

Valuation Date December 31,	First Affecting Fiscal Years Beginning in	New Assumption
2008	2010	Rates of expected employee turnover (withdrawal, or termination of employment before retirement)
2009	2011	Rates of expected employee retirement
2010	2012	Potential increases in employees' FAC *

* Potential increases in employees' final average compensation (and lifetime pension benefits) due to increases in pay or lump sum payments made at or shortly before retirement (generally due to payments for accrued paid time off, vacation time, overtime, etc.)

The table on the next page shows the approximate changes in your employer contribution requirements in fiscal years beginning in 2010, 2011 and 2012 due to these changes in actuarial assumptions. This is in addition to changes in the contribution requirements (up or down) due to any changes in your active member payroll, changes in your benefit provisions, financial market influences, or other differences between projected and actual experience. The actual impact on required contributions will be determined by the 2008, 2009 and 2010 actuarial valuations, but the results on the next page (based on the 2007 valuation) show the approximate percentage change.

Later in 2009, MERS staff will contact municipalities and courts to discuss how final average compensation is computed, and how an employer's compensation policy affects MERS pension amounts and the required employer contributions to MERS.

Overall MERS continues to be a well-funded and secure retirement plan. Ongoing review and strengthening of actuarial assumptions to match actual events will better position MERS employers to meet their future benefit obligations. This improves the security of members' benefits. The next experience study, for the 2004 - 2008 period, will begin in the summer of 2009 after completion of the 2008 valuations.

Comment on Actuarial Calculations – The projections of your future employer contributions in this report indicate what the December 31, 2007 valuation results would have been, based on the new actuarial assumptions. As always, your required employer contribution rate changes every year, in response to demographic changes, financial experience, benefit provision changes, etc, within your specific plan. The results of future actuarial valuations will differ from the projections, sometimes materially. However, the estimates in this report should allow the employer to prepare for the approximate effect of the assumption changes.

Below is a table displaying your required employer contributions under each set of assumptions, *calculated as if the three new assumptions had been in place for your December 31, 2007 valuation*. This is *not* a prediction of the results of future annual valuations. It only shows the impact the new assumptions would have had on the 2007 annual valuation. Note that not every employer is affected by the new FAC increase assumption, based on the 1999 - 2003 study.

- ** These are the accumulated impact of changes recognized for the fiscal year stated. Do not add these percentages together. For example, for the fiscal year beginning in 2011, the accumulated impact of the change in the expected turnover assumption and the change in the expected retirement assumption is a 18% increase in the employer contribution requirement (18 cents on the dollar, not 18% of member payroll).

Comment on the Investment Markets - Investment markets were very volatile in 2008, and some volatility is likely to continue. The actuarial value of assets (funding value), used to determine both your funded status and your required employer contribution, is based on a 10-year smoothed value of assets. Only a portion $(1/10^{th})$ of the 2008 investment market losses will be recognized in the first year, in your December 31, 2008 actuarial valuation report. This reduces the volatility of the valuation results (your required employer contribution and your funded percentage). The impacts of the 2008 market losses are estimated to be: i) a reduction of around 3% in your funded percent as of December 31, 2008, and ii) a 22% increase (22 cents on the dollar) in your employer contribution requirement for your fiscal year beginning in 2010.

Although final data has not been provided to the actuary, it is estimated that as of December 31, 2008 the actuarial value of assets is around 139% of market value. This means that meeting the actuarial assumption in the next few years will require average future market returns that exceed the 8% investment return assumption. As was true for past market downturns, MERS expects the market to rebound over time. By the time the 2008 market losses would be fully recognized (over the following 9 years), future market gains are expected to partly or fully offset 2008 market losses. This smoothing method is a powerful tool for reducing the volatility of your required employer contributions. However, if the financial markets do not rebound, the result would be increases in your employer contributions each of the next 9 years, comparable to the first year impact shown in the previous paragraph.

Comment on Actuarial Calculations – The projections of your future employer contributions in this report indicate what the December 31, 2007 valuation results would have been, based on the new actuarial assumptions. As always, your required employer contribution rate changes every year, in response to demographic changes, financial experience, benefit provision changes, etc, within your specific plan. The results of future actuarial valuations will differ from the projections, sometimes materially. However, the estimates in this report should allow the employer to prepare for the approximate effect of the assumption changes.

Specially Designated Distributor (SDD) licenses permit the sale of alcoholic liquor, other than beer and wine under 21 per cent alcohol by volume, for consumption off the premises only.

For your information, part of the investigation of the application is conducted by the local law enforcement agency and investigative forms will be released to them either in person or by mail.

Although local governing body approval is not required by the Michigan Liquor Control Code, Rules and Related Laws for off-premise licenses, the local governing body, or its designee, may notify the Commission at the above address within 15 days of receipt of this letter if the applicant location will not be in compliance with all appropriate state and local building, plumbing, zoning, fire, sanitation and health laws and ordinances, or if the applicant is considered ineligible due to other factors.

All conditions of non-compliance must be outlined in detail, indicating the applicable laws and ordinances. A copy of the law and/or ordinance may be submitted with the notification.

Senate Passes Problematic Cable Dispute

Resolution Bill – Last week the Senate unanimously reported <u>SB 190</u> without the League's recommended amendments. Currently, the bill contains a "loser pays" provision that would have local units of government paying attorney fees for cable if the local unit rejects a settlement. This bill contains a dispute procedure that is a hybrid of other procedures in the METRO and Telecommunications Acts, but neither of those acts has this fee shifting provision for municipalities. One disappointing note is that if we had gotten these amendments, we would have stepped out of the way and supported this bill 100%. The MPSC is anxious for this bill to pass, and we are sympathetic to their need to have a dispute resolution procedure. Bonding for Retiree Health Care Up Again in House Committee – Wednesday this week the House Judiciary is taking up HBs <u>4073</u> and <u>4075</u>, which allow local units of government to bond for retiree health care. The bills were up last week as well, however, various amendments were being suggested and the bills were held until this week. The League has testified in support of the package. New Markets Tax Credits – The House Tax Policy Committee will begin discussions this week on New Markets Tax Credits to be offered by the state. These credits will be similar to the federal tax credits, and will be credits offered on the state income, MBT, and insurance retaliatory tax. Transportation Budget Highlights – MDOT's Chief Administrative Officer, Leon Hank, presented the FY 2010 budget to the Senate Transportation Appropriations Committee last week. The budget is based on the assumption that overall transportation revenues will be down \$156 million (4.6% from the previous year). The gas tax is projected to be down 4.3%, diesel tax is project to be down 8.3% and vehicle registration fees are projected to be down 1.5%. The state federal aid road and bridge program will be decreased 23.84% (or \$356.3 million overall). The local federal aid road and bridge program will be decreased 19.65% or \$61 million. MTF distribution to counties, cities, and villages will decrease 4.88% or \$45.4 million. There is a "loser pays" provision in these bills that would require a local unit of government to pay attorney fees for a cable corporation if it rejects a recommended settlement. This provision in this form does not exist in any of the other related acts. Local units of government are specifically exempted from this provision in the Metropolitan Extension Telecommunications Rights-of-Way Oversight (METRO) Act. Using taxpayer dollars to pay attorney fees for multi-billion dollar corporations should be a great concern to all of us.

We are not opposed to a dispute resolution process, but this "loser pays" provision is bad for all of our communities and is a gross misuse of taxpayer dollars. Please contact your legislator today and ask for opposition to HB 4247 and SB 190.

Cable Dispute Resolution Bill Held Up In the

House – HB 4247 (Mayes, D-Bay City) was on the House agenda Tuesday and Thursday last week. This bill creates a dispute resolution procedure for the Michigan Public Service Commission (MPSC) for cable disputes. The League was pushing an amendment to remove a "loser pays" provision that would require a local unit of government to pay attorney fees for a cable provider if it rejects a settlement from the MPSC. An amendment was offered by Rep. Barnett (D-Farmington Hills). We needed 56 votes to pass the amendment. After an eloquent floor speech by the amendment sponsor, 63 representatives had cast votes in favor of the amendment. At that time, House Democratic leadership decided to clear the board and postponed this for the day. New Markets Dollars to Redevelop Michigan

Federal Update

Stimulus Funds for COPS Program – Guidance has been released for the Department of Justice's COPS Hiring Program (CHRP). The program received \$1 billion through the stimulus. This is a competitive grant program that provides funding directly to law enforcement agencies having primary law enforcement authority — offering funding for newly hired officers, including providing funding for new officers to fill existing officer vacancies that are no longer funded as a result of state, local or tribal budget cuts. Funds will NOT be provided to start-up agencies, to fund a consortium of agencies, or for contracting law enforcement services. Broadband Initiatives to Receive Stimulus Funds

- There is \$7.2 billion contained in the stimulus package for broadband initiatives in un-served and underserved areas. \$4.7 billion will go to the Department of Commerce National Telecommunications Agency (NTIA), and \$2.5 billion to the Department of Agriculture Rural Utility Service (RUS). Eligible applicants include local governments, states, non-profits, and public-private partnerships who will compete for awards on a competitive basis. Awards are to be made before the end of the 2010 fiscal year and projects are to be completed within 2 years. 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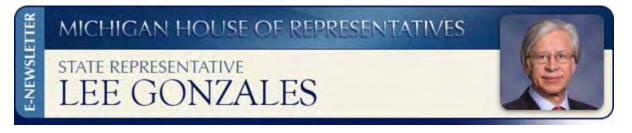

Dear friends,

I'd like to let you know about some legislation that I've recently introduced, and some issues in the Michigan House that I believe will strengthen our community and protect our residents.

Plan Protects Homeowners by Banning Foreclosures for 90 Days

I recently supported a plan to keep more Michigan families in their homes by putting a 90-day moratorium on foreclosures for struggling homeowners who seek help in trying to stay in their homes. With our economy in crisis, we need to stand behind our working families who are in danger of losing their piece of the American dream.

The plan provides a 90-day lifeline from foreclosure for homeowners who commit to working with their lender and a housing counselor to reach a solution. Counselors are available through the Michigan State Housing and Development Authority (MSHDA) and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Michigan currently ranks seventh in the nation for foreclosures. More than 145,000 properties were in foreclosure in 2008 – a 21 percent increase from 2007 and a 108 percent increase from 2006. In January of this year alone, 11,418 foreclosures were reported in Michigan. Last month, 629 properties went into foreclosure in Genesee County. Of these, 264 were in Flint, 62 were in Grand Blanc, and Burton saw 59 homes enter foreclosure.

Strengthening Michigan's Indentity Theft Laws

This week, I introduced House Bill 4326, which would expand Michigan's racketeering statute to include internet or computer crimes and include felony violations of the Identity Theft Protection Act.

Identity theft remains the number one consumer fraud complaint received by

the Federal Trade Commission, with reported fraud losses totaling more than \$1.2 billion. My bill would give prosecutors a way with which to charge offenders. By adding identity theft to Michigan's racketeering statute, we empower law enforcement to pursue the entire organization behind these crimes, not just the low hanging fruit.

New Tools for Keeping Citizens Safe while Driving

I also introduced House Bill 4394, which would provide law enforcement with new tools for keeping our citizens safe while driving a motor vehicle. This legislation would expand the Michigan Vehicle Code to include language that prohibits the use of a text-messaging device while driving. Texting while driving is an incredibly dangerous practice that not only endangers the health of the driver, but those around him or her as well. This plan will ensure that those who would place others in danger on our roads will be punished to the full extent of the law.

merica's automotive sector supports one-in-ten U.S. jobs, \$150 billion in annual personal income, and \$50 billion in state and local tax revenue each year. Main street communities cannot withstand the failure or further deterioration of the nation's automotive sector. The federal government should be supporting both cities with operating automotive facilities, and cities with closed or idled plants. Local governments bear the worst brunt of the closed plants, idled brownfields, unemployed citizens, lost tax revenue, increasing foreclosures, and other terrible impacts of the decline of this industry.

That is why mayors and other local officials from across the nation have joined together to form the "Mayors Automotive Coalition" (MAC). MAC is underway with four objectives:



Emergency funding for U.S. automakers – MAC is urging Congress and the Administration to provide a needed \$25 billion emergency loan to U.S. automakers to prevent the failure of these companies. Congress may act in early December 2008, and automotive communities need to voice their support now for the preservation of the viability of these companies.

Rebuilding Idled Automotive Communities – Many local communities are already suffering the impacts that result from the closing of automotive plants – and many more cities will face the threat of plant closure whether the automotive financial rescue takes place or not. MAC is seeking new federal support for those



localities where automotive facilities have already closed, are closing, or will close in the transition of the industry, including:

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- Congress should amend the Public Works & Infrastructure Act of 1965 and provide appropriations for \$1 billion in new investment in the Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration's (EDA) "Economic Adjustment Assistance" program. This existing program provides funding for planning, remediation and demolition, infrastructure upgrades, construction of new facilities, and economic development activities. Under MAC's proposal, eligible localities would be able to get grants of up to \$10 million or more for redevelopment projects. MAC will work to have legislation introduced and passed either as part of a federal economic stimulus program, or as standalone legislation. MAC will also work to ensure that EDA's program is implemented in ways that best help automotive communities. Such EDA assistance is critical for the redevelopment of closed automotive plants and brownfields into new facilities that can produce American technology innovation and green jobs.
- As part of the early 2009 economic stimulus package, Congress and the Obama Administration should provide funding for upgrades to roads, transit, water, sewer, and green infrastructure systems that will need to be rejuvenated to support the redevelopment of closed facilities.
- o Congress and the U.S. EPA should provide enhanced assistance to localities struggling with the barriers of brownfields issues at closed automotive facilities. EPA should build on the support it has already provided through the "Shifting Gears: Driving Toward Auto Sector Property Revitalization" and the "Revitalizing Mothballed Brownfields" projects. EPA should target assessment and cleanup grant funding to localities with idled and contaminated automotive plants. The federal government should support efforts to transfer these mothballed properties from companies that cannot or will not redevelop them to local governments or private sector parties that will.
- Congress should support the development of new green jobs and green businesses in communities with closed automotive facilities. Congress should create new "Green Prosperity Grants" that provide \$500,000 to eligible communities to support local economic development strategies that produce green businesses and green jobs. Congress should also fully fund the Green Jobs Act of 2007 at \$125 million annually to support worker training in emerging manufacturing and hi-tech sectors. MAC also supports job retraining resources for automotive workers impacted by industry transition.
- Transformation to clean and green vehicles Local governments are struggling with the impacts of air pollution and gas price volatility. Mayors support the transformation of the American automotive industry to cleaner, more efficient vehicles as part of an overall shift to more sustainable transportation systems. The MAC will support the use of federal funding for re-tooling of automotive plants for greener vehicles, as part of 2009 economic stimulus legislation. MAC also supports new federal resources and incentives for clean-fuel vehicles and alternative fueling infrastructure as part of the reauthorization of the SAFETEA-LU transportation legislation.



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Resource clearinghouse for automotive communities – MAC will provide a clearinghouse for localities interested in preserving and rebuilding automotive communities. MAYORS FROM A CROSS AMERICA CALL ON CONGRESS TO HELPS SAVE & TRANSFORM

As our nation continues to struggle through a domestic economic crisis, the need for quick and decisive action to bring stability to our nation's automakers has never been greater or more critically important. Main

street communities cannot withstand the failure or further deterioration of the American automotive industry. The loss of jobs and tax base, and the further spiraling descent of income and housing stability, will undermine the foundation of many American cities. As the leaders of cities across America, we urge Congress to provide adequate financial rescue funding to the automotive sector now, along with \$1 billion in Economic Development Administration funding for economic adjustment grants.

America needs to take action to preserve good automotive jobs and help transform our manufacturing communities with new green technologies and innovation. -- Mayor Robert Cluck Arlington TX

More than 3 million American jobs, \$150 billion in annual personal income, and \$50 billion in annual state and local tax revenues are tied to auto manufacturing, according to the Center for Automotive Research. The failure of the domestic auto industry could literally drive the nation's economy off the cliff. Local governments bear the worst brunt of the closed plants, idled brownfields, unemployed citizens, lost tax revenue, increasing foreclosures, and other terrible impacts of the decline of this industry.

Mayors from localities across the nation that depend on automotive facilities and jobs seek to make sure that federal officials understand that there are four wheels driving American economic viability that must all be kept on the road:



1. Emergency Financial Support for Automakers Now – To prevent economic stagnation and suffering, Congress should act now to provide \$15-\$34 billion in emergency bridge loans to American automotive companies.



2. Protecting & Rebuilding Main Street – Federal financial stabilization must also include support for those localities where automotive facilities have already closed, are closing, or will close in the transition of the industry. Congress should provide a \$1 billion investment in the Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration's (EDA) "Economic Adjustment Assistance" program. This EDA assistance will be critical in redeveloping closed automotive plants and brownfields into new facilities that can produce American technology innovation and green jobs.



3. Green Transportation – Local governments are struggling with the impacts of pollution. Mayors support the transformation of the American automotive industry to cleaner, more efficient vehicles as part of an overall shift to more sustainable transportation systems. Mayors support standards for greater vehicle efficiency and cleaner technologies, and urge Congress to ensure the availability of Department of Energy Section 136 funding through the economic stimulus package or other approaches undertaken in early 2009.



I. Unemployment Benefits – The nation has a duty to support the workers left behind in this struggling economy, which is why mayors strongly support the maintenance of unemployment benefits during this industry transformation.

Mayors will be calling on their congressional delegations and the current and incoming Administrations to be committed to these four interconnected approaches, both now and beyond the current crisis.
