MEETING OPEN TO THE PUBLIC: Kenneth Brill updated the board on Sandi's work on getting donations for the tot lot @ Abrams. She is looking to get sandbox updated and sand ramp wall for ADA accessible and new scoop digger.

**REPORTS:** 

A. DPW Director & City Manager: Mr. Zettel parks and bathrooms are open.
Signage is still being worked on. Power is coming to Abrams pavilions. We are looking to replace the water fountain by the ballfield at Abrams. .
A one or two inch water line will be put down by Whitney Ct once the parking lot is completed for use at that end of the park. Genesee Valley Trails is completed and the SRTS construction will commence after HTD's. The

passport grant is still in process. Bids on the tennis courts will go to the council on Monday. Forestry bids were in line and in production . Basketball court bid @ Elms was approved for restoration. We have 3 seasonal employees back from last year.

Boardmember Gonyea commented the tot lot at Abrams needs more woodchips.

### **BUSINESS:**

- A. Abrams Park Aggregate Trail: Boardmember Barclay mentioned we spoke of this pre pandemic, and we would like an aggregate path along the creek. Boardmember Gonyea questioned if this was part of the trial. Mr. Zettel responded yes but it would be years before that section would be done. But we could use millings from the street construction projects and ask the contractor if they could use those to create the parking lot and a path at Abrams along the creek.
- B. Park Levy Discussion: Boardmember Barclay spoke of a possible levy for our parks. Mr. Zettel commented ½ mil levy would give us approximately \$80,000 to \$\$90,000 for the parks, on an average it would run homeowners an additional \$50 per year. Boardmembers agreed it could be something we could consider in the future but with inflation right now is not a good time.

C. Solar Model System: Mr. Zettel spoke that Boardmember Fountain has applied for the "Put Your Town on the Map" grant and will present this idea at the Small Town and Rural Development Conference Her pitch is for an interactive solar model to be set up at Elms Park along the trail.

Motion by Barclay to go forward with the Solar System Project. support by Bosas

We briefly reviewed the park reservation report.

### MEETING OPEN TO PUBLIC:

Ken Brill would be in favor of a tax levy for the parks, but he believes it would be best to wait due to property values and taxes increasing this year and probably again next year.

Mike Suchodolski spoke of the progress at Otterburn Park disc golf course and the need for another culvert for the drainage. He is looking at renting another piece of machinery to get some more work done. They are also in need of more mulch. They have 8 fully invested volunteers, just looking at donations for soap. Mr. Zettel replied that the city will take care of the soap and other things such as tables, canopies, and speakers. BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS:

Boardmember Gonyea commented it was a good meeting today.

Boardmember Barclay commented that he was made aware that there were people playing paintball at Elms Park. He introduced our new boardmember Ritter.

Boardmember Ritter is a surgical technician who works locally. She has four children and soon to be a grandmother. She lives on Winshall and likes she has the opportunity to contribute to the park board.

Motion by Plumb, adjourn the meeting, support by Hicks.

We will be meeting at 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, June 20, 2023. THIS MEEING WILL BE AT PAVILION #2 IN ELMS PARK (Pavilion with restrooms). Note that we have a new face with Brandon Greiner, who is filling the seat left by Sandi Brill! Welcome Brandon! We are now back up to full strength.

By way of update, all tennis court, basketball court, and forestry work is approved. Abrams forestry is substantially complete for the year. I will also have updates on the completion of the Genesee Valley Trail, Safe Routes to School work, park use, and regular maintenance.

First up (probably before we call to order) will be the dedication of the trail. The Swartz Creek Chamber of Commerce will be leading a ribbon cutting for the trail extension in Elms Park. We will be joined by our speakers (Mayor Krueger and Chair Barclay), along with many trail stakeholders and community members! Good work everyone!

First on our business agenda is the slip and slide. This is being orchestrated by our Shattered Chains partner as a fundraiser for their course. I hope we can work with them on this event to ensure that this is in the proper stages of planning.

Related to this, I am including a Call for Volunteers form. Recently, we have seen a bigger drop in 'social capital'. This is fancy phrase for 'folks helping out their community.' With this as a focal point for outreach, we are hopeful that we can get businesses, churches, sport teams, families, and civic groups to adopt specific public assets or events. I hope to get the boards feedback on this and perhaps look to start garnering some support with help from members.

Next, we still have an interested party that is generously looking to donate some equipment to the tot lot at Abrams Park. Sandi Brill is working with another community resident to upgrade and replace the existing sandbox play area with something that is June 20, 2023 Park Board

new and more accessible. This sounds like a great project, and I think someone will be attending to provide some details.

Lastly, there is ongoing talk in the community about a splash pad. Jim and I should be able to provide some findings from our inquiry into the matter for discussion.
